

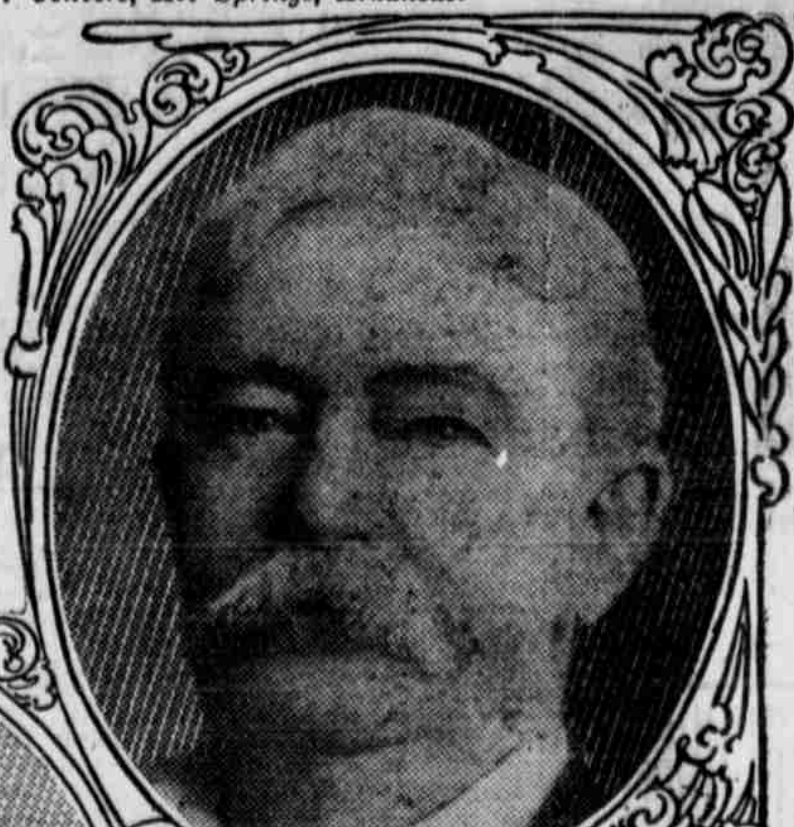

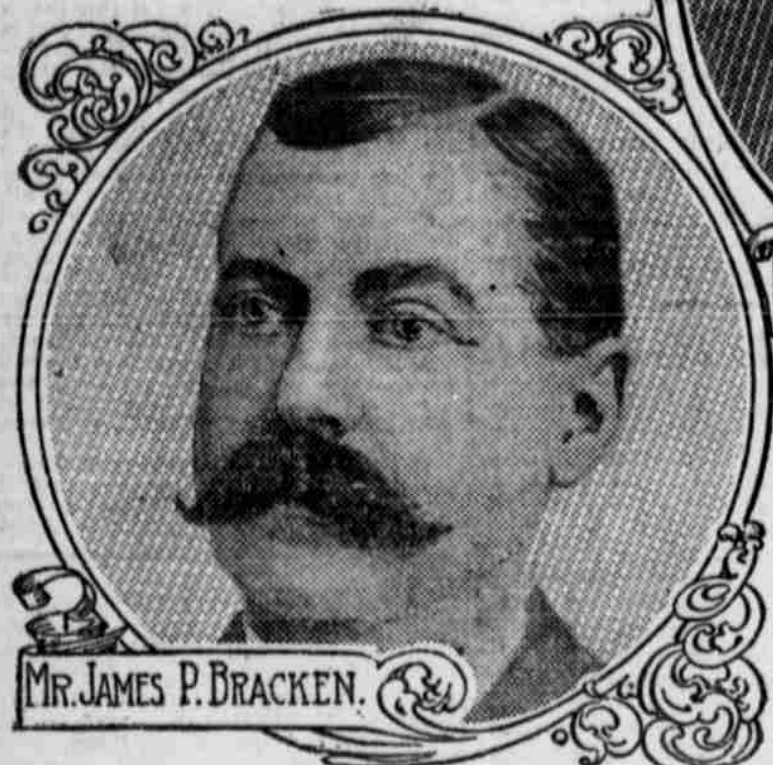

## LILLEY ROASTED

played by the Connecticut congressman in the controversy and a complete vindication of the boat company and Congressman Loud.  
Representative Lilley is arraigned for allowing himself to be used as an "instrument of the Lake Submarine Company" and charges him with "acting in bad faith, violating his obligation as a member" and "acting in contempt of the house." The committee finds that the introduction of the resolution asking for an investigation of his charges was not introduced in good faith by Lilley; that he acted in bad faith in making them and that in stating that he made no charges reflecting upon the members of the house he was not sincere.  
The report further charges him with violating his obligation in formulating and urging before the committee groundless charges against Congressman Loud, of Michigan; that he acted in bad faith when he allowed his clerk to send letters reflecting on the honor and integrity of members of the house and that he acted in contempt for not disavowing the letter published over his signature reflecting on the honor and integrity of members of the house. In destroying a forged letter from his secretary to Frank L. Edinborough, of Bay City, Mich., relative to the Loud incident instead of delivering it to the committee, Lilley is also held to have acted in contempt.  
The committee finds that Lilley's object in making the charges was in reality a "propaganda" in behalf of the Lake company, which sought to defeat the clause in the naval appropriation bill favoring the Electric company. Lilley's charges that excessive profits were being made in submarine contracts are declared to be based on fictitious figures, and that Lilley knew the charges to be false when he made them.  
The committee finds that no press correspondent, naval official, member of congress or campaign committee had been corrupted by the Electric company and Lilley is scored for refusing to testify at the beginning of the investigation without the aid of counsel.  
Continuing the report says:  
"His request that he be allowed to dictate the selection of counsel and the mode of procedure of the committee was not only extraordinary but unprecedented. Though Mr. Lilley asserted that he did not know Mr. Neff, of the Lake company, it was subsequently proved that they were intimate friends. Mr. Neff had been holding daily conferences with Mr. Lilley beginning with the night of the introduction of the resolution and was helping him to prepare his case. It must have been difficult for Mr. Lilley to forget his conference with Mr. Neff on Feb. 10, 1908, immediately after the action of the naval

