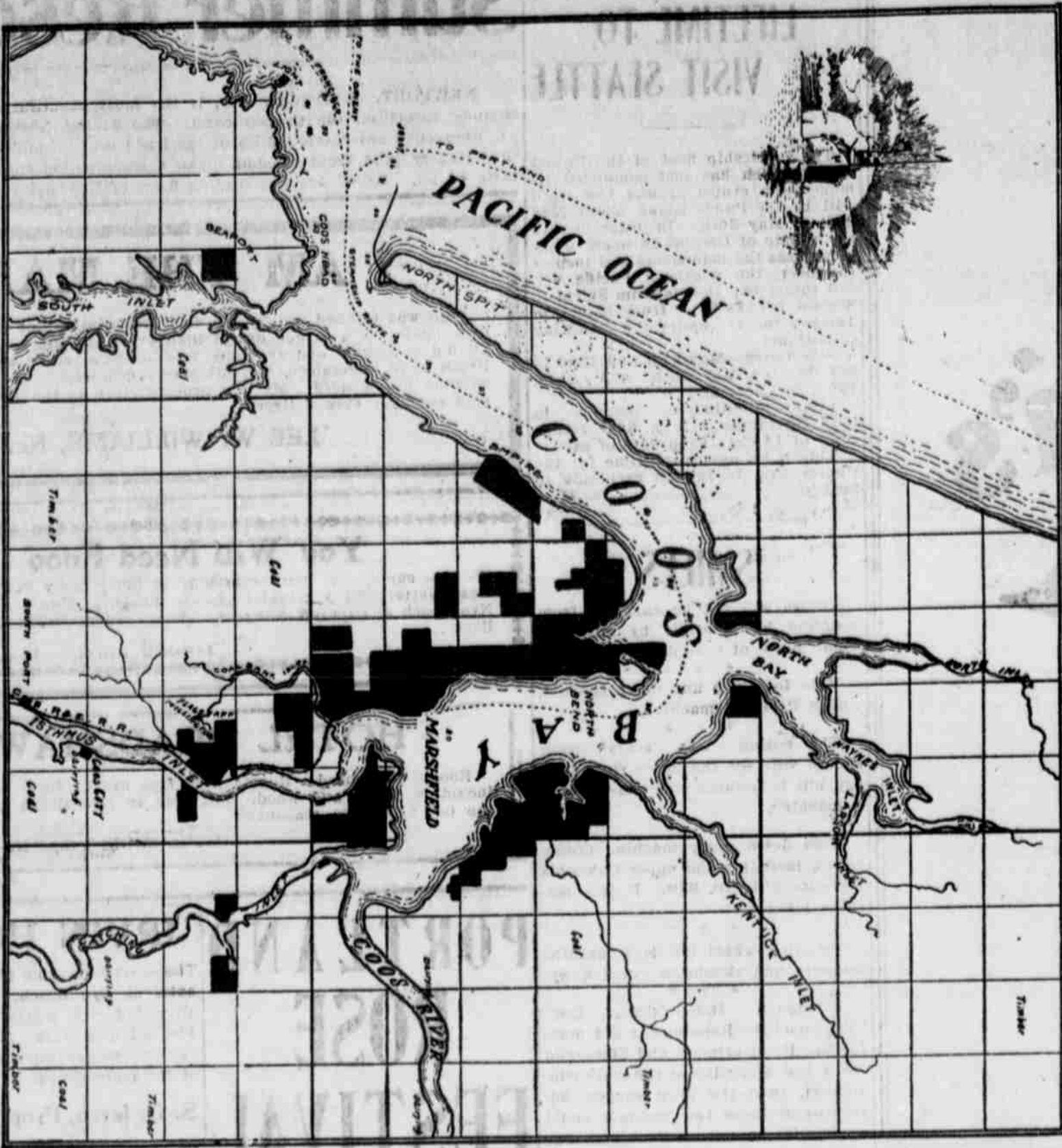


MAP OF COOS BAY FOR WHICH THE WAR DEPARTMENT HAS RECOMMENDED \$500,000 FOR HARBOR IMPROVEMENT



A Washington special says the secretary of war has sent to congress a report of the army engineers recommending an appropriation of \$500,000 for further improving the entrance to Coos Bay and the channel up to Marshfield. The engineers turned down the proposition to extend the jetty project because of its excessive cost, which they believe is not justified by present commerce, but recommended the construction of a sea-going hydraulic dredge for work on the bar at the entrance. This dredge, operating in conjunction with the dredge authorized at the last session of congress will, it

is believed, produce a channel 18 feet deep at low water clear to Marshfield, and it is the opinion of the engineers that this is ample to accommodate present commerce. It is estimated that it will cost \$60,000 annually to maintain this channel, once it is obtained. It is the opinion of Colonel Roessler, the engineer board and of the chief of engineers that Coos Bay is worthy of improvement to the extent designated, and later on it may be deemed advisable to take up the jetty project. The report shows that it would cost \$1,869,000 to extend the pres-

ent jetty 1000 feet, while to construct 2500 feet of the south jetty extending seaward from Coos Head would cost \$2,700,000. Jetty construction at Coos Bay would be exceptionally expensive because it would be necessary to put in an entire new plant and equipment and also because the sea end of the jetty would have to be built and covered with 40-ton concrete blocks. The largest rocks found in that vicinity weight only 17 tons, and are not sufficiently heavy to withstand heavy seas. In conclusion the report of the engineers says: "On account of the great cost of

the jetty work, it is thought that this may be advantageously postponed until the bar dredge has been given a fair trial and has demonstrated whether or not dredging alone will give enough depth on the bar to meet the needs of the port." Such dredges have worked successfully in other parts, and it is believed they will do so at Coos Bay. As there will be no river and harbor bill this season, there will be no congressional action on this report prior to adjournment, but it is certain that the river and harbor bill that will probably be passed next winter will provide \$500,000 for Coos Bay.

