### SPINNERS GO OUT ON STRIKE

#### WOOLEN MILL

MR. KAY SAYS HE WILL INCREASE SCALE AND OUTPUT FOR IMMEDIATE RECOVERY OF THE INDUSTRY.

Shutting down of Tom Kay's mills caused by the striking nine spinners will probably be in sight or tomorrow morning to Mr. Kay's decision to, at least partially give in to the demands of the strikers. ### ONE LESS NOMINEE IN RACE

#### FOR PRESIDENCY

RUMOR SAYS FAIRBANKS WILL QUIETLY RETIRE—THIRTY DELEGATES PLEDGED TO HIM WILL GO TO TAFT.

Indianapolis, Ind., May 11.—Vice President Fairbanks has decided to quietly drop out of the race for the Republican presidential nomination without any formal announcement, according to a report being circulated today. ### BISHOPS TO FACE CHARGES

#### AT METHODIST MEET

REV. DAVID H. MOORE OF PORTLAND AMONG THOSE TO BE TRIED FOR MALADMINISTRATION AT BALTIMORE.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Baltimore, Md., May 11.—The most sensational event scheduled for this week's Methodist conference being held here is the consideration of the charges made by the Rev. George A. Cooke of New York against Bishops David H. Moore of Portland, Or., Goodsell and McDowell of Chicago, and Berry of Buffalo. Cooke charges them all with maladministration as the result of their ruling on charges recently brought by him against prominent Methodists including Dr. Buckley of New York, Professor Browne of Boston. Cooke alleges that the bishops did not rule correctly when the charges against the bishops were heard. A resolution was passed asking the citizens not to support a candidate for the presidency of the United States who is not a total abstainer and who is not in sympathy with the work of prohibitionists. Resolutions inviting the Methodists Protestants to unite with the Methodist Episcopal church were unanimously passed.

### GAS PIPE THUGS IN BAY CITY

#### TWO VICTIMS FOUND

REPETITION OF DABNER AND SIMPSON MURDERS IN SAN FRANCISCO—MAN AND WOMAN FATALLY HURT.

San Francisco, May 11.—Edward Griffith is dying at the Central Emergency hospital with a fractured skull and Ruby Johnson is at the same hospital unconscious with a possible fractured skull. Although found in widely separated portions of the city, both are thought to be the victims of gas pipe thugs. The Johnson woman was found lying in a pool of blood on Gough street between Post and Sutter at 5 o'clock this morning by Policeman John Collins. She was removed to the Central Emergency hospital, where she was treated for a possible fracture of the skull by Dr. Pinkham. The woman is still unconscious and little hope is held out for her recovery. Edward Griffith was found in front of the Spear Lumber company's yards at Spear and Mission street at 11 o'clock last night. Thinking the man was under the influence of liquor, he was removed to the city prison and locked up and was held there until 5:30 this morning when he was sent to the hospital where Dr. Pinkham operated on him for a fractured skull. Griffith is not expected to live throughout the day. On his left forehead is a mark about 7 inches in length which was apparently made by a piece of pipe.

### PLANNED WOMAN'S KILLING

#### SAYS MONTGOMERY

CONFESSES HE SHOT MRS. NORTH AT ELKO, WASHINGTON, BECAUSE HIS BROTHER TOLD HIM TO.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Spokane, Wash., May 11.—"I shot Mrs. North. My brother hired me to do it. We planned the murder two months ago." Gaspung out this confession, H. M. Montgomery, brother of E. T. Montgomery of Elko, Wash., owner of the Montgomery hotel at Elko, broke down under the grilling examination to which he had subjected by District Attorney Frederick Push, and cleared up the cowardly attempt to assassinate Mrs. May North, who was shot down as she was crossing the lobby of Montgomery's hotel on the night of May 1. Montgomery's confession discloses as malicious and coldblooded attempt to kill a fellow creature as has ever been revealed in the Pacific northwest. Mrs. North and E. T. Montgomery occupied the same room in the Montgomery hotel. The North woman secured a hold over Montgomery and he determined to do away with her. He hired his brother to do the job. "Earnest bolstered up my courage with whiskey," declared Howard Montgomery, "then he left town. I planned to kill her on the night of May 1. I calculated that the North woman would cross the lobby at a certain time after dinner. I posted myself so I could shoot her through the window. When she came within range, I drew a bead on her and fired. I saw her throw up her hands and fall. Then I ran away." Mrs. North is in a hospital here. She will recover.

### RODGERS ARRESTS GAMBLER

#### PILLETTE ACCUSED

MAYOR WALKS INTO REAR OF CIGAR STORE, ARRESTS OWNER AND ORDERS TWENTY POKER PLAYERS AWAY.

