CONSIGN CHINESE IN BOXES

TO EVADE THE LAWS TWELVE CHINESE FOUND DEAD IN CRATES—WERE SHIPPED AS EXPRESS FROM EL PASO TO NEW YORK.

Washington, May 27.—Twelve Chinese lives was the price paid by daring smugglers to experiment with a new scheme for evasion of the emigration laws. The government has just discovered that a dozen Orientals who attempted to gain entrance to this country by having themselves crated and shipped by express from El Paso to New York were dead upon arrival.
Acting Commissioner Larned, of the emigration bureau, admitted today that a gigantic smuggling plot had been unearthed on the Texas border and that Chinese Inspector Babcock, one of the keenest sleuths in the service, is now in New York on the trail of the arch-plotters. POSTPONE BANKER'S SENTENCE

ASKS A REHEARING EX-GOVERNOR LORD ADDED TO COUNSEL FOR DEFENSE—SEVERAL TECHNICAL OBJECTIONS TO TRIAL RAISED.

J. Thorburn Ross, the convicted president of the defunct Title Guarantee & Trust company of Portland, appeared before Judge Burnett at 1 o'clock this afternoon to be sentenced for the conversion of \$338,000 of the state school funds. It is not probable, however, that the sentence will be pronounced until late this evening, as arguments for a new trial, and for an arrest of judgment will first be presented at length.
Upon opening the court this afternoon, Judge Burnett said that before pronouncing the judgment he would listen to the arguments that have been prepared by the defense. Attorney McCamant asked that the motion for a new trial be heard first, as ex-Governor Lord, who has been added to counsel for defense, had prepared the argument on this point

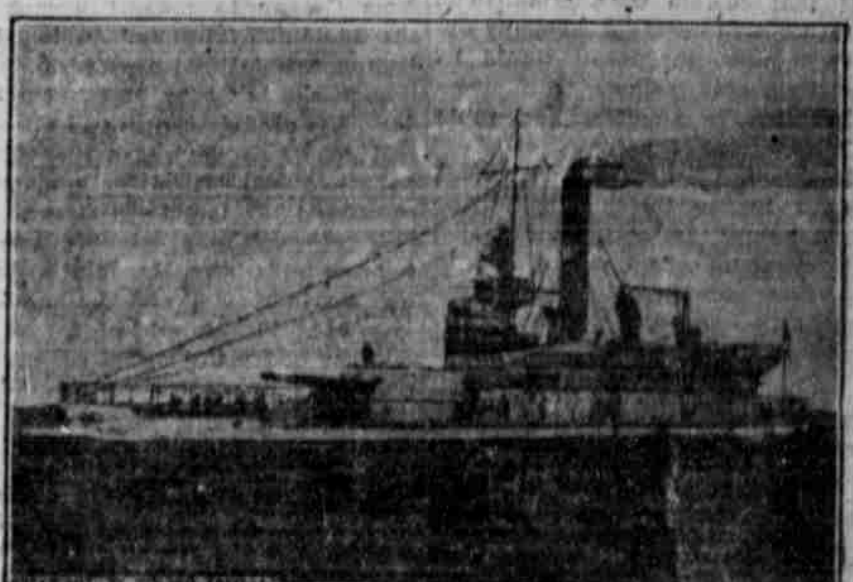

THIRTEEN DIE IN TORNADO

SCORES INJURED PASSES OVER OKLAHOMA DURING NIGHT—WORST ONE IN YEARS—CROPS DESTROYED—HOUSES TORN UP BY WIND.

Oklahoma City, Okla., May 27.—Reports late this afternoon show that 13 are known to be dead as the result of the tornado which swept over Oklahoma last night and it is probable that reports of more deaths



A UNITED STATES MONITOR AS A TARGET.

A modern monitor which cost \$1,000,000 is a rather expensive target, but that is the use the Florida, built in 1901, has been turned to by our navy. The idea of the navy officials in using the Florida as a target was to test the effect of heavy shells fired against her gun turret, the accuracy of torpedoes when directed at a real war vessel and the effect of shots on a spiral military mast. Such a mast was erected on board the Florida especially for these experiments.

tenant Joseph Taussig, and 20 men of the crew of the monitor Florida remained on board the warship here today while 12-inch shells were hurled at it from the big guns of the monitor Arkansas, anchored 300 yards off with her broadside battery in full play on the target ship.

When it was first planned to make the extraordinary test of the power of the guns in warfare, it was not dreamed of keeping any of the men aboard, but the plans for the test were changed suddenly today, Commander Quimby and his men volunteering to stay aboard their ship while she was submitted to the hammering of the big projectiles. Explanations of the danger did not weaken their determination in the least.

While the men did not take their places in the turret which would be necessary to manipulate the guns in case of actual fighting, they remained just behind the turrets while the firing progressed and were severely jolted by the continuous terrific impact of the great shells as they battered against the heavy armor of the Florida.

When the time came for the test, the Florida immediately steamed into her position. The Arkansas and her tender then anchored fore and aft off Thimble Shoal, 300 yards from the Florida with her broadside bearing on the target ship. The

will be received from outlying districts which have not been reached. Heavy damage to buildings and crops is reported all along the path of the storm.

A message received this afternoon says that five persons were killed outright at Tecoma, which was practically wiped out and that one was killed near Driftwood. In both these places scores are said to be injured.

Houses were twisted off their foundations and trees uprooted along the path of the "twister," which at some points appears to have been of more terrific velocity than that of any tornado in this section in years. Its course was mainly through country not thickly settled and Alva is the only town reported to have been damaged.

Crops were destroyed over an area of several miles around Alva and the devastation places a new burden upon this section which already is being heavily drained by the distress and destitution following the great floods. The persons killed were crushed under wrecked buildings and in the excitement identification is impossible. It is believed most of the injured will recover.
