 five feet of clear glass, and view of bar obstructed by the office.  
 Monogram saloon, State street; same defects as Capital saloon.  
 Noble saloon, State street; only eight feet of glass within required distance from side walk.  
 Bach & Nadstaneck saloon, Commercial street; view of bar completely hidden by partition.  
 Standard Liquor Co., Commercial street saloon; same defects.  
 Columba saloon, Commercial street; clear glass more than five feet above the sidewalk, view of back room obscured by partition.  
 Swartz & James saloon, Commercial street; back room hidden by partition, two boxes back of this room.  
 Willamette hotel bar, Commercial street; glass more than five feet above sidewalk.  
 Elk head saloon, Commercial street, view of bar obscured, two boxes.  
 Bank saloon, Commercial street; only three feet of clear glass.  
 Annex saloon Commercial street; only eight feet of clear glass.  
 Eckerlin's saloon, Commercial street; only eight feet of glass.  
 In this list the boxes whose doors are locked, or which have been used as store rooms since the ordinance went into effect, have not been mentioned. The one saloon complying with the ordinance is Neusbaum's saloon on Commercial street.  
 In some of the places, even where the letter of the ordinance has been carried out in regard to the ten feet of glass front, it is impossible, on account of the dark background of the barroom, to see what is going on within. An example of this is clearly shown by an incident that occurred during the inspection tour yesterday. Upon coming out of one of the saloons on Commercial street, which had strictly complied with the glass front regulation of the ordinance, the Chief of Police's party was confronted by a woman peering through the glass door, and straining her eyes as if to find someone. On seeing Chief Gibson, she told him that she thought her husband was inside. Gibson promptly held the door open and the woman pointed out the man, who was promptly led out of the saloon by the head of Salem's police force.  
 After the tour the mayor, the marshal, and each member of the license committee strongly expressed the opinion that the present condition of affairs must come to sudden stop. It is their intention to have all obstructing partitions removed at once, and to compel the saloon men to live up to all the other requirements of the ordinance.  
 A meeting of the mayor and the license committee will be held in the very near future, and the Chief of police will be given instructions as to what course he shall take to remedy the situation. Mayor Rodgers held a consultation with City Attorney Keyes this afternoon, and that official will probably be present at the next meeting of the license committee.

## PAPER TO PROTECT READERS

 Cleveland, O., May 15.—The Plain Dealer recently gave its readers several thousand bankbooks each accompanied by a 50 cent check on the Reserve Trust company, which has closed its doors and made an assignment.

In the past ten days a large number of new accounts were opened as a result of this. None of these depositors will lose a cent. Today, the paper issued a statement saying that it will pay all money deposited on account of the checks issued by the company on surrender of the pass books of the depositors, certified by an officer of the bank that they are correct and that the deposits were made on account of the Plain Dealer checks.

The deposits thus made good will probably exceed \$50,000.

## STUDENTS ARRESTED BY GUARDS

 Seattle, Wash., May 15.—Several students, registered at the University of Washington, were locked up in the guard house at Fort Ward yesterday because they broke the army regulation and trespassed upon the battery park.

The students were out doing geology field work under the direction of Prof. Harry Landes when the arrest occurred and a number of them wandered across the lines, while working, but in a short time a detail of soldiers appeared and placed them under arrest. They were taken to the guard house.

## PLATTE IN MORE TROUBLE

 Chicago, May 15.—The last chapter in the story of the matrimonial entanglements of Senator Thomas Collier Platte, of New York, has not yet been written. Today attorneys representing Carey E. Janeway Platte, who is or is not the wife of the New York senator, according to the various and sundry legal battles terminate, are in Chicago holding a conference with Carey E. Meyers, who reigned with Carey E. Janeway as a "Black Crook Queen" many years ago.

Mae Wood, former stenographer, says she married Mr. Platte long ago and that she is the only legal wife. Mr. Platte denies the impeachment, and the Wood and Platte lawyers have been waging a vigorous campaign of argument, accusation and counter charge.

## EDISON BEATEN IN SUIT

Pittsburg, May 15.—In an opinion handed down in the United States Circuit Court, Judge Buffington finds a patent issued to Thomas Edison of Jan. 13, 1901, which resulted in a great economy in the production of incandescent light bulbs, to have been void and directs that a decree be drawn for the dismissal of a suit in equity brought by the Edison Electric Light Company against the Novelty Light Company. Judge Buffington finds that although Edison's bulb was a valuable correction, it was mechanical rather than inventive in character.

## LOW RATE TO VIEW WARSHIP FLEET

The tariff rate for the battleship excursion to Newport was filed by the Southern Pacific company with the railroad commission today. The fare for the round trip will be \$5 and tickets will be good from the 18th to the 30th of May.

It is expected that the fleet will off Newport on the morning of the 20th. The excursion from Salem will therefore, probably start on the 19th.

## CHINESE REVOLT GROWING

### 10,000 ARE IN ARMS

#### JAPANESE INSTRUCT REBELS— GOVERNMENT ALARMED— MENGTSSE PROBABLY LOST— REBELS KNOW CONDITIONS.

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
 Shanghai, May 15.—The Chinese government is greatly alarmed over the Chinese revolt, which is steadily growing more serious.

The rebels have cut off communication to Mengtsse. It is estimated that the revolted number 10,000 and that they are under instructors trained in Japan. The fact that the rebels selected Yunnan as the scene of their first attack convinces Peking that they are familiar with conditions as this province is poorly protected. The government is not hopeful of saving Mengtsse, which is at the head of the French railway, from being taken.

## WILLAMETTE PRUNE ASSOCIATION SUE

The Wright-Clarkson Merchandise company of Duluth, Minn., has filed a suit for damage against the Willamette Valley Prune association of Salem. The complaint alleges that the Duluth company was damaged to the extent of \$997.50 by the failure of the defendant to fulfill a contract entered into at the close of the prune harvest last year to deliver three carloads of prunes.

The Salem company shipped one carload, which was promptly paid for, but refused to ship the other three. The Duluth jobbers were compelled to go into the open market. The sum paid for the two additional carloads amounted to \$997.50 more than the price at which the Willamette Valley Prune association agreed to furnish them and the plaintiffs ask that this amount be paid.
