MAKE SALEM A CREAMERY CENTER.

There are two creameries at Salem and two ice cream manufacturers. Probably \$100,000 worth of cream is worked up here annually.

THE SALEM AND STAYTON ELECTRIC RAILWAY WOULD MORE THAN DOUBLE THIS.

Take the additional creamery business alone that would come over the Stayton line and it is a perfect gold mine for Salem. It would also build up Stayton.

THE TOWN OF SUBLIMITY LAST YEAR ALONE SENT OUT \$60,000 WORTH OF CREAM.

It went by freight or express on a mixed train to Portland.

Stayton, Sublimity, Aumsville, Shaw, and Turner ship \$50,000 to \$75,000 cream each.

There are at least \$160,000 worth of cream produced now annually on the line to Stayton.

Nearly all of this is now shipped to Portland and then SHIPPED BACK AS BUTTER OR AS ICE CREAM. It will be worked up at creameries on the line of this new road.

The creameries at Salem now employ about ten persons. THEIR PAYROLLS SHOULD BE QUADRUPLED.

The difference in freight on cream to Portland and on butter shipped back would amount to thousands of profits if the cream was worked up into butter here.

It would come here in much better condition, as it would be on the road an hour INSTEAD OF A DAY TO A DAY AND A HALF GOING TO PORTLAND.

Portland will always get a large share of the cream shipments from the above stations.

But it cannot be denied that an electric line to Stayton with cars hourly would thus concentrate this creamery business at Salem.

A direct line from Salem to Stayton, down an easy grade, WOULD QUADRUPLE THE CREAM RECEIPTS AT SALEM.

Instead of \$100,000 of creamery product at Salem there would be a product of \$200,000 to \$500,000 annually, and constantly increasing.

The building of the Salem-Stayton electric line will add a cent a pound to the price the farmers will receive for cream BY THE SAVING ON FREIGHT.

It will result in building another creamery at some point on the line or a second creamery at Stayton.

CARRYING FIREARMS DANGEROUS HABIT

The habit of carrying firearms is a very dangerous as well as a foolish one and should be discountenanced everywhere. Many of the states have enacted laws against the senseless habit and others are preparing to do likewise.

Alabama is a leader along this line and has a very stringent law against carrying concealed weapons. Other states have laws prohibiting the carrying of firearms, but they are ineffective because they have the permit clause incorporated within them. If every sheriff, constable and justice of the peace has authority to issue permits for the carrying of firearms it is useless to have a law against the practice. A recent issue of the Birmingham (Alabama) News says:

"It has been reported that some subterfuge or other will be undertaken to get around the new anti-pistol law in this state. It is idle to talk about leasing revolvers for a term of years as a trick to evade the law. The law is plain, and it will be enforced. If it be contested in the higher courts there is every reason to believe it will be held valid. The man or men who undertake to get around the law will doubtless find it a dangerous business. The abolition of the deadly concealed weapon is a part of the program to clean up the moral atmosphere and suppress crime. The cowardly pistol-toting habit must go, along with other menaces to the public peace, the public safety and the public welfare."

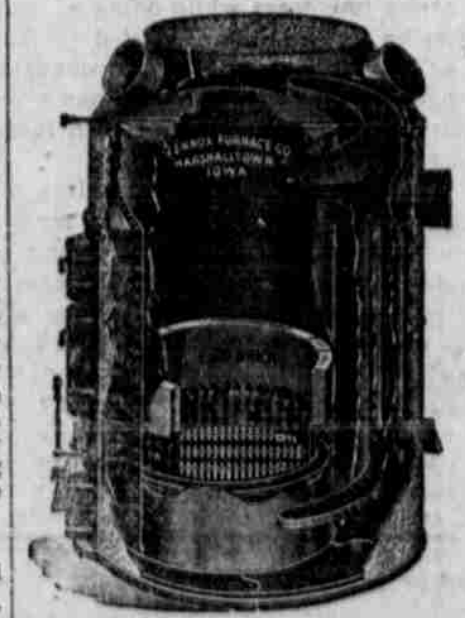

Notice to Improve a Public Street in City of Salem, Oregon. Notice is hereby given that the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, adopted on April 27, 1908, a resolution to improve Winter street, between the city of Salem, Oregon, and the Fair Ground road in said city, as follows: First, by paving the street with a surface of bituminous material, the width of said street to be paved to be 24 inches in width, and by grading and filling the street to conform to said improvement mentioned in paragraph one of the following manner: Third, by leaving a strip 12 feet in width, on the center of said street, to be graded of said street and plowed rolled with a roller, and then filling the same with a layer of 6 inches with gravel, and then rolling the same and spreading a layer of 4 inches of rock well filled with bituminous material, so the surface of said street shall be level with the finished grade of said street.

Fourth, by taking away the dirt which is on the street intersected by the new street and laying filling in such a manner that said street be filled full width of said street on a level with the surface of said street, and the strip 12 feet in width on said Winter street, when the street intersected said street, which point said dirt shall be with dirt to only within the of the surface of said street, which shall be placed in the creek gravel and same shall be placed 4 inches of rock to be rolled as above, and the north line of said street be the north line of said street.

Fifth, the cost of such improvement shall be assessed to the lotting and adjacent property as provided in the charter of said city.
