### LIFE AND PROPERTY ARE LOST

### BY TERRIBLE WIND

SEVEN THOUSAND HOMELESS AS RESULT OF FLOODS—SCORE REPORTED DROWNED—TREMENDOUS DAMAGE DONE.

Dallas, Texas, May 25.—The most violent storm of the year broke over North Texas last night. It was exceptionally severe at Fort Worth, Dallas, Wichita Falls, Denton and Abilene. Andrew Welch, a saloon keeper of North Fort Worth, whose place was inundated, was drowned in trying to escape. A 15-year-old boy who was working for Welch was also drowned. Four men were seen to be swept into Maple creek in the suburbs of Fort Worth and drowned. Efforts to learn their identity have failed. The property loss at Fort Worth and vicinity exceeds \$100,000. Wade Owens and Ernest Stalder were drowned at Mineral Wells. Six persons are reported drowned near Wichita Falls and Childress, and at Denton an unknown man lost his life in the flood. Railroads and crops have suffered largely. Two thousand more persons were driven from their homes today as the result of the rise of the Trinity river, making approximately 7000 that are now practically without shelter. Houses are being swept down and carried away by the raging stream, big factories are flooded and bridges have been torn down. Thousands of heads of livestock have perished.

### ANNA IS TO MARRY DE SAGAN

### SAYS HER LAWYER

ATTORNEY PREPARES CONTRACT WHEREBY NEITHER GETS HOLD OF THE OTHERS FINANCES.

Paris, May 25.—Madam Anna Gould will be married to Prince Helle de Sagan here June 14, according to the announcement made by Maître Cachard, Madam Gould's attorney, who is at work on the wedding contract today. The wedding will be solemnized by a civil ceremony and the ceremony of the Protestant church. The contract is to be known as the "separation of property rule" under which the prince will not get hold of the money which his cousin and predecessor Count Boni expended so freely.

### HUNDREDS ABOARD

VISITORS FLOCK TO SEATTLE TO WITNESS PARADE IN HARBOR — OHIO GOES TO SAN FRANCISCO.

### TO PROVE FIEND IS NOT DEAD

### PLAN OF MAYOR

IN ORDER TO INDICT LAMPHERI, PROSECUTOR HOPES TO SHOW THAT MRS. GUNNESS IS STILL ALIVE.

La Porte, Ind., May 25.—In making his plans to assist in the defense of Ray Lamphere, under indictment for the murder of Mrs. Belle Gunness, in whose private burying grounds 14 of her alleged victims were buried, Mayor Darrow of La Porte, today declared that he would prove that the charred body of the woman found in the ashes of the Gunness home was not that of the alleged murderer, but the remains of a young woman who disappeared a year ago. Further than this Mayor Darrow would make no statement. He said that in spite of the fact that the teeth found in the ruins have been positively identified as those of Mrs. Gunness he would offer proof that the woman did not perish in the flames.

### CONGRESS ADJOURNS SATURDAY

Washington, May 25.—Final adjournment of congress, it is now thought, will occur next Thursday. The present plan of both branches of congress has been made with a view to doing no more work than the completing of that already under way will require. In fact, the affairs of the senate and lower house are being so shaped that it is not at all improbable that adjournment may be taken a day earlier than Thursday. It is agreed that most of the remaining time will be devoted to the work of straightening out the tangle in which the reports of conference committees and involved, with the appropriation bills getting most of the attention. Not until these disputed points are settled can congress adjourn.

### HENEY'S CHAUFFEUR ARRESTED FOR SPEEDING

Oakland, Cal., May 25.—H. Crumpton, chauffeur for Francis J. Hency, was fined \$10 for violating the speed law, having been arrested Sunday while trying to catch a ferry boat at Oakland pier with Mr. and Mrs. Hency. Crumpton started to protest vigorously at the arrest, but was silenced by Hency's command: "Quit complaining. These men are doing their duty."

### LITTLE PROSPECT FOR SETTLEMENT OF STRIKE

Cleveland, O., May 25.—Arbitration as a means of settling the difficulties between officials of the Municipal Traction company and the streetcar men's union received a setback today when it was learned that an incomplete count of the votes cast on the proposition to arbitrate the seniority rights of the non-union men shows that the question has undoubtedly been snowed under.

### SUE FOR LAND ILLEGALLY SECURED

Portland, Or., May 25.—Three suits for the recovery of 9380 acres of land in Linn county, Oregon, were filed by United States District Attorney McCourt today. Charles A. Smith of Minneapolis is the principal defendant in the suits. The land involved is valued at \$1,000,000. The statute of limitations prevented criminal proceedings.

### MAY BE FOUL PLAY

San Francisco, May 25.—Two deaths that suggest murder are being investigated by the police. An unknown woman found lying alongside the streetcar track near Hillcrest was removed to a hospital, where she died and John Grace, said to be a plumber, was found dying in a saloon in the Mission. On the back of the woman's head was an abrasion, indicating that she had been struck by a car. Another theory is that she was murdered and her body taken to the spot where it was found. The unknown woman was 60 years old. She has not been identified. John Grace died without regaining consciousness. Chief Deputy Kennedy is having an examination made of the man's stomach in an effort to learn if an overdose of "knockout drops" had been administered.

### BELIEVE SHE SHOT HUSBAND

San Francisco, May 25.—Detectives are searching the city for Mrs. Zena Pollard, who was to come to trial today on a charge of attempting to kill her husband, Harry Pollard, the actor. Several weeks ago Mrs. Pollard, through jealousy, is alleged to have fired five shots at her husband. Two of them took effect. Both deny an attempt to murder, the actor claiming that while he was fooling with his revolver he accidentally shot himself.

### MAE WOOD IS LET OUT UNDER BONDS

New York, May 25.—Mae Woods, who is under arrest on a charge of perjury in connection with her recent suit against Senator Thomas C. Platt, in which she claimed to be Platt's wife, was released from the Tombs today on bond of \$5000 furnished by the American Surety company.

### Accidentally Shot Son

St. Helens, Or., May 25.—While crane hunting yesterday afternoon George Barger accidentally shot and killed his 13-year-old son. The boy had accompanied his father on the hunt but had become separated from him. Barger saw a good chance to bag a crane and fired.
