

DR. CLARENCE TRUE WILSON ON WOMAN SUFFRAGE

The question is not whether the women have a right to vote, but it is whether we have a right to compel them all to vote at the dictation of a very small minority of their own number. It is certain the vast majority of our women do not wish the ballot. The laws for the protection of women are improving steadily with the years and every interest of hers is as well safeguarded as that of any man. If you wish to protect the rights of women, ask yourself today, does my wife want to vote, does my sister, does my mother claim it to be her privilege? If they do not, what right have I to compel them to do it by my ballot?

But it is said we need the ballot of woman to aid us in government. But is it expedient? Will society be improved by the granting of the ballot to women? Will the better element of women come to the front as political workers and fill our offices, or will the worse? Which is the better element of women? The quiet and unassuming queens of our homes, our mothers, sisters, wives and sweethearts, or will politics be controlled by the clubwomen? This is not an untried experiment. Four states have given the ballot to women unconditionally, and after 30 years of women's voting, politics has not arrived at the moral standard of

our own state, in Wyoming, Colorado, Idaho or Utah. But you say, "There are not as many women as men in Wyoming." Yes, but in Utah women are so plentiful that seven or eight of them club together and keep one husband between them, and with this numerous company they have not closed saloons, or closed the brothels, or prevented gambling dens, or purified politics. Indeed, there are not four states in our Union where politics is so corrupt as in the four states where women vote. It is a sad picture where a man, for the sake of office, sells his integrity, but it is a sadder, and a common sight, in the states where women vote, to see women sell their virtue for offices.

Can Give Specific Incidents.
I can give specific incidents with names, places and dates, where women, desiring to be assistant county clerks, etc., are sent from the candidates' office to the political boss to there offer her all at the shrine of a man, who, but for politics, would not be allowed to enter her home. In every woman's suffrage state, the proverb has had a double emphasis that "Politics makes strange companions."

If you wish to prevent such conditions in Oregon, vote "No" on the woman suffrage amendment on June 1st.

WEATHER EFFECT ON TOOTHACHE

After all there is scientific basis for the old rhyme: "Coming storms on shooting corns presage, Your aches will throb, your hollow tooth will rage."

It's the low barometric pressure that sets the aches "to throb" and "the hollow teeth to rage." Professor Cox, the weather man, had to admit that United States Judge Beetha's rheumatic twinges were, after all, good signs of rain, and so he explained scientifically what caused it, thus: "When there is a lower barometric pressure, the weighing down of the air is diminished, and accordingly the air in the bloodvessels and skin expands causing pain. A lower barometer always precedes rain, and this explains why rheumatism always is more painful just before a storm. When the barometer rises, the outside air becomes heavier, the pressure of the air within the body is lessened and the pain ceases." Accordingly to Professor Cox, this is the basic principle of all the old-time weather saws: "Old sinners who have all Points of compass in their joints Can by their pains and aches find All turns and changes of the wind."

Humidity has nothing whatever to do with all these "signs"; joints are just as likely to ache during a "dry low" as a "wet low" barometer; so says the weather man.
