### BOYS IN TROUBLE

**FOR STEALING SACKS**—Five young school boys were brought before Recorder Moores this morning for stealing grain sacks from the river warehouse of the Salem Flouring Mills.

Since last Friday 200 sacks have been missed from the warehouse, and yesterday Manager Babcock notified Chief Gibson, who began an investigation. He found 75 of the company's sacks in the various feed stores and junk shops of the city, and was told that they had been sold by some boys.

About dark last night Babcock went down to the warehouse, and discovered two boys in the cast of appropriating grain sacks. One of the boys escaped, but the other was caught and turned over to the police. This youngster gave the names of four of his companions who had been helping him lift the sacks, and when the five appeared in court this morning they confessed to having taken 100 sacks. As 100 more are missing the police believe that other miscreants are also implicated. The boys will be held in abeyance for a week, pending further developments.

### SAILOR AND SOLDIER

**STABBED IN SALOON**

In an early morning saloon row in San Francisco, William Nagle, a sailor from the U. S. S. Minnesota, received knife wounds that will probably prove fatal and F. T. Burns, a soldier from the Presidio, was stabbed in the left groin. Edward T. Reilly is held on suspicion of having stabbed the men.

### ARGUE AGAINST

**BALED WOOD RATE**

The state railroad commission is in receipt of a letter from the Oregon Short Line company, concerning the rate on baled wood which was asked for by the wool growers of Vale, Oregon. The rate at present is \$2.20 per cwt. in sacks. The growers wish to ship in bales henceforth, and for a rate of \$1.75 per cwt. in bales from Vale to the Atlantic sea board.

In its letter the railroad company objects to handling bales and says that the innovation would be of no advantage to the wool growers, as the baling would cost them 25 cents per cwt., which together with the added inconvenience of handling the bales would over-balance the reduction in the rate on the new package. The railroad company says that the wool growers can be persuaded to change their minds.

### Plumbing Ordinance

The city council committee on plumbing are preparing a plumbing ordinance which will be brought up before the next meeting of the city council for consideration.

### Commission Not Authorized

Attorney General Crawford has notified the railroad commission that that body is not authorized to compel railroad companies to fence in their tracks.

### DIED

**WEICHMAN**—At his home, 519 N. Church street, Friday, May 15, 1908, Harry Weichman, of cancer. The funeral will take place from the German Evangelical church at 2 o'clock tomorrow.

The deceased leaves a widow in this city and relatives in Portland.

### NO MORE PANIC

**SAYS HARRIMAN**—Washington, May 16.—Edward H. Harriman, the master railroad builder, sees a silver and golden lining to the recently lowering financial clouds. Likewise, the clouds are rolling by, he declares.

"The railroads can finance themselves from now on," he stated today. "The roads are in good condition and have been very well managed during the past six months. The crop prospects are splendid. Bumper crops will be the rule everywhere. Agitation against the railroads has been noticeably calmed by the recent court decisions which had a very salutary effect. I don't care to discuss the recent increased freight rates. That's a matter for the traffic managers to decide."
