OF FARMERS

ON WAY FROM EAST

There are many callers at the Trade headquarters these days from all parts of the east, and many from New York state, Illinois, Iowa and the Dakotas. Many families are settling in homes all about Salem and a few are renting temporary in Salem and suburbs, which will occupy until they can find what they want in the way of a home or business.

One morning a gentleman from Ohio, called. He is a forerunner for a dozen good ones who are looking for fruit. He is making a thorough investigation of all the fruit centers and he has gone on to South Oregon, he will stop at Salem and return to more fully ascertain the conditions, prices of products and prospects for the future. This return this gentleman will bring leading apple, pear, cherry and orange orchards in company with members of the Board of Trade to make his final deductions to himself and his home people.

Every day passes but some advantage of this kind drops into the lap of some one who is spying out the land and neighbors in the distance. As a rule, these people are ready to locate or invest at once, and there they are properly shown and made conversant with the facts concerning our community. Almost invariably return and the real work of bringing in new friends begins. Many of these begin boosting for Salem because they are actually located, and begun they never cease. This publicity advertising becomes an unbroken chain of work for our city. The farms have changed hands this spring and the greatest activity at present seems to be in the small fruit tracts, ready made as it were, for settlers to brighten into.

Among other letters received to-day several from Germans, writing their native tongue. These come from California, Wisconsin, Ohio and other points. These letters are invariably bear fruit, as they seem to start out with a degree of seriousness and determination that ends in specific action. The most of the correspondence is parties looking for small farms in suburban homes, letters are read from men in almost all lines of business; hence, it would be well for anyone having a business for sale to keep in close touch with Salem's commercial organization for sale.

Among the latest arrivals in Salem are three gentlemen who recently returned from the Elite hotel and restaurant. They are Messrs. L. Wal-

tert, L. Hentschel and G. Koeman, with their respective families. They came purely as a result of their correspondence with the Board of Trade and are happily located in a business with which they are thoroughly satisfied. They like the climate and the people and will undoubtedly reap a rich reward in the way of business success.

In the past two months several letters have been received from a gentleman in Munich, Germany, who is anxious to secure a fruit farm in this climate. As a result of the German correspondence he has decided to locate in Salem, as will be seen by the following letter written on board the steamer, which was received yesterday:

"On board the North German Lloyd steamship Kaiser Wilhelm II. 'Dear Sir: I am on my way to Salem with my family—bad weather, I can write only with difficulty. Will you please drop me a letter in care of the postoffice at Portland, to say which boarding house I should take at Salem. I wrote you about this but did not get your reply up to the time of my departure from Munich, Germany. If you have anything else to tell me after looking over my previous letters, I shall be much obliged.

A suite of rooms has been arranged for the German writer to occupy upon his arrival.

A letter received from a Kansas City merchant today seems to indicate strongly that the literature sent out by the board of trade is convincing to residents of other parts of the country.

"I have just received a booklet of 'The Cherry City of the World,' the letter says, 'and am very much impressed. After more correspondence with you I will let you know just when we will start.'

This man wants to start a hotel in Salem or a resort in the country near the city. He says he will bring half a dozen other men with him, who are engaged in every kind of business, from merchants to professional men.

Another letter was received today from a printer in Brooklyn, N. Y. He has read of the wonders of the Willamette valley, and he is coming to Salem as soon as he can sell his property.

He says: "It is my object to work myself into the orcharding business, and I think I shall work at the printing business until I have gained enough knowledge to manage a small orchard of ten or twelve acres, which I want to buy in the neighborhood of town.

"I want to live there and utilize my spare time in cultivating fruit, and most likely hire such help as would be necessary to do the work that I could not find time for. I have read that all kinds of mechanics are doing this same thing, and are making a success of it."
