THE LOCAL OPTION LAW AND PROHIBITION.

This paper opposed the local option law at the time it was adopted on the ground that it was not what it purported to be—real local option.

We charged that it was a prohibition law, with very unfair provisions TO BRING ABOUT PROHIBITION CONDITIONS IN THE NAME OF LOCAL OPTION.

Its champions said it was really and truly a local option measure under which each community could enjoy the royal American privilege of local self-government in the matter of dealing with the liquor traffic.

The Capital Journal then pointed out that the law had a number of very unfair provisions that were calculated to put a BURDEN AND EXPENSE UPON THE COMMUNITY.

This was all conceded by Counsel Chas. Corby in his argument in the Sublimity and Jefferson petition cases before Judge Galloway.

Mr. Corby very frankly and fairly stated that the local option law was not what its name purported—but was purely a prohibition act AND WAS TO BE SO CONSTRUED.

He contended that there were no provisions in the law but such as were intended to benefit Prohibitionists.

He showed that the law was drawn by Prohibitionists and should be construed IN THEIR FAVOR AND FOR THEIR BENEFIT.

He said it was got up by the ministers and worked like a whip-saw—it cut one way and that was for prohibition.

The Capital Journal wishes to thank Judge Corby for his honesty and frankness IN TELLING THE TRUTH ABOUT THIS LAW.

Let everybody understand that in voting for it they are voting for a most stringent one-sided prohibition measure.

If Marion county votes against this law, as it probably will, and the local option advocates carry this city of Salem dry, SALEM WILL BE UNDER A PROHIBITION LAW, AND NOT UNDER LOCAL OPTION.

If we had Prohibition officials to enforce the law, Prohibition juries to try the cases, and Prohibition judges to construe its provisions, it might be enforced.

But in the absence of all the executive and judicial and administrative machinery, SUCH A LAW WOULD BE A FARCE IN THIS CITY.

We know that with the rest of the county wet, and Salem dry, liquor would be shipped in here, illegal sales and illicit distribution would take place here on a large scale.

The city would lose the revenues and its government WOULD LOSE ALL CONTROL OF THE TRAFFIC, while there would be a county government and the great body of the people of the county opposed to its enforcement.

It is easy for the average local option advocate to get up in his pulpit and MAKE OUT A CASE AGAINST THE SALOONS.

But the advocate never allows the facts about the other side to come out—THE FAILURE OF LOCAL OPTION.

They do not allow their hearers to know that in Lane county there are 96 government retail licenses to

sell liquor against \$9 when the county was wet.

They do not tell their hearers that Lane county has spent over \$15,000 trying to enforce local option and has made an utter failure.

They know that the cities in Lane county voted against local option but the country precludes FORCED IT ONTO THE CITIES THAT CANNOT ENFORCE THE LAW.

Judge Corby's statement that it is not a local option law, but a prohibition law, which is utterly impractical, will open the eyes of many sensible people.

KILL MOST OF THEM.

The people are not so anarchistic and iconoclastic as the Oregonian would intimate but they will kill most of the proposed new laws.

That the initiative and referendum have been abused no one can doubt, and the best remedy for the abuses is to enact no proposed new law but as last resort.

Vote against the official free pass bill and a lot more of the so-called legislation.

There are freak measures proposed by the legislature as well as by the so-called People's Power league, and Tax Reform league.

With the direct primary law and the initiative and referendum the people have plenty of power reserved to them.

Do we really need the single tax and woman suffrage, and a host of other things?

The progress and evolution of American politics is along the line of destroying one-man power and enthroning ideas.

Bossism and machine methods founded upon bossism have got to go. IT IS THE EDICT OF INTELIGENCE.

God said "Let there be light," and with increasing light and intelligence the people gain power.

As the people gain power the boss must give way TO THE RULE OF THE MANY.

Formerly the bosses slated candidates—the Abe Ruefs and Harvey Scotts and Jack Matthews.

Under the Oregon direct primary a candidate must go to the people for a place on the ticket, INSTEAD OF THE MACHINE BOSS.

Under the old system a candidate for the United States senate or congress or a state office had to get permission from the Portland bosses, or the Eugene bosses, or the Salem bosses.

A candidate might have all the newspapers in the state back of him, if he did not have the organ of the boss HE COULD NOT GET ON TO THE TICKET.

That is why the machine and the bosses fight the direct primary law and Statement No. 1.

That is why the people uphold these weapons for THE DESTRUCTION OF MACHINE BOSSISM AND MACHINE GRAFT.

Under the direct primary law the machine cannot graft the candidates nor the corporations.

Under the direct primary law no machine or combination CAN DICTATE TO A MEMBER OF THE LEGISLATURE.

Candidates get their nominations from the people and make their record to the people.

Formerly candidates for the legislature got their nomination from the machine and made their record UNDER MACHINE DICTATION.

Most of the bosses and machine managers are sore at the direct primary because it turns down the kind of men they have upheld.

The direct primary gives the people a square chance TO HIT THE GRAFTER WHERE HE LIVES.

Direct legislation gives the people a square chance to hit the grafts.

Study the direct primary carefully and see if on second trial of the law any good and deserving officials have been rejected by the people.

In Marion county a good set of county officers has been renominated and ARE RUNNING WITHOUT OPPOSITION.

The same will be true of state officials in the future. A good senator or congressman can hold his job.

Perkins in centerfield is distinguishing himself this year, having accepted every chance so far offered him and is also doing some good stek work.
