amendment or law which would subject such an officer to the temporary whims and prejudices of a minority or an unfriendly political organization to be unrepentant and un-American.

Voters Urged to Use Caution—We recommend extreme caution on the part of voters in voting on the many initiative measures on the official ballot, especially in the matter of the amendment of the Oregon constitution. This constitution was framed with care by the wise founders of the state. Under it the people have lived happily for 50 years and changes in it should not be made lightly or without due consideration and thorough understanding of the change contemplated.

University Appropriation Urged—We commend the University of Oregon and the Oregon Agricultural college to the support of our people, and we deplore the calling of the referendum upon the appropriation bill for the maintenance of the university. We believe that the state of Oregon should support a first class university and to that end we urge upon the voters of the state the importance of sustaining the action of the last legislature, whereby an annual appropriation of \$125,000 was made for the said University of Oregon. We pledge our unwavering support to this measure.

ANNOUNCE PROGRAM OF FLEET

San Francisco, May 15.—The following itinerary of the American battleship fleet after it returns to San Francisco from the north has been announced by Rear-Admiral Sperry, who assumed command today:

- Leave San Francisco July 7; arrive Honolulu, 2100 nautical miles, July 16.
- Leave Honolulu July 23; arrive Auckland, 3850 miles, August 9.
- Leave Auckland August 15; arrive Sydney, 1384 miles, August 20.
- Leave Sydney August 27; arrive Melbourne, 575 miles, August 29.
- Leave Melbourne September 5; arrive Albany, King George's Sound 1350 miles, Sept. 11.
- Leave Albany September 17; arrive Philippines, 3300 miles, October 1.
- Leave Philippines, October 10; arrive Yokohama, 1750 miles, October 17.
- Leave Yokohama October 24; arrive Amoy, (Second squadron), 1843 miles, October 29.
- Leave Amoy November 4, when the first squadron arrives at Manila, 666 miles, October 31, and the second squadron November 7.

GUILTY OF MANY MURDERS

Berlin, May 15.—The arrest at Grossarmstadt of a basket maker named Koch for the murder of his wife has led to startling revelations, which suggest that the man is a veritable bluebeard.

Koch is suspected of having killed several other women. He has already confessed to the murder of his former housekeeper, a woman named Elise. He had cut up her body, burned the pieces and buried the bones.

The method of crime-concealment was adopted in the case of his wife. A woman named Schmidt disappeared from Neustadt in October, 1905, and Frau Fuss was also missing from July of last year.

It is now alleged that there is evidence from Weimar connecting Koch with the disappearance of these women.

In the basket maker's garden at Oberndorf human bones were found, and, after further digging, the complete body of a woman was brought to light.

The police believe that Koch is the perpetrator of nine other murders, including those of two former wives, a son and three housekeepers.

TWO DIE IN FIGHT OVER GOATS.

Jerome, Ariz., May 15.—As a result of a feud long standing caused by the goats of Ed Hurley trespassing on the mining camp of Frank Cooney, the latter is dead and Hurley lies in the hospital at the point of death, with four gunshot wounds in his body.
The men met this morning both armed with shotguns loaded with buckshot, and immediately opened fire. Hurley cannot recover.

party to the continuance of the work inaugurated and carried forward by him.

Demand Tariff Revision—We believe that the time has come for a revision of the tariff. We demand such revision be on careful and conservative lines, with full recognition of the protective principle and without the destruction of any American industry and without impairment of the wages paid to any American workman.

Retention of the Philippines—The retention of the Philippines at this time has justified the policy of the Republican party in acquiring and retaining the Philippines. It is apparent now to all who are open to conviction that the American people have taken liberty not despotism to the archipelago. The population of these islands is protected as never before in their personal and property rights, and being surely educated in the art of self-government. We believe that possession of these islands will only increase American prestige in the Orient and will give the republic large opportunities for usefulness in solving the great questions of the future.

Against Asiatic Coolie Immigration—We favor wise immigration laws or treaty regulations equivalent to adequate to prevent the United States from becoming a dumping ground for coolie Asiatic laborers.

Increase in Navy Favored—We favor the policy of the President for a substantial increase in the navy. The strength of the country is adequate to our seaboard from depredations in time of war and to insure safety to vessels carrying the American flag. In such a navy we see the best guaranty of that peace with honor which we desire to preserve.

American Shipping Should Be Encouraged—We favor the codification of our navigation laws and the removal of all burdensome and unreasonable regulations to the end that the United States may once again have its share in the carrying trade of the world.

Our Congressmen Commended—We approve the record of the Oregon delegation in congress and particularly commend them for their efforts to restore to the people the lands acquired and unlawfully sold by the Oregon & California road company. We have confidence that the legislation fathered by the Oregon delegation and enacted by congress will result in the restoration of this large body of land to public domain.

Election Frauds Condemned—We demand an awakening of the public conscience in the matter of the registration of voters. Gigantic frauds are perpetrated in every campaign on the majority party by the registration as Republicans of voters who are not and never have been in sympathy with the Republican party and who continually labor for the defeat of its policies and candidates. No man should swear that he is a good faith member of a political party unless he is prepared to advocate its principles and vote for his candidates. We demand further legislation to protect the majority party from these frauds and we invite the attention of the prosecution attorneys of the state to the perjury statute to the end that as far as possible these offenses may be prosecuted criminally.

Opposed to Abuse of Initiative and Referendum—We are opposed to the abuse of the initiative and referendum by the submission to the people of large numbers of measures on the same ballot. The people are too busy to give these measures the attention necessary to insure wise action. The number of measures to be submitted at any one election should be limited and it should be further provided that a measure once voted down by the people should be ineligible to a place on the ballot for a period of six years thereafter. We further demand that 25 per cent of votes cast at the last election shall be required on petition to invoke the referendum on state appropriations.

Against Proportional Representation—We are opposed to the proposed amendment to the Oregon constitution known as the "proportional representation" amendment. It is an ill-digested measure, fathered by populists who have stolen the livery of the Republican party. Its purpose is to foist into office by trick and artifice men whom the people could not be induced to elect. It is un-American and opposed to the practice and tradition of our people. When offices are to be filled it is proper that those candidates receiving the highest number of votes should be declared elected.

Opposed to the Recall—We are also opposed to the proposed amendment to the Oregon constitution known as the "recall" amendment. Section 19 of article VII of the constitution of Oregon provides for dismissal and punishment of dishonest or incompetent public officers, and we believe that additional constitutional provision therefor is unnecessary. During the course of his official career, a public officer is often called upon to do acts that do not meet with popular approval, but which the lapse of time will justify. We believe that any constitutional
