READY TO STAND BY E. DEBS

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Chicago, May 13.—A spirited contest in the Socialists' convention is expected to grow out of a combination said to have been formed by Pennsylvania, New York and Ohio delegates to force the nomination of Benjamin Hanford, New York, for president and Max Hayes, Ohio, for vice president.

According to a report in circulation today the combination was formed at a caucus held Tuesday night. It is pointed out that if the fight is made on behalf of Hanford and Hayes a merry factional fight will follow, with the Debs forces pitted against the combination.

Debs is at home ill, but his followers declare they will not let the eastern delegates relegate him to the rear. Rather than see their leader go down to defeat they will bolt the convention. Today's session of the convention was devoted to routine business.

If the resolutions committee has its way the letter written by G. A. Hoelln of St. Louis criticising President Roosevelt for referring to Socialists as "understrablers," will be withdrawn before it can be read before the convention or passed.

A hot debate on the question was cut short by the noon recess. Hoelln's letter declares that Roosevelt's latest message "insulted the Socialists of the world" and adds:

"Even though Socialists were undesirable citizens they have the right to demand of the President that he tell the truth when discussing matters of public importance."

Delegate Lewis, of Illinois, asserted that the letter exposed Socialists to ridicule.

A number of speeches assailing President Roosevelt were delivered this afternoon. Ben Hanford of New York declared that the President is the "real friend of every dishonorable, thieving politician in the United States."

The "open letter" was finally ordered suppressed.

SINGING FOR THE SAILORS

San Francisco, May 13.—Ten thousand school children sang for the men of the fleet in the stadium at Golden Gate park today and while the children were singing the women of the California club were preparing good things to eat for the sailor boys who were seated at long tables.

Fully 3000 sailors shared the singing and the food and afterwards they witnessed the annual athletic events of the San Francisco high school athletic league. While the men were enjoying themselves at the park, 200 officers from the fleet were taken on an excursion up Mount Tamalpais and through Muir woods in Marin county, and 1000 enlisted men made a tour of the city on sight-seeing cars.

This evening a reception will be tendered the officers by the ladies of the Century club and tonight the finals in the Pacific coast amateur boxing tournament will be fought.

OPPOSE CHINESE BOYCOTT

Tokio, May 13.—Chinese students in Tokio are protesting against the anti-Japanese boycott being maintained by China. Twelve hundred of them have joined the movement and are daily holding meetings to voice their feelings. Three hundred students who uphold the Chinese government in this matter are trying to break up the meetings by making noisy demonstrations.

BRIBING ONLY ONE BIG JOKE

San Francisco, May 13.—Grinning insolently and by his answers making it plain that he looked upon the acceptance of bribes as a huge joke and entirely proper, ex-Supervisor Daniel G. Coleman, brazenly continued the story of his shame in the Ruef trial today. Coleman told of a luncheon given the supervisors by the Parkside railway people, who through Ruef, are alleged to have bribed the supervisor to vote in favor of a street railway franchise. In the course of the luncheon, Coleman testified, Supervisor Boxton told the Parkside representatives "that you're not in this for your health and neither are we." Continuing, he declared that the supervisors were indignant at the granting of a franchise to the Ocean Shore railway for nothing.

As the cross-examination proceeded Coleman became unruly and refused to continue to act the part of a "good dog" and as a result he may be indicted before night. His refusal to give testimony favorable to the prosecution placed Assistant District Attorney Heney in the position of discrediting his own witness.

Coleman declared that he did not fear Heney and intimated that indictments held no terrors for him. He said that he relied on the prosecution to fulfill its part of the immunity contract and that it must judge for itself whether or not he was telling the truth. The defense is jubilant over the stand taken by Coleman.
