The government snail boat Mathoma, together with dredger No. 2 arrived in this city from Portland yesterday, and will begin work on the river here immediately. The boat will be stationed in and about Salem for the rest of the summer.

Administrator Appointed—

Upon the petition of Coroner A. M. Clough, James Currie of Salem was today appointed administrator of the

estate of Patrick Higgins, deceased, who was fatally stricken with paralysis Saturday evening near his home on the Jefferson road, south of Salem. F. L. Pond and J. R. Parvin were named as appraisers for the estate.

Divorce Granted—

The suit for divorce brought by Mrs. Pearl Woodridge of this city against her husband, George Woodridge, was granted by Judge Galloway this morning. The plaintiff stated that she and her husband were married in North Yakima, Washington, in 1901, and lived happily together for three years. Suddenly, without any cause or reason the husband departed without even kissing his wife goodbye, and has since refused to live with or support her. Attorney Carey Martin represented Mrs. Woodridge, and District Attorney McNary, after listening to the woman's story stated that the defendant would not object to a decree of divorce.

LAWMAKER HAS BEEN INDICTED

Washington, May 12.—Congressman James Thomas Hefflin of Alabama, must stand trial for shooting Louis Lundy, a negro, and Thomas McCreary while riding on a Pennsylvania avenue streetcar several weeks ago. An indictment containing three counts has been returned against him.

Hefflin became annoyed at the actions of the negro, who was boisterous, and upbraided him, whereupon Lundy, according to Hefflin's version of the affair, became more noisy. After a few angry words the congressman drew his revolver and shot, one bullet striking the negro in the head and another pierced the leg of McCreary, who was standing on a street corner.

New School District—

County Superintendent of Schools W. N. Smith has received a petition from the property owners of Mill City to consolidate school districts 99 and 108. The town of Mill City covers a portion of both these districts, one of which is in Marion and one in Linn county. It is the intention of the Mill City people to build a fine school house on the Linn county side of the town, which affords a better building site, and to have the children in both parts of town attend the same school. This cannot be done unless the school board consolidates the two districts.

FIGHTING "MACHINE" IN CAL.

(United Press Lessed Wire.)

Sacramento, Cal., May 12.—Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock the Republican state convention will be called to order by Chairman George Stone of the state central committee. With both the "machine" and Lincoln-Roosevelt factions making claims of control, one of the hottest fights in the history of G. O. P. conventions in this state is looked for.

The "reform wing" will endeavor to seat Ex-Mayor W. B. Davis of Oakland, as chairman of the convention. The organization will put up George A. Knight in opposition and right there the issue of the convention control will be determined.

The "machine" candidates for delegates-at-large to the Chicago national convention are Governor Gillette, Mike De Young, General Harrison Gray Otis and George A. Knight. The Lincoln-Rooseveltists have decided upon the following as their candidates: Jacob Neff, Ex-Senator Thomas R. Bard, Colonel E. A. Forbes and Senator Chester Rowell. The alternates proposed are: Chas. S. Wheeler, Harold T. Power and W. J. Hunsaker.

The "organization" forces profess to be very confident of victory, which means the retention of control of the state central committee and the party machinery.

DENIES KIDNAP CHARGE

San Francisco, May 12.—In custody of Detective Sergeant Norman Fitzsimmons of the New York police department, Robert W. Fullerton, son of a St. Louis millionaire, arrived from Seattle on the steamer Watson this morning.

Fitzsimmons, who holds a warrant for Fullerton's arrest on a charge preferred by a young woman in New York, laughs at the sensational stories of kidnaping sent out from Seattle.

Fullerton is charged with having wronged, under a promise of marriage, Gladys Hobart of New York on September 29, 1906, aboard the steam yacht Trent.

Soon after the arrival of the detective and his prisoner the attorneys engaged by Fullerton's father filed a petition for a writ of habeas corpus and secured an order remanding Fullerton to the custody of the sheriff. The writ was made returnable at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

HAYWOOD REFUSES TO RUN

Chicago, May 12.—William D. Haywood will not be the Socialist candidate for President of the United States. He declined the honor today in a statement which he is to read to the delegates attending the party's national convention in this city.

Haywood had been advised not to make a bid for the nomination by former Governor David C. Coates, of Colorado, who said that if his name did not go before the convention a clash would be started by the Debs forces, resulting in dissension among the delegates. Haywood's statement follows:

"Because my friends felt I should permit my name to go before the Socialists' convention for endorsement for presidential candidate I feel it is best to make a statement to right my comrades in the United States. I feel that at the present time I can best serve my co-workers, myself, and above all, our cause by continuing to work in the ranks. For what my comrades have done for me I am naturally grateful. I ask my friends to cease in their efforts to force my nomination. Incidentally, I never was a candidate."

CHIEF IS CENSURED FOR LOSS

San Francisco, May 12.—The boards of turret captains and ordnance officers of the Atlantic fleet, convened to discuss the recommendations of the bureau experts of the board of construction concerning proposed changes in turret construction and big gun mechanism have concluded their sessions and forwarded their report to Washington.

A friendly relations recently established between the swivel-chair experts and the sea going line officers are expected to cease when the report reaches its destination.

Every recommendation of the department experts is pronounced to be absolutely impracticable. The report which has just been forwarded to Washington is expected to carry censure to the bureau officials which have heretofore framed without dispute all naval construction policies.

It was looked upon by the bureau chiefs as a distinct condescension to ask the opinion of the line officers concerning the changes they had decided upon. Unqualified endorsement was expected.

The railroad commission is at Dufur today listening to arguments on the establishment of a station at Boyd.

State Superintendent J. H. Ackerman will leave for Eugene this evening and will spend several days in visiting the State University and the public schools in that city.
