TO RUSH WORK ON STATE ST.

City Engineer Parrott formally took charge of the paving on State street this morning, and from this time forward he will superintend personally all the work to be done by the Warren Construction company. As large a force of men as weather conditions permitted have been working on State street for the past week, and Mayor Rodgers stated this morning that the force would be increased as soon as the rain ceases. Before any of the surface can be laid the foundations of the pavement must be perfectly dry.

It is the intention of Parrott to rush the work to completion at the earliest possible date. The presence of the city engineer in the future may also put a stop to some of the waste of valuable material which has been going on. Mayor Rodgers said this morning that under their contract the construction company were obliged to haul the dirt from the street to any point which the city designated, within six blocks of where the construction work was going on. The mayor says that the dirt should have been hauled and dumped into the fill at the South Commercial street bridge, but that instead, most of it had been used to fill large hollows in the streets in front of private property in the vicinity of the construction work.

The dirt that is being delivered to the wrong places is worth 35 cents a load to the city, the city having recently paid that price for the dirt excavated from the basement of the new Breyman building. The council has voted to spend \$800 for dirt for the fill on South Commercial street, and the mayor thinks the price of dirt is too high to have it scattered about in front of private dwellings.

SUPREME COURT DECISIONS

Three decisions were handed down by the supreme court Tuesday. The case of R. D. Hume, of Curry county, who was convicted in the circuit court of that county for canning salmon without a license, was affirmed by Justice Moore. Judge Eakin affirmed the decision of Judge Barnett in the case of the state vs. Luper, who was convicted of perjury, and the case of Hough vs. Porter in connection with the water rights in Lake county was affirmed in part, and in part continued for argument.

R. D. Hume was convicted of the crime of canning salmon without first having obtained a license, alleged to have been committed in Curry county on July 18 1907. He appealed from the judgment of the county court, assigning as error the action of the court in overruling a demurrer to the information, and interposed on the ground that the facts stated therein did not constitute the commission of crime. The law in the matter is as follows: "Any person in this state in the business of canning salmon in hermetically sealed tins is required to pay a license fee, varying in amount from \$100 to \$1,500, depending upon the number of cases of such fish which the canner packed during the year preceeding the season for which a license is required." Judge Moore decided that the act of Hume in canning the salmon without having obtained a license was a crime, and that no error was committed in overruling the demurrer.

T. J. Luper was tried before Judge Burnett in the circuit court of Marion county, and convicted of perjury. On July 3, 1906, Luper appeared before attorney Carey F. Martin and made out the necessary papers to begin a suit for divorce against his wife, who, he claimed, had deserted him. The charge against Luper says that in his complaint he "willfully, knowingly, feloniously and corruptly deposed and swore before the notary that all the matters and facts contained in the complaint were true." It was proved afterwards that practically none of the facts and matters sworn to were true, and Luper was convicted of perjury. The case has been appealed twice. In the first appeal the decision of the circuit court was reversed, and the case remanded for retrial. At the second trial Luper was again convicted, and Judge Eakin in his decision today sustains the decision of the lower court.

The case of Anne C. Hough et al. vs. S. A. D. Porter et al., which was appealed from the decision of Judge King of the circuit court of Lake county, was affirmed in part, and continued for argument in part. The suit, which is a very long and complicated one, was instituted on April 14, 1900, by Marion Conley and Anne Hough against Porter to restrain him from interfering with the waters of Silver creek in Lake county, which flowed onto the premises of the plaintiff. The court ordered all parties who were affected to be brought into court and testify. There were about 50 persons concerned, and about half of them were not satisfied with the decision of the court, and appealed. "The opinion of the supreme court on this case holds this to be within the discretionary powers of the court and that no error was committed by requiring all to be brought in and made parties who claimed an interest in the waters in question, and that it is the rule under the statute that any and all persons claiming an interest in the subject matter in controversy adversely to a plaintiff may be made parties by the person bringing the suit, if he desires, and that if such is not done the court may in its discretion, require all persons claiming an interest in the stream in litigation to be made parties; and also settles the practice that numerous defendants may interplead in respect to each other and have all their rights settled in one suit, announcing a rule of practice whereby this may be done." "These were the main points of contention when the case was argued and presented to the supreme court. After disposing of them adversely to the contentions of appellants, the court calls attention to the difficulties of adjusting the rights under the doctrine of riparian rights, and intimates that if the case must turn upon that question it may become necessary to remand it for further testimony on many points; but that while it appears conceded that all the lands are riparian that since the lands were all entered since the date of the desert land act, it is doubtful if they can be termed riparian for the purpose of irrigation, but this and other points incidental thereto not having been argued, the opinion states that it is a question of such vast importance to the litigants, some of whom did not appear in the appellate court by counsel that a re-argument of the case becomes necessary on this and other points involved, including the question as to the respective claims of some as prior appropriators, and accordingly directs that a re-argument be had in the supreme court
