**BIG THEFT CHARGED TO OFFICIALS**

London, May 19.—Charging Lord Aberdeen, and Augustine Birrell, respectively lord lieutenant and chief secretary for Ireland, with stealing the crown jewels, which recently disappeared from Dublin castle, a man who declares himself an Irish barrister, has asked the Westminster police court for a warrant for Birrell's arrest, the magistrate told the applicant to make his complaint to the public prosecutor, and, when he urged prompt action than the prosecutor can give, had the attendants remove him from the court room.

The crown jewels mysteriously disappeared some months ago and no very vigorous search was ever made for the culprit because, it was rumored, too great a scandal might result. No one thought, however, of connecting Lord Aberdeen's or Secretary Birrell's name with the theft.

**WATCHES DOCTOR CUT AROUND HIS HEART**

Redding, Cal., May 19.—In one of the most remarkable exhibitions of nerve in the history of surgery, Constable Tim Foley flirted with death while surgeons cut around his heart to open a sack of puss.

While the steady hand of the surgeon brought the sharp knife close to his vital organ Foley chatted with him and the nurses who were astounded by the patient's courage. Foley had refused to be put under the influence of an anaesthetic. It was found that the bullet fired by Deputy Constable Littlefield Saturday morning had nipped a corner from the apex of the heart. The operation gave the patient such relief that he fell asleep immediately afterward. Foley refuses to make a dying statement, because he insists that he will live. The surgeons, however, entertain little hopes for his recovery.
