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REPUBLICANS WILL NOT BE STAMPEDED.

The Republicans of Oregon will not be stampeded away from Candidate Cake by the Portland Journal so easily as it imagines.

It has a perfect right as a Democratic paper to do all in its power FOR THE SUCCESS OF GOVERNOR CHAMBERLAIN.

But it has no right to attack Candidate Cake as not being true to the principle of popular election of senators.

Mr. Cake took his stand fairly and squarely FOR THE PRINCIPLE when the machine leaders were trying to commit the entire party organization against Statement No. 1, AND DIRECT ELECTION OF SENATORS.

He went out and made a clean-cut, fair and square campaign FOR THAT PRINCIPLE, devoid of personalities, and he has never wavered in his support of that principle.

Mr. Cake engaged in no personal abuse OF EITHER MR. FULTON OR MR. CHAMBERLAIN. He won the nomination for his stand for direct election and for his valiant championship of the Roosevelt administration.

Mr. Cake went farther and said if Mr. Chamberlain was the choice of the people his name would not go before the legislature and he would insist that he be made senator BECAUSE IT WAS THE LAW AND WAS RIGHT.

The Republicans who are Republicans from principle and who have for years advocated election of senators by direct vote of the people rejoice that under the leadership of men like Cake THEIR PARTY WILL BE MADE TO RESPOND TO THE POPULAR WILL instead of machine dictation.

If Mr. Cake is not the choice of a majority of the people in June, the same principle will demand that Governor Chamberlain be made senator by the legislature.

Republicans who stand for the principle of direct election recognize that Mr. Cake WON HIS NOMINATION FAIRLY ON REFORM PRINCIPLES and that he is therefore entitled to their votes in June.

Republicans should not be stampeded into defeating a man who stands for clean progressive reform principles within the party.

IT WOULD BE ALWAYS MADE AN ARGUMENT AGAINST THE REPUBLICAN PARTY to defeat a man who stands for direct election of senators.

Republicans cannot afford to allow themselves to be driven to defeat as clean a man as Cake at the dictation of a Democratic paper.

Defeat of Cake by Republicans means defeat of the principle, and defeat of the principle means the defeat of Chamberlain by a Republican legislature.

There is danger that, if after a square, manly campaign for the principle of direct election of senators Cake is defeated, the people will have given notice THAT THEY HAVE ABANDONED THE GREAT MAJORITY PARTY and have abandoned the principle, it would mean the defeat of Chamberlain by the legislature.

The true position of the reform press of the state is to stand by the principle, which is above party, and place Chamberlain and Cake on equal terms before the people, LET THEM CHOOSE AND THEN DEMAND THAT WHOEVER IS CHOSEN BY THE PEOPLE SHALL BE ELECTED BY THE PEOPLE. Argument Against University of Oregon Appropriation.

Ed. Journal: At the debate a few nights ago in McMinnville County Treasurer Foster gave a few figures which were not fully understood by all present. One of our citizens has requested a statement more in detail. The reply is given below:

"In compliance with your request I send you the statement in regard to the proposed U. of O. appropriation and the comparative figures.

"The total amount of state tax levied this year is \$1,150,000.00. The U. of O. appropriation \$125,000.00 or 5-45 of the entire levy (5-45 would equal 1-9), for convenience we will call it 1-9 which is very near correct. That would leave 8-9 of the entire state levy with which to run the Agricultural college, all the Normal schools, the reform school, the school for the blind, the deaf mute school, the penitentiary, the insane asylum, the salaries and expenses of all the state officers, the salaries of the supreme court judges and all the circuit judges and prosecuting attorneys, the expenses of the legislature—in fact 8-9 of this appropriation is supposed to be ample for all the expenses of the state except the U. of O. And its friends tell us it must close its doors unless it receives 1-8 of as much as is required to pay all the expenses of the state government.

It is true that the state government has other sources of revenue besides this state tax levy; but the U. of O. also has other revenues.

"Yamhill county's apportionment of the state tax this year as apportioned by the state board is \$44,945.00. If Yamhill county pays this tax and the U. of O. appropriation carries, Yamhill county will pay \$4,887.28 this year for the support of the U. of O. Yamhill county's payment for the support of the state agricultural college is \$977.50 annually." Yours respectfully,

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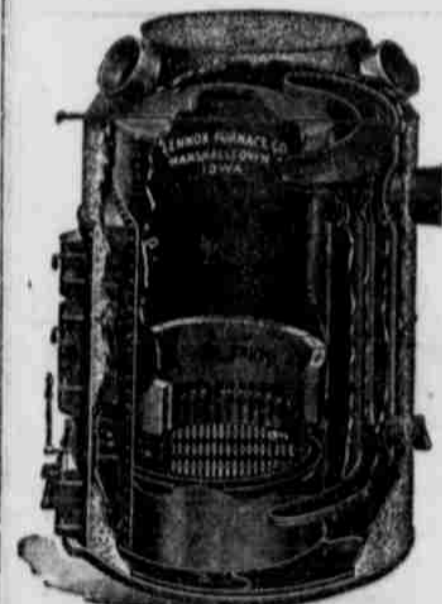
