freedom for the millionaire slayer of Stanford White.

Thaw is furious at the result and it was all his counsel could do to restrain him and prevent him from making a demonstration which might be used as evidence against him in a future proceeding.

After nearly a month spent in the luxurious quarters of Sheriff Robert Winthrop Challer, multi-millionaire and member of the "Four Hundred" over the jail here, the Pittsburger is unable to reconcile himself to the return to asylum fare.

Thaw will have at least one full week more here as Justice Morschauer agreed not to re-commit the prisoner to the asylum for the criminal insane at Matteawan until after his attorneys have time to make a motion for transfer to another asylum. The justice will be out of the city all this week.

Thaw is particularly averse to returning to Matteawan because he has quarreled with Superintendent Baker, who testified against him in the hearing here. In describing Thaw's mental condition, Justice Morschauer said: "He is suffering from some kind of insanity, with the possibility of the recurrence of violent attacks, similar to that form from which the jury believed he was suffering when he killed the New York architect. In view of this condition of his mind the safety of the public is better insured by his remaining in custody until such a time as it becomes reasonably certain that there is no danger of a recurrence of the attack of delusion or whatever it may be."

Morschauer cited numerous decisions in support of his findings in the case. It is the opinion of many who have watched the case closely that the conduct and appearance of Thaw on the stand when District Attorney Jerome called him as a witness had much to do with the finding of the court.

District Attorney Jerome has personal as well as professional cause for satisfaction at the decision of the court as it is generally reported that Thaw has threatened his life.

A story is going the rounds that Evelyn Nesbit Thaw is not displeased at the situation either, and that she was in great fear of what would happen to her if the prisoner were released. Her suit to annul her marriage to Harry on the ground that he was insane at the time still is pending.

"Hot air," and spectacular work on the part of District Attorney Jerome were given by Thaw today as the explanation of his being found insane. After he had recovered from a fit of anger, Thaw received a delegation of newspaper men and talked to them as he smoked a big black cigar.

"I had counted on this outcome of the case," he said, "because of the hot air used by Jerome. My side was put to a disadvantage. We had the proof but it was not exciting or very interesting when compared with the dramatic work of the prosecution."

"I don't blame the reporters. They're expected to write interesting stuff. But the hearing brought out

several things in my favor that were never published.

"Dr. Jacoby's testimony in my behalf was absolutely conclusive but it was uninteresting so little attention was paid to it. Then Jerome's cross-examination of the doctor made lively reading and got into print leaving the false impression that the doctor was completely annihilated.

"I do not criticize the court and I do not blame Jerome. As to my future course, it is in the hands of my counsel. I am unable to understand what made anyone think I was insane from my manner on the witness stand. I am sure I was cool. The only time I hesitated was when the stenographers were being changed.

"The attendants at Matteawan did everything they could for me during my stay there until about 10 days before I came here and then their attitude suddenly changed entirely and I was constantly given the worst of it."

Thaw was asked if there was any prospect of a reconciliation between him and his wife, Evelyn Nesbit Thaw. He evidently was displeased the mention of the subject but replied:

"I don't think there is any danger of my wife withdrawing her divorce case."

Mrs. William Thaw of Pittsburg mother of the prisoner, and his sister, Mrs. Carnegie, visited him in the sheriff's quarters here today. They were greatly distressed at the decision and the elder woman seemed almost ready to collapse with grief. It is said this afternoon that the hearing to determine the place for confining Thaw may not be held until a week from Saturday.

SALEM STAYTON ELECTRIC

Oregon Electric May Withdraw all Applications for Franchises in This City.

The Stayton-railroad picnic will be attended by hundreds of people from the valley towns. There will be speaking and music in the forenoon and afternoon, and the town of Stayton will be decorated. A delegation from Salem will go up, and it is understood the Aumsville and Stayton stock subscriptions are growing at a rapid rate, and are so large that two offers have been made to build a line to Stayton and are being considered by committee in charge of the Salem and Stayton electric.

The Oregon Electric.

A Salem special says: It was reliably reported tonight that at the city council meeting tomorrow night the Oregon Electric will withdraw all applications for further franchises in this city. This course, it is said, is due to the fact that opposition has been raised to every request the company has made for franchises that will enable it to use conveniently the tracks it has built to this city. The most serious trouble encountered was that in obtaining permission to have its "Y" from State street to Mill street, on which latter street the company proposes to build a passenger and freight depot.

Numerous interests have objected to a grant of the desired franchise. The withdrawal of the application for a franchise probably means that the company will establish its "Y" and depot at the intersection of the Oregon Electric and the local fairgrounds line on Hood street in North Salem, or that the road will build south around Salem, instead of going through the city.

The more probable theory is that the depot will be located in North Salem, eight or ten blocks from the business center.

ANARCHY RIFE IN PERSIA

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Berlin, May 25.—Advises received here are to the effect that anarchy prevails throughout Persia. As an example of the shah's helplessness against the Persian newspapers Mussowad, for an article containing statements that parts of Persian territory are in the control of brigands and revolutionists, and concluding with the following:

"The governors are tyrannical, the administration is corrupt and inefficient, the taxes are in arrears, the exchequer is empty; the soldiers' wages are unpaid and the army is helpless. What is the shah going to do in these melancholy circumstances? He devotes himself to orgies night after night until day break."

The newspaper proceeds to give proof of its allegations and concludes by demanding the dethronement of the shah and the establishment of a republic.

The shah brought a libel action, but withdrew it when the editor offered to prove the charge in detail. Following this the walls of Tehera were covered with placards calling upon the people to assassinate the monarch.