DISSOLUTION OF PARTNERSHIP FIGHT ON IN COURT

The suit for a dissolution of partnership brought by A. Andersen against Fred Kurtz, proprietor of the Kurtz meat market, was heard before Judge Galloway yesterday afternoon and taken under advisement. Andersen claims that he entered into a partnership with Kurtz on August 14, 1907, paying \$1368 for a half interest in the market. According to the terms of the agreement Andersen says that he and Kurtz was each to take \$60 a month from the receipts of the business, until the amount drawn by Andersen should equal the price paid for his half interest in the business. In his testimony Andersen said that last month Kurtz refused to continue the business with him, or to recognize the partnership. He also stated that Kurtz had already drawn \$1600 from the business, when, according to the agreement, he was thus far entitled to only \$420. Kurtz' testimony will be given late this afternoon.

DENY GRANGE AS WHOLE ENDORSED FRAZIER

Ed. Journal:—What is doubtless a paid notice appeared in the local columns of your paper recently announcing the action of Brooks Grange, No. 349, on May 16, endorsing P. L. Frazier for the office of county judge. The grange having never been accused of political trickery, the passage of this peculiar resolution has aroused some comment. The matter has been sifted down and the following facts are submitted to the public showing the resolution to have been introduced by a prominent Democrat and was engineered by a minority of the members and that the grange as a whole did not participate in this endorsement and are not at all favorable to the sentiment therein expressed. The grange at Brooks has a membership of about 80 of the substantial citizens of that locality. There were, at the meeting on May 16, at which time this resolution was passed, eight men present, three of whom were not voters and cannot vote at the coming election. One of the eight men was a resident of Gervais and does not belong to the Brooks precinct. It is generally understood that the grange does not endorse this resolution and, in fact, it is strictly against the constitution and by-laws of the grange to do so. If it were possible to call a meeting before election it would be done and a contrary sentiment incorporated into a new resolution and passed by a large majority.
