PASTOR CHARGES

Relations Missing.

Letters from different parts of the country describing the disappearance of several persons who are now thought to be their friend and relatives that have been slain on the premises of Mrs. Belle Guinness and buried in her private graveyard are beginning to pour in.

The sheriff was told today that Emil Kell, of Kansas, drew \$2000 from the bank two years ago and disappeared. No word has been received from him since. His friends feel sure that he answered one of Mrs. Guinness' matrimonial "ads," and went to the "murder farm." Charles Eggman, of New Castle, Ind., also numbered among the missing. After taking \$3000 of his savings from the bank he left New Castle and has not been heard from. A young woman also disappeared from Binghamton, N. Y., under peculiar circumstances. Her relatives write that they fear she became acquainted with Mrs. Guinness and was murdered.

Lampere Denies.

La Porte, Ind., May 13.—Lampere today denied a story that had promised the Rev. Schell that he would make a "complete confession" to him in June.

For the first time since the Guinness murder mystery developed the authorities were told today of circumstances indicating that a well dressed man had been acting as Mrs. Guinness' agent; that it is probable that he helped to "rope" in the victims.

This new evidence is given in a letter from a Cleveland man whose name Chief of Police Cochrane refuses to divulge. The writer says that last August he was waiting for a car when he met a well dressed man who represented himself to be a cattle man from Chicago. He said he knew a rich widow who wanted a "man." The stranger asked Cochrane's informant if he would like to go to La Porte, and he replied that he would not. The stranger then said the woman would go to Cleveland if her fare was paid. A moment later he presented the Cleveland man with a penny photograph of Mrs. Guinness.

The police claim to have evidence that this man was an agent for Mrs. Guinness and that he collected mail addressed to her in several towns, including Chicago. Motorman Carlson has informed the police that the description given by the writer tallies with a man who frequently alighted from streetcar at the corner nearest to the Guinness home.

POLICE HUNTING ROBBERS OF GREAT NORTHERN

OFFICERS SEARCH WITHOUT SUCCESS—\$2500 REWARD OFFERED—PINKERTONS DO NOT HELP ANY—HUNT KEPT UP.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Seattle, Wash., May 13.—With scores of officers searching and running down clues, the bandits who held up and robbed the Great Northern express car yesterday morning have eluded capture and the police today are absolutely at sea regarding their whereabouts.

Pinkerton and special agents of the railroad are in the same quandry as local officers. The drag net which has been out since noon yesterday has failed so far to bring in a suspect.

The reward of \$2500 has served as an incentive and many officers from the surrounding districts have joined in the search.

Perrine, the messenger, is resting easier today and gave a detailed account of the hold-up: The only thing that promised a clue was the arrest late last night of a former brakeman of the Great Northern, who was discharged the first of the month. This morning he was sweated but gave a good account of himself and was released.

A peculiar incident was that when the brakeman confronted Perrine at the hospital, the latter said that he looked like one of the men that held him up. Perrine stated that both bandits were young men, possibly 23 or 24 years of age.

In the afternoon and then moved on to Litchfield, Springfield and Louisville, in which cities the lives were lost and principal damage occurred. The college buildings at Bellevue were badly damaged. The tower of Park hall was blown off and the building was almost completely wrecked. The roofs of Lowrey and Rankin halls were blown off. Many fatalities were avoided by the students running to the basement. As the storm moved south it damaged several of the barrack buildings at Fort Crook and flew over numerous structures in the town of Fort Crook. Estimates of the value of the damaged property fixes the loss between \$50,000 and \$100,000.

INVESTIGATE DEATH OF WEALTHY MAN
