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HOW THE TAFT COLUMN STACKS UP.

According to best information, out of a total delegation of 980 in the national Republican convention, **TAFT HAS 563 INSTRUCTED FOR HIM.** Hughes has 54, Fairbanks 32, Cannon has 44, Knox has 68, La Folette 25, Foraker 2, uninstructed 192, contested 182. Of the contested delegations out of 182, only 126 are Taft delegates who may be affected. **SO TAFT WILL GAIN IN THE CONTESTS.** In all, 36 states, territories and insular possessions have instructed for Secretary Taft through their respective state conventions, or adopted strong resolutions of endorsement or preference. In Alaska, Arkansas and Tennessee and in one district in Ohio and Oklahoma, only Taft delegates are involved in contests. The Wisconsin and 64 Pennsylvania delegates were elected in direct primaries, and with the exception of one Wisconsin delegate, elected as a supporter of Secretary Taft, the Wisconsin and Pennsylvania delegates are credited as "instructed" for the candidates of those states.

The resolutions of the Michigan state convention direct the state delegation to act as a unit in support of Secretary Taft. **ALL MISSOURI CONTESTS ARE IN THE CITY OF ST. LOUIS.** While the Massachusetts delegates at large are uninstructed, the state convention passed a resolution declaring that a majority of the delegates are for Taft. Two of the uninstructed New York delegates have declared their intention to vote for Taft. Six Maine delegates classed as instructed for Taft **WERE CHOSEN UNDER STRONG "PREFERENCE" RESOLUTIONS.** Governor Fort, one of the delegates-at-large from New Jersey, has stated publicly that at least 22 of the 24 delegates from his state will support Secretary Taft.
