ANNON DENIES CHARGES

Active Under General Denunciation, House "Czar" Denies Charge of Being Legislative Despot.

Washington, D. C., May 21.—(By correspondent to the Associated Press.)—"I have just received from a close inspection of the enemy's big piece of 'ordnance' in the capitol, 'Cannon's' mouth, and live to the tale. 'And I have made a remarkable discovery. Even a porcupine has at least on vulnerable point. It is a soft spot near the bump of self-esteem and 'popularity' is the missile that finds it."

Speaker Cannon tires of posing as "Czar." "Uncle Joe," the speaker of the house of representatives, does not like to be called a czar. He has reached the point where he does not want the public to believe that he is an obstructionist and he controls legislative action in the house.

When I called upon Speaker Cannon at once stoutly denied that he was responsible for the non-action of the committees of the house bills that the public demand.

The speaker's political philosophy summed up in a few very pointed remarks which should be preserved for reference. Some of his characteristic expressions were as follows:

You Prohibitionists have decided that I am a czar. All of your papers all over the country declare that I am responsible for the failure of your pet schemes. It is a misrepresentation of the facts.

I do not interfere with committees at all. I am in favor of the Knox bill. Go over to the senate and have your bill passed. I would like very much to see it become a law.

I am opposed to common carriers having any right to traffic in liquor in defiance of state laws. It is not part of their business, that is as far as I care to go. I am in favor of high license. High license is not partnership with the devil.

High license is in a sense limited prohibition. I am older than you and I believe that I have learned by experience that high license brings the worst results.

Some of you Prohibitionists would stop the manufacture as well as the sale. You cannot go that far. You cannot prevent a man from drinking it for his personal use.

I paraded when I was a young man in Indiana with the cadets and belonged to the Sons of Temperance when Indiana was under prohibition but the supreme court knocked out the law and it was a good thing for the people that it was knocked out.

You must get sentiment behind prohibition law before it can be passed and there is not sentiment

In the country today to stand behind and enforce prohibition.

"It is a work of evolution. Try to Shift the Responsibility.

After discussing the pending measures affecting the liquor traffic, Speaker Cannon declared that the whole trouble was with the senate, not the house, and that until we have secured the passage of the measures we advocated in the senate neither the house nor its presiding officer should be held responsible for the delay.

The speaker intimated that he would not oppose legislation if it passed the senate but for the house to take the initiative was another question.

"I had expected that the speaker of the house of representatives of the United States would give me some argument in favor of the license system that would be new but the same reasons that are heard from the man who wishes to sell come from all of his defenders. There is this, however, about the speaker's statements; he apparently favors prohibition in two ways: (1) By high license, and (2) by a strong sentiment in its favor. I presume that we can get the last kind of prohibition when the defenders of the saloon cannot help themselves. The first kind we know is a failure."
