## LOUIS J. SIMPSON OF BEND, ON THE DUTY OF BOOSTING FOR YOUR OWN TOWN.

(From Coos Bay Harbor.)

Questionably everybody does a great deal to the town or city in which they live, to that place which they are pleased or recognized in their home. Unfortunately for some, their endeavor is not congenial, they are criticized and continually finding fault, and worst of all, being. Fortunately this class of people is not so numerous as they are. They are not so restless, never satisfied, and only really unhappy people in the land. To them a few words of advice would be futile, unheeded and would serve to aggravate the complaint from which they suffer. Give them the most ideal surroundings, the greatest conveniences and they will always find something to complain and knock about. They are a minority and it is to the great majority that this article applies, the majority of home builders and lovers who constitute the real backbone of every community.

The first class we can only say, knock. To the latter class, we try to point out many little things which they perhaps never realized they owed to their home town. We naturally build his home in a community wherein he finds local conditions best suited to his personal taste and habits, employment and rate of wages of a work, climate, the particular location of the town, the size of it, cleanliness, its education or spiritual advantages, the character of its government, the class of its inhabitants, its development or its progress of development from a town to the bustling type of a city. One of these particular characteristics of the town will appeal to him, notwithstanding the fact that some phases of its life may not exactly harmonize with his ideas or wishes, and he settles in your town. When he becomes a citizen he assumes certain moral duty to that town. Whenever those living in one part of a town oppose improvements in some other portion because they are not immediately and directly benefited, it hampers developments and creates a factionalism which is always lamentable. Be broad in your views on these subjects, put your shoulders to the wheel of progress and improvements and help your neighbor and your city officials to build, build, always build and improve and try to keep your town up to the highest standard in all things. Never mind if it does take a few dollars out of your pocket. Believe that every dollar invested in legitimate improvements will come back to you in the enhanced value of your property even though the direct improvement is more of a benefit to your neighbor's property. Attend the meeting of your town's commercial organizations and help them in their efforts to help you. No class of self-imposed duties as those of the active members of those institutions are so poorly supported by the people and none so beneficial in the town.

Above all things speak well of your town to everyone, in other words don't knock anything. Try to be harmonious, pull together in all things, take an interest in matters of a public nature, stand even willing to make personal sacrifices for the general good of all. The town will be better for it and so will all of us who live there.
