Memorial Day Program. Among the changes in the observance of Memorial Day from the custom of the past will be that of asking the school children to carry flowers to the cemetery on the morning of that day and deposit them on the soldiers' graves with their own hands. This they can easily do as each soldier's grave will be marked by a small flag.

It has been suggested that it would be a beautiful and gracious thing to do, for the ladies of Salem who carry flowers to the cemetery on Memorial Day to place a few upon the grave of some old soldier. Soldier's graves can be readily identified as each will be designated by a small American flag.

Successful Negro Actors and Theaters.

"It is not short of astonishing, indeed, to discover how far the negro has been able to develop in the 40-odd years since slavery a distinct race spirit and position. It is pretty well known that he has been going into business; that he has been acquiring much land; that he has many professional men; that he worships in his own churches and has many schools which he conducts—but in other lines of activity he is also getting a foothold. Just as an illustration: I was surprised at finding so many negro theaters in the country—theaters not only owned or operated by negroes, but presenting plays written and acted by negroes. I saw a fine negro theater in New Orleans; I visited a smaller colored theater in Jackson, Miss., and in Chicago the Peking theater is an enterprise wholly conducted by negroes. Williams and Walker, negro comedians, have long amused large audiences, both white and colored. Their latest production, 'Bandaanna Land,' written and produced wholly by negroes, is not only funny but clean.

"Many other illustrations could be given to show how the negro is developing in one way or another, but especially along racial lines. The extensive organization of negro lodges of Elks and Masons and other secret orders, many of them with clubhouses might be mentioned. Attention might be called to the almost innumerable insurance societies and companies maintained by negroes, the largest of which, The True Reformers, of Richmond, has over 50,000 members, and to the growth of negro newspapers and magazines (there are now over 200 in the country), but enough has been said, perhaps, to make the point that there has been a real development of a negro spirit and self-consciousness."—Ray Stannard Baker in American Magazine.

OFFICER OF ARMY MISSING

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, May 21.—The disappearance of Captain Samuel D. McAllister, of the Thirty-eighth company of the coast artillery, has caused a tremendous sensation at the Presidio. It is probable that if he returns he will be tried before a court-martial.

JUMPS OFF OF TOWER

(United Press Leased Wire.) St. Petersburg, May 21.—Madame Merder, wife of General Merder, whose father was the most intimate friend of Czar Alexander II, has committed suicide at Tzarskoe Selo under very tragic circumstances.

Madame Merder's 17-year-old daughter recently was taken ill at Paris and was removed to her house at Tzarskoe Selo, suffering from inflammation of the lungs. The doctors gave up all hope of her recovery and this preyed on the mind of the mother who declared she could not survive her daughter. (United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, May 21.—In true border style, a lone robber held up an Ocean Beach car at 1 o'clock this morning.
