INDIANA FIEND GOT \$55,900

BY HER MURDERS

MRS. GUNNESS GOT BIG SUMS FROM VICTIMS—ONLY \$750 LEFT—REST INVESTED IN REAL ESTATE.

(United Press Leased Wire.) La Porte, Ind., May 18.—In her alleged campaign of murder Mrs. Belle Gunness is said to have carried on a very profitable "business," which, according to the latest figures obtainable, netted her \$55,900. A tabulation which follows shows how she obtained sums of money from these victims: M. Sorenson, first husband, life insurance amounting to \$8000. Peter Gunness, second husband, life insurance, \$4000. Charles Erdman, New Castle, Ind., \$5000. Herman Kuntz, La Salle avenue, Chicago, \$5000. Ole Budspieg, Iola, Wis., \$2000. John O. Moe, Elbow Lake, Minn., \$1500. Andrew K. Helgaine, Aberdeen, S. D., \$2900. George Berry, Tuscola, Ill., \$1500. Henry Gerhart, Iola, Wis., \$1000. From fire insurance in Gunness home, Chicago, \$2500.

In addition to these sums Mrs. Gunness is supposed to have received \$1000 each from four other men whose bodies were found on the "murder" farm, and \$1000 each from 15 men with whom the woman had been corresponding. This makes a grand total of \$54,900 which Mrs. Gunness is supposed to have received. The authorities have failed so far to learn what the woman did with this money. It is thought that the \$720 which she put in the bank shortly before her home was consumed by flames was all the money that was left. It is likely she invested most of the money she took from her victims in real estate. Interest in the Gunness murder mystery centers in two features today. The convening of the La Porte grand jury to take testimony and the receipt by Prosecutor Smith of Police Cochran letters threatening them with death if they do not stop the investigation.

In spite of these threats Prosecutor Smith questioned witnesses before the inquisitorial body and Cochran continued his probing today in an effort to learn how the 14 persons found dead on the Gunness farm met their death.

One missive received by Smith bore the postmark of Brooklyn, N. Y., and another was mailed in Washington, D. C. The one received by Cochran, sent from New York City, told him that he would be killed unless he ceases his activity.

It is probable that Abraham Phillips of Bellington, W. Va., may be another Gunness victim. In February, 1907, he left his farm in West Virginia to marry a rich widow in La Porte. He has never been seen by friends or relatives since.

Digging in the ruins of the Gunness home has been resumed, as the authorities have come to the conclusion that more skeletons will be found there. In addition to this work the little pound near the private burying ground will be dragged and the barn on the Gunness farm will be moved so that diggers can turn up the earth under it.
