THAW NOT HELPED BY WHISKEY

Poughkeepsie, N. Y., May 22.—Scotch whiskey administered in good sized doses to Harry Thaw just before he took the stand in the recent habeas corpus proceedings brought to effect his release from Matteawan asylum is now held responsible for his poor showing as a witness in his own behalf.

Amos T. Baker, acting superintendent of the institution, is authority for the statement that large quantities of the whiskey were smuggled into the asylum and given to Thaw. Bryan had hoped that Thomas would place him in nomination, but Mayor Dahlman of Omaha, insisted that this honor should go to Nebraska, so Bryan consented to this and the "cowboy mayor" will make the nomination speech.

The Nebraskan wanted Thomas to go to the convention as a delegate from New York, but Tammany objected to him, so Bryan has arranged to have the author sent from Missouri, his native state.

SAVED QUEEN'S LIFE RECEIVES BIG HONOR

Lisbon, May 22.—Queen Amelia has publicly honored the soldier Valente, who saved her life when King Carlos and Crown Prince Luiz Philippe were assassinated. He rushed up to the assassin as he was about to fire point blank at the queen and knocked up the barrel of his carbine.

When it became known that the leute was to be decorated thousands of people gathered outside the palace. The queen planned to take of the soldier the cross of the Order of the Tower and the Sword of the Order. Her majesty then appeared on the balcony followed by Valente, who was cheered enthusiastically and the queen pointed to him and in a voice broken by tears said:

"He saved my life."
The cross conferred on Valente carries with it a pension equal to a captain's salary.
