TO OPEN RANGES TO SHEEP

The sheepmen of Umatilla county will be permitted to turn their sheep into the forest reserves on June 1, according to information received by Attorney Dan P. Smythe from Supervisor Ireland of the Wenaha national forest service.

This action is the result of a determined fight which the sheepmen of Umatilla and Morrow counties have been waging for the past three months to get their bands upon the summer grazing lands as quickly as possible.

The Wenaha reserve, which will be opened for a certainty on June 1, will accommodate several hundred thousand head of sheep. This reserve is in a more advanced condition this year than the Blue mountain forest lands. The inspector has made a thorough examination of the grazing lands and has found them in a satisfactory condition.

PORTLAND FESTIVAL OF ROSES

SALEM COMMITTEE COMES HOME DELIGHTED WITH THE PROSPECT—CITY WILL BE WELL REPRESENTED.

The special committee appointed by the board of trade to look after a demonstration for Salem at the Rose Festival to be held in Portland from June 2nd to 7th, has returned from a day spent with the general committees in that city.

Messrs. H. H. Olinger, H. W. Meyers, C. H. Hinges, and D. A. Dinsmore were the committee who represented the Cherry City and they came home enthusiastic boosters for the Rose Festival. They spent several hours on the grounds among the floats being built for that occasion and they could not adequately express themselves in their admiration for what is being done to push this greatest event of the Pacific Northwest.

It is not yet fully determined what particular part Salem will take in the event but she will be represented in every department, particularly will our city make a showing in the automobile parade on the afternoon of the third day, when it is proposed that the owners of machines in our city shall club together and let the world at large know that we are on the map.

Below is given a program of the six days' festivities, which will undoubtedly outrank everything of the kind ever known in its line.

Monday, June 1. Noon—Arrival at high noon of Rex Oregonians and court. Calvaede escort through decorated streets and arches to Royal palace.

Evening—Feast of lanterns and general illumination; Coast Admen's Rose banquet.

Tuesday, June. Afternoon—Opening of the competitive rose exhibit at the Oriental building.

Evening—Illuminated parade "Spirit of the Golden West."

Wednesday, June 3. 10 a. m.—Monster prize parade of floral decorated automobiles.

Evening—Venetian Water Carnival procession of illuminated public and private craft; all-day free exhibit of rare blooms by Rose society at Oriental building. Damosch concerts in evening at Armory.

Thursday, June 4. 10 a. m.—Magnificent street parade of floral decorated vehicles, competitive floats, equestrian clubs, etc., including the marvelous Japanese "Cherry Blossom" procession.

Afternoon—100-mile automobile race, 50-mile automobile race.

Evening—East side street carnival of masqueraders and children's parade. Damosch concerts at Armory, afternoon and evening.

Friday, June 5. Morning—Business houses' reception to Portland visitors.

Evening—Allegorical and historical parade of electric floats, including "Chinese Dragon"; grand ball at Armory.

Saturday, June 6. Morning—Regatta on the river; crews from Victoria, Vancouver and the University of Washington will compete.

Noon—Grand parade of Woodmen of the World.

Afternoon—P. N. A. championship field meet at Multnomah field; relay races for high schools and public schools of the Northwest; valuable trophies to be presented for each event.

Evening—Pyrotechnics and masqueraders' farewell to Reg Oregonians and Queen Flora.

The Rose Festival committee will have offices at 515 Sweetland building, where a regular information bureau is to be maintained. Persons wishing lodgings during the Festival can secure the same without trouble by addressing this committee. Rooms will be at the regular price, all the way from 75c to \$5 per day, and no extra charge will be made for securing them through this source.