Ed. Pillette, who was arrested Saturday night by Mayor Rodgers, did not show up in the police court this morning as was expected. Rodgers says he will go after him. It is very probable that some interesting developments will come out of the raid of Ed Pillette's cigar store by Mayor Rodgers Saturday night. If the reports of those connected with the State street establishment are true, there has been a great deal of discrimination on the part of the authorities in shutting down Pillette's card games. It is stated that several cigar stores in the city are running gambling games in their back rooms, and that so far they have not been interfered with. Pillette says that he called the Mayor's attention to this fact, but that Rodgers stated that he did not know that games were being conducted at any other place in this city. Pillette denied that he admitted to the Mayor that a gambling game was in progress at the time of the raid, and he declares that gambling was not mentioned in the conversation that took place after the Mayor entered. Pillette said last night that no charge was made against him, and that he did not know what his plea would be when he is brought before the city judge.

### STANFORD PREXY IS CENSURED

San Francisco, May 11.—When the name of President David Starr Jordan of Stanford university, was mentioned Sunday at a meeting of the Asiatic Exclusion league it was heartily hooted and hissed at the conclusion of the reading of an article by President Jordan. The part that particularly aroused the meeting was the following: "It is not that we fear attack from Japan. The Japanese war is made in Europe, a fantasy of the yellow newspapers of Paris, a nightmare of the professional agitators of San Francisco and Seattle."

In commenting on the article President O. A. Tveitmo, who presided, declared that if "the eminent professor gave less attention to the biology of fish and more to the conditions of the human race he would not be so grossly ignorant of the true situation of the Oriental exclusion question."

#### May Have Murdered Aged Man.

Redding, Cal., May 11.—Whether Horace C. Nutting, 71 years old, whose body was found in the buried ruins of his home, four miles west of Anderson, was murdered or committed suicide after setting fire to the house is a question which still remains unsolved. Shortly after 1 o'clock Sunday morning neighbors living a quarter of a mile away were attracted by the flames. When they reached the scene the home had almost burned to the ground and the barn was in ashes. One fact points to suicide and another to incendiaryism and murder.

### WANT TO BAR OUT ROOSEVELT CHINESE

Washington, May 11.—That an attempt will be made to bar President Roosevelt from participating in the proceedings of the conference of governors which meets here next Wednesday, after an organization is affected, is not unlikely, according to a report that has reached the ears of the governors who have already arrived here.

Why such action is contemplated if it is, is a puzzle to many, as it is pointed out that inasmuch as the President called the governors together he should be permitted to take any part he wishes in their deliberations. However, nobody can be found who wants to stand responsible for the story. A probable basis for it may be found in the President's refusal to consider William George Jordan's proposition for a house of governors and a disposition on the part of many of the state executives to adopt the plan.

#### Insane Soldier Kills Three

Manila, May 11.—Private Michael Beacham of the First U. S. cavalry, ran amuck Sunday, killing three and fatally wounding one of his comrades. The dead are: Sergeant William Hoer, Private G. Wilson, Thos. Woodward. Fatally wounded; Private Edward Woodward.

### WARSHIPS TO REDUCE IN WEIGHT

Washington, May 11.—The navy department has inaugurated the policy of reducing the weight of the battleships as far as possible by the removal of some of the boats and davits, unnecessary bridges, heavy tops and masts and boat cranes. Naval constructors have been so instructed. This is one tangible result of the armor belt controversy.

#### ENFEEBLED WOMAN BURNED TO DEATH.

San Francisco, May 11.—Mrs. Johanna Hogan, 72 years old, lies dead today because she was too feeble to leave her bed when fire attacked the little shack in which she lived alone. Judging from the position of her charred body it is evident that the old woman, awakened by the flames, had attempted to crawl out of bed when she was overcome and burned to death.

#### CHIEF OF POLICE AFTER BASS SHOOTERS

Chief of Police Gibson has decided to put an end to shooting bass in the slough within the city limits. Men and boys with rifles have been pooling up and down the slough shooting black bass with rifles and making life uncertain for people on land. Arrests are to follow.

### WIN THE BOYCOTT

(United Press Leased Wire.) Canton, May 11.—Even their joy is almost swallowed by the amazement the commercial class of Chinese feel at Japan's humble appeal to the Chinese merchants in the mikado's realm to use their influence to persuade their countrymen at home to drop the anti-Japanese boycott.

The resperate condition of finances among the islanders has been no secret in China, but that the mikado should actually stoop to implore help has fairly struck the boycotters dumb with astonishment. His virtual surrender is all the more noticeable in view of the high tone Japan has recently taken and the almost open threats of violence if the Chinese did not cease their commercial warfare. Besides, the Japanese plea will probably do no good. The home-staying Chinese are unlikely to notice representations from their brethren abroad.

The mikado's cry for mercy was emitted through the various trade and commercial associations.
