# YOUTH ADMITS MURDER

## OF HIS SWEETHEART

ALVIN HEATON, EIGHTEEN YEARS OLD, CONFESSES TO MURDERING MARY STEVENS—UGLY STORY.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Kanab, Utah, May 13.—Broken by the constant "sweating" to which he has been subjected, Alvin J. Heaton, the 18-year-old youth accused of the murder of his sweetheart, Mary Stevens, aged 17, near Orderville, confessed today.

He said that he met the girl by appointment in a canyon back of Orderville for the purpose of discussing her trouble, for which he was responsible. She begged him to marry her and while pleading with him to right the wrong he had done he shot her four times and secreted her body in a gulch under a pile of rocks, where it was found two days later.

Heaton and his victim were schoolmates and two years ago became sweethearts. The girl's parents did not frown on Heaton's wooing, as he came of a good family and had always conducted himself in an honorable manner. Three months ago, however, he caused the girl's downfall. From that time until the murder was committed he tried to cast her off, but she would not be deserted and wrote him frequently begging him to fulfill his promise to marry her. Driven to desperation, the boy agreed to a meeting with her in the canyon and the tragedy, which in many respects is similar to the murder of Grace Brown by Chester Gillette, followed.

### SCHEDULE OF FLEET ARRANGED

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, May 13.—Although Admiral Sperry does not assume command of the Atlantic fleet until May 15, he has already arranged the itinerary for the northern cruise of the battleships after their repatriation from here. This action was taken in view of the fact that many mayors of the cities on Puget sound and further down the coast had requested a list of the dates of the arrival of the fleet at their respective ports.

The Connecticut will lead the long column of fighting ships out of the harbor of San Francisco next Monday when a course along the Mercedino will be set. On Tuesday morning, the fleet will pass Humboldt bar and that evening the people of Bandon and Coquille river, Oregon, will have an opportunity to view the ships, steaming at a speed of ten knots. That same night those on the shore at Coos bay may catch sight of the twinkling lights of the armada several miles out to sea. During the early hours of the morning of May 20, the ships will steam pass Newport and Yaquina bay in plain view of the watchers along the coast.

The fighting vessels should arrive off the Columbia river light ship at noon Wednesday and later they will pass close to Grays harbor and anchor off the entrance of the Straits of Fuca.

The fleet will then break up and some of the battleships will visit Port Angeles, Port Townsend, Bellingham, and on May 23, thirteen vessels will drop anchor at Seattle. The Connecticut, Vermont, Kansas and Louisiana will proceed to San Francisco and some of the other ships will make repairs at Bremerton navy yard.