committee. It has been shown that Mr. Lilley went down in one of the Lake company's boats with Mr. Neff the previous summer and that one night of the same summer Mr. Neff at his hotel in Waterbury dictated a telegram to Secretary of Navy Mears in the interest of the Lake company. It needs no argument to show the logical sequence of events that tell the history of what led up to and constituted the propaganda which was designed, as indicated in the frank admission of Simon Lake to educate the members of congress to the point or recognizing the merits of the Lake type of boat.  
"By stating on his honor and responsibility as a member of this house that he had information not based on hearsay requiring an investigation respecting the conduct of his colleagues he invoked the entire machinery of the house to institute proceedings against a private corporation. The gravity of his offense is apparent. Six months prior to the introduction of the resolution Mr. Lilley was doing everything in his power to help the Lake company and after the introduction of the resolution, the Lake company, through its officers and agents was doing everything in its power to help Mr. Lilley.  
"The committee does not doubt that the purpose of the resolution was not to secure an investigation, but legislation. Mr. Lilley never made any calculation on an investigation for the verification of facts, but used fictitious figures without question. He did not inquire concerning them of a friend of Congressman Hobson who was in a position to inform him about them. He requested that certain naval officers be examined and then refused to take their word. It is characteristic of Mr. Lilley's attitude that when he learned that his suspicions of Mr. Loud were groundless he has never to this time expressed gratification at the removal of the cloud or made an apology or given an expression of regret that he should have made an unwarranted attack upon the honor and good name of a fellow member."  
No recommendation is contained in the report.  
**Lilley Silent.**  
Waterbury, Conn., May 20.—Representative Lilley refused to make any lengthy comment on the committee's report, declaring that he could not in justice to himself discuss it until after he had carefully read its contents and consulted his lawyers. "The most serious and painful affect it has on me is the reflection on my personal honor," he said.  
"However, those who know me will not need an explanation. There is nothing in my private or public record that justified these reflections."

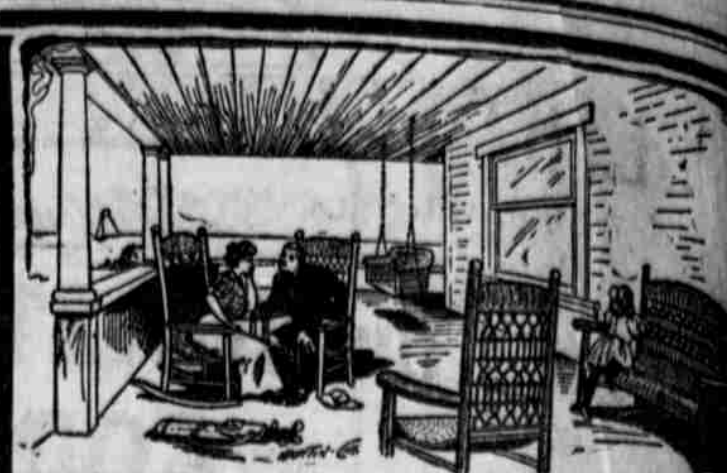
## SMILES

# IS RIPE IN INDIA MILLION STARVING

BAD OUTLOOK—10,000,000 MAY STARVE IF CROPS FAILS—LIVING SKELETONS—FEW PEAS DAY'S FOOD.

London, May 20.—The Manchester Dispatch's correspondent at Simla draws a dreadful picture of the sufferings of the famine stricken natives of India. He says that a million people are on the verge of starvation and points out such a condition of affairs when the winter crops have just been garnered is proof that a much worse state is looming in the near future and before the Indian corn is ripened the government of India may be faced with ten million of starving people.  
Continuing, the correspondent says: "The whole economic question of life in India presents no parallel in Europe. Eighth-tenths of the enormous population is dependent upon local cereal product to make both ends meet in the year. As a consequence the slightest failure of crops plunges the lower stratum into a state of absolute penury. Added to this there is an enormous population of professional beggars.  
"I do not believe that anybody in England who has not had experience of an Indian famine has the slightest comprehension of what death by starvation means. It is not a sudden death caused by the cutting off of the food supply. It is a long, lingering course of training to die. It must be remembered that the majority of the people who come upon famine relief have for months before been living on half or quarter rations. A mere handful of parched peas will have been the daily portion of a family for months. I have seen hundreds of men, women and children who have dragged themselves to the aid depots in such a condition that they are veritable skeletons, with the skin stretched taut over the bones."

Rain fell on almost every day in the western counties, while in the eastern counties rains were also frequent, though the recorded amount were much smaller. A particularly heavy rain fell over the lower Willamette and lower Columbia river valleys on Friday. In the eastern portion of the state considerable snow fell in the higher altitudes. Light frosts occurred in southern Oregon on Tuesday morning, and heavy frosts in eastern Oregon on Wednesday, Thursday and Sunday mornings.
