public houses at the instigation of the landlords. A short time ago in a South London "pub" a laborer, for a "purse" offered by the publican, ate 30 half-penny buns and drank four quarts of ale within a given time. It is scarcely a matter of surprise that medical aid had to be summoned after the feat.

In another "pub" in Rotherhithe drinking competitions were for a long time a source of attraction, matches being arranged to see which man could drink the most in the shortest time. The contests, however, resulted in such drunken scenes that at last the police stopped them.

Boxing clubs and ratting clubs are established by many landlords for the benefit of customers; and there is one landlord known to the writer who frequently turns his four-ale bar into a rat pit. A square is made with the forms on which the customers sit, a rat let loose from a trap, and the guv'nor is generally ready to lay "half a thick 'un" (10 shillings) that his terrier will kill the rat in 15 seconds. And he seldom loses his bet.

Public-house museums are not new, but there are two—one in Camberwell and another at New Cross, London—which people travel a long way to see. Splendid collections of stuffed birds, animals, fishes, etc., are to be seen at both public houses, as well as a perfect armory of old-fashioned weapons. In addition, at one of these public houses canaries may be seen flying above the bars in hanging aviaries.

How many people, by the way, remember the old game of "bumble puppy"? Boys still play it with a piece of wood in the edge of which a number of holes have been cut and through which marbles are bowled. Each hole is numbered from one upward according to the hole through which the marble goes, so the bowler receives that number of marbles from the one holding the wood. This game was as popular in public houses at one time as darts and skittles. The wood was fixed to one part of the counter and the marbles were about one and a half to two inches in diameter. So far as the writer's knowledge goes, there is only one of the fixed "bumble puppy" boards in London, and that is to be seen in a Hammersmith public house. This particular board is said to be over 100 years old and is a source of much interest and amusement to customers.—London Tit-Bits.

Effects of Forest Depletion in Smyrna.

The disappearance of the forest in this country, especially in the vilayet of Smyrna, has been marked by greater degrees of heat and cold. The date palm has practically become extinct in these parts. In the winter and spring there are usually floods, which are destructive to life, property and crops. In the summer there is not sufficient moisture in the soil of many districts, for the reason that the rain passes away at once down woodless ravines, without being absorbed by the ground. As a result large tracts have become sterile. Creeks and brooks which formerly retained considerable water, even in the heat of summer, are now completely dried up a few weeks after the spring rains. These same creeks and brooks are becoming deeper each year by the process of floods, so that not only is the surface of the country greatly disfigured, but no bridges can be built strong enough to withstand the annual rush of waters. It is becoming impossible to get the crops and fruits to market at the proper time.

Crop failures and famine in Asia Minor may therefore be traced to the lack of forests. The past year serves as a good example. The rains of January, 1907, were the heaviest known in this vilayet during several seasons. The floods everywhere in the Hermus and Meander valleys were greater than for 40 years. Cold weather set in soon afterward, and for three weeks the thermometer stood at five degrees Fahrenheit above zero. The unpicked orange crop, ripe at that time was destroyed and the effects are being felt this season by a great shortage in oranges. Nearly every pepper tree in this vilayet was killed. There is a grain famine throughout Asia minor, and wheat and barley, ordinarily products of export from this vilayet, are not now allowed to be sent out of the country. In other words, a country which usually produces not only sufficient grain for its own use, but large quantities for export, is now compelled to purchase these products in the markets of other countries.—Consular report.
