SOME STEPS TO CLOSE THE DITCH.

For the welfare of that beautiful residence part of the city the water power may have to go into a steel flume under the ground. Some years ago the city was upon the point of PURCHASING THE PROPERTY for an electric lighting plant when the buildings burned. Since then nothing has been done to utilize the power although several parties have tried to buy it. A woolen mill plant has been trying to purchase the water power but WITHOUT ANY SUCCESS. It would seem that whether it is sold or not it should be put under ground and allow that part of the city to build up.

When it arrives we are asked to try each bottle in the case—and if we like it—REMIT FOR THE BALANCE \$4.30.

All we have to do to have the stuff shipped to our home in a plain sealed case is to sign the enclosed stamped postcard, and the goods come.

Oh, the privileges of a dry county! But we are not dry yet. We will wait until after June 2nd, BEFORE WE SEND THAT POSTAL CARD.

How many men in this county have received that postal card, and have awaiting them the possibility of free samples?

It is the greatest temptation that has yet beset any man TO VOTE DRY WHO LIKES FREE SAMPLES.

If we were a drinking man and had any use for whiskey we would certainly be tempted to have this county go dry and get the Hayner shipment.

But there is another side and that is to patronize home industry, buy and DRINK PRODUCTS MADE IN OREGON.

Oregon made beer, brewed of Oregon hops and barley, and made with Oregon labor of Oregon water, has our preference.

But the Eastern distillery men are getting ready for the dry time that is coming, and the dry counties will not go dry.

A FEW KINDLY AND WELL-MEANING SUGGESTIONS.

If it is any satisfaction to the old Portland Republican machine to have controlled the state convention it is entitled to its glory.

So far as the independent thinking people of Oregon are concerned they have nothing but contempt for that machine and will express it whenever there is OPPORTUNITY IN THE FUTURE.

As a matter of fact, no one cared three straws, or even one straw who went to the national convention from that convention. If the people had a choice in the matter probably none of the men who have gone would have been elected.

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LENTLESS OPPOSITION OF INDEPENDENT VOTERS.

What has the aggregation that has dominated Oregon Republicanism for twenty years got to its credit to DEMAND FURTHER HONORS UPON?

When men will stand up and tell you that the state university lands were wasted, THAT THE SCHOOL LANDS WERE STOLEN, that the swamp lands were hoodled away to cattle kings, that lie lands and base lands were made the subject of lawless speculation under Republican administration, and no one will publicly deny it, and the same men who did these things ARE NOT CONDEMNED BUT PUT IN THE SADDLE, what can the people do but renege them at every opportunity?

The Capital Journal has stood for reforms within the Republican party, but it warns the machine that THE PATIENCE OF THE PEOPLE IS EXHAUSTED.

They will not be lined up to ratify machine programs as they have been in the past.

Men's political records are going to be HELD UP AS NEVER BEFORE and belonging to the majority party IS NOT GOING TO SAVE A MAN who is unfit or who has had a bad record from merited defeat.

The people realize that the machine would take away from them every right and vestige of protection to decent administration, and would foist upon them THE PROFESSIONAL DISCIPLES OF GRAFT POLITICS.

Does the machine condemn Dunbar for pocketing \$103,000 illegal fees; does it condemn Steel for pouring state school funds into a rotten bank; DOES IT OBJECT TO GRAFTS IN ANY DEPARTMENT?

The people are Missourians and have got to be shown where the machine does anything but defend and gloss over abuses.

It will be said that such talk is only driving one machine out of office to make room for a Democratic machine.

That is a right the people have and AS A LAST RESORT THEY WILL ALWAYS EXERCISE THAT PRIVILEGE.

If the federal appointments in Oregon in the future are to be made from the cast-off and rejected representatives of the old Portland political machine, Roosevelt or Taft will have something to answer for.

Let the delegation in Washington take warning, let the President be assured, that MEN WITH TAUNTED RECORDS WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED BY THE VOTERS.

If Oregon is to be kept in the Republican column in November, there must be a line drawn against grafters for federal appointments, and this includes THE AGENTS OF INCORPORATIONS THAT HAVE VIOLATED THE LAWS.

In saying this The Capital Journal expresses no personal opinion, but voices the deep-seated determination of the people themselves.

What is the use of sustaining a party organization that stands for good principles but culminates in the appointment of bad men who make bad records, PUT THEIR PARTY ON THE DEFENSIVE AND THEN LEAVE THE STATE?

These words of warning are thrown out in the hopes that decent and thoughtful Republicans will APPRECIATE THEM FOR WHAT THEY ARE WORTH, will give heed to the demand for a better, cleaner order of things, and that they will not dig up and foist upon the people too much of the ancient and rotten hierarchy that arrogates to itself to be the only Simon-pure Republicanism in Oregon.

THE PEOPLE OF OREGON DEMAND LEADERSHIP THAT DOES NOT HAVE TO BE PASSED BY IN SILENCE AND WITH DOWNCAST EYES.

ENFORCE THE NEW LAW RATIONALLY.

The Mayor and license committee of the city council should not demand an unreasonable enforcement of the new saloon license ordinance.

That is one of the best regulation ordinances EVER DRAWN UP IN ANY CITY IN THE UNITED STATES.

But many of the buildings in which saloons are situated were built long ago when no such provisions were required.

The ten-foot space of clear glass in the front is impracticable WITH MOST OF THE SALOON BUILDINGS IN SALEM.

The saloons would have to move, and the buildings would be vacant as many of them are unfit for anything else.

So far as we can learn the saloon men are trying TO LIVE UP TO THE NEW ORDINANCE IN A PROPER SPIRIT.

They allow no minors, no women, no gambling, and if the cigar stores and drug stores do as well this will be a very orderly town.

NOTICE. To Improve a Portion of State Street. Notice is hereby given that at the meeting of the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, held May 4, 1908, a resolution was adopted to improve State street in said City with full intersections; between the east line of Commercial street and the west line of Church street in the following manner:

By taking up the south railway connection connecting the street railway track of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company with the street railway track of the Oregon Electric Railway company at the intersection of High and State streets in said city, and by paving the roadway of said street with Warren's Bitulithic waterproof pavement and by moving out and establishing the curb lines on said street and for the doing of all other things required by and set forth in the plans and specifications now on file in the office of the city recorder of said city for the pavement of said portion of said State street with Warren's Bitulithic waterproof pavement, which plans and specifications will govern the making of said improvement in every respect.
