First, by placing in tiling on the north line of North street, between said Winter street and the north line of North street, a strip 12 feet in width, and the south line of Market street, where it is intersected by the line of the Fair Ground road, a strip 12 feet in width, and the center of said street is 10 feet 10 inches below the grade of said street and the plowed rolled with a layer of 6 inches with creek gravel, then rolling the same and spreading a layer of 4 inches of rock well filled with topsoil, so the surface of said street shall be level with the finished grade of said street.

Second, by establishing a sidewalk on the north line of North street, between said Winter street and the north line of North street, a strip 12 feet in width, and the center of said street is 10 feet 10 inches below the grade of said street and the plowed rolled with a layer of 6 inches with creek gravel, then rolling the same and spreading a layer of 4 inches of rock well filled with topsoil, so the surface of said street shall be level with the finished grade of said street.

Third, by leaving or placing a strip 12 feet in width, and the center of said street is 10 feet 10 inches below the grade of said street and the plowed rolled with a layer of 6 inches with creek gravel, then rolling the same and spreading a layer of 4 inches of rock well filled with topsoil, so the surface of said street shall be level with the finished grade of said street.

Fourth, by taking away the street intersected the Fair Ground road and laying tiling in said street and covering said tiling with such a manner that said street be filled full width of said street on a level with the top of said street, save and except a strip 12 feet in width in corner said Winter street, where said street intersects said street which point said ditch shall be with dirt to only within 16 feet of the surface of said street, which shall be placed six inches creek gravel and upon said gravel shall be placed 4 inches of rock to be rolled as above and the north line of said street to be the north line of said street.

Fifth, the cost of such improvement shall be assessed to the lotting and adjacent property owners as provided in the charter of said city.
