Stanford University, Cal., May 14.—H. F. Bruning, editor-in-chief of the Quad, and M. J. Helmick, Josh editor of the university publication, have been definitely expelled from Stanford university for bitterly criticizing President Jordan and Professor Clark, chairman of the students' affairs committee, in the annual year book.

MANAGER OF BANK IN JAIL

San Francisco, May 14.—George N. Tichenor, formerly manager of the Los Angeles branch of the Continental Building & Loan association, has surrendered to the police, who held a warrant for his arrest on a charge of embezzlement preferred by William Corbin, secretary of the association.

Tichenor declares the money he took from the funds of the loan association was due him. Then he explained that several years ago he was employed by Corbin to secure the conviction of state senators at Sacramento. He says former Senators Bunker and Emmons were convicted and Wright jumped his bond. Corbin, according to Tichenor's story, promised to pay him \$1500 for each conviction. "GRAFTS" FOR GOOD OF TOWN

Decatur, Ill., May 14.—City authorities were astounded today when City Comptroller Robbins "confessed" that he had been holding out of the city revenues for eight years, and now has \$100,000 in a bank to the credit of the city. No one knew his secret but the mayors who have served in that time.

Robbins said he knew the aldermen would spend the money if they had it, and he took it on himself to save for a rainy day in the city's affairs, or perhaps, for a new city hall. The aldermen, instead of being pleased were furious, for they recently floated a bond issue of \$125,000 to rebuild the water works.

Robbins withheld the money coming to the city each year from the township road fund, and none of the aldermen knew the city got revenue from that source.
