serious malady which it is believed is gradually killing him and the impression prevails that the end is near.

Utmost secrecy regarding the nature of the former President's illness has been maintained since he came here early in March. It was given out that he was indisposed as the result of indigestion, but the employment of two stomach specialists who remain with him alternately 24 hours at a time has not been explained.

Yesterday it became known that Cleveland's condition had taken a turn for the worse and last night both doctors were with him. The Cleveland apartment is the only one occupied in the great resort hotel. It is on the second floor at the end of a wing, far away from the main entrance, so that the patient is as successfully isolated as if he were on an island.

Mrs. Cleveland, who continually has given out optimistic reports, is not believed to be aware of the true facts of the case. It has been repeatedly reported and denied that Cleveland is suffering from cancer of the stomach and this theory has been given support by the nature of the illness, as indicated by the actions of the physicians. TERM MAY

The crowd in the court room waited breathlessly while Judge Burnett pronounced the sentence at 10:30 o'clock this morning. The prisoner received the judgment with the same stolid countenance that he has exhibited throughout the trial, although as the words came from the judge, Ross' face turned ashen pale and his hands trembled a little.

An able, but hopeless, argument by Walter McCamant for an arrest of judgment consumed half the morning, and finally in response to Judge Burnett's question he stated that he had nothing further to say. The motion for an arrest of judgment was overruled at the close of McCamant's argument this morning, and the motion for a new trial, which was argued yesterday, was overruled after the sentence was pronounced.

Pending the appeal Ross will be released on \$6000 bail.

McCamant based his motion for an arrest of judgment on the grounds that the information in the complaint against Ross did not contain sufficient evidence to constitute a crime as charged. The statute, he contended, was meant to apply only to persons in an official capacity, and not to a bank official with whom money may have been left for safekeeping.

District Attorney Manning declined to reply to the arguments at length, because they had all been presented and settled at the trial. Judge Pipes took up and refuted several of the contentions of McCamant. The attorney for the defense had said that the legislature in making this law had fixed so severe a penalty because in a charge under it malfeasance in office and willful dishonesty were implied, and that no evidence had been introduced to prove that Ross was guilty of either of these. "This," said Judge Pipes, "is not the case. The severity of the penalty was imposed because it was the public money that was converted. Wisely or unwisely the legislature has seen fit to place a greater penalty on the larceny of public than of private funds, and the law does not consider the character of the man who converts it."

Judge Burnett in considering the points raised by McCamant, said: "The statute says that if any person has in his possession public money, and converts it to his own use, he shall be punished. It does not say that he must be a public official, but any person. Neither does it state he shall receive it; it simply says, if he has it, and converts it he shall be punished." Burnett went over the main contentions in the argument, and then announced that the motion for an arrest of judgment would be overruled.

The motion for a deferment of judgment until the bill of exceptions could be settled, was also overruled, the prosecution objecting on the grounds that it was unnecessary, and that the delay would be of no advantage to anybody. The judgment was therefore pronounced, and the bail fixed. The case will be appealed as soon as the bill of exceptions and other matters are completed.

PREPARE FOR MORE OUTRAGES

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, May 28.—Fear that the dynamiters, who blew up three houses belonging to former Supervisor James L. Gallagher in Oakland Tuesday night and escaped without leaving a clue for the police, encouraged by their success, have transferred their operations to this city, led the officials connected with the graft prosecution to redouble their means of protection and to pursue with renewed vigor the apparently fruitless effort to trace the men who "did the work."

District Attorney Langdon, his assistant, Francis J. Heney, and Special Agent William Burns are convinced that the same man who blew up Gallagher's home in April, set off the dynamite Tuesday night and they say they are positive the object is to intimidate witnesses as well as prosecutors in the graft cases and that they are prepared to meet such methods of opposition.

Four men in an automobile who trailed the car of Burns all day yesterday and last night were arrested and placed in the city prison at an early hour today. No specific charge was placed against them. A revolver, found under the chauffeur's seat, was the only weapon they carried. They gave their names as "Kid" Nelson, Tom Groves, A. H. Middlemas and Jim Hayes.

AGREE ON CURRENCY MEASURE

Washington, May 28.—The main provisions of the "faith-cure" currency bill, agreed on yesterday by the house and slated to pass the senate today, are as follows: Emergency currency may be issued up to an aggregate of \$500,000,000.

It will be subject to retirement tax 6 per cent for the first two months and one per cent per month thereafter until a total of ten per cent is reached.

State, county and municipal bonds acceptable as security for 90 per cent market value; other bonds and commercial paper for 75 per cent market value.

No bank may take out emergency currency in excess of 30 per cent of its capital stock and surplus on commercial paper.

No emergency currency may be taken out at all unless the bank already has taken out, under present law, currency equal to 40 per cent of capital and surplus.

Banks holding state, county or municipal bonds, with approval of the secretary of the treasury, may take out additional currency directly upon them for 90 per cent of their market value on their individual initiative and responsibility.

Commercial paper may be used as basis of issuance only by banks affiliated in groups with aggregate capital and surplus of not less than \$5,000,000 to be known as "national currency associations."

A currency commission to be composed of nine members of the house and nine senator will be created.

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CARRIERS PUT INTO QUANDARY

(United Press Leased Wire.) Gresham, Or., May 28.—Whether to run the risk of being run down by 30 high power automobiles, with the certainty of arrest if they escape alive, or to resign their positions and see their families starve, is the quandary in which two rural mail carriers in East Multnomah county have been placed by a clash between the state authorities and Uncle Sam.

Governor Chamberlain has issued a proclamation forbidding traffic on the base line and section line roads on June 4, the date of the road race to be held by the Portland Automobile club. The postoffice department has ordered its two rural mail carriers in that district to make their regular trips over those roads on that date. If the men obey the governor they will lose their government positions; if they obey Uncle Sam they will either be killed or arrested.

About 30 high power automobiles will be entered in the races and their little danger of the carriers going to jail if they venture into the forbidden territory.

There will be automobiles on every mile of the roads throughout the day. The local postal inspector has informed the carriers that the government will defend them in the event of their arrest, death or damage to their rigs.

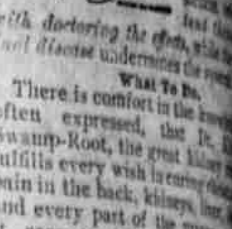

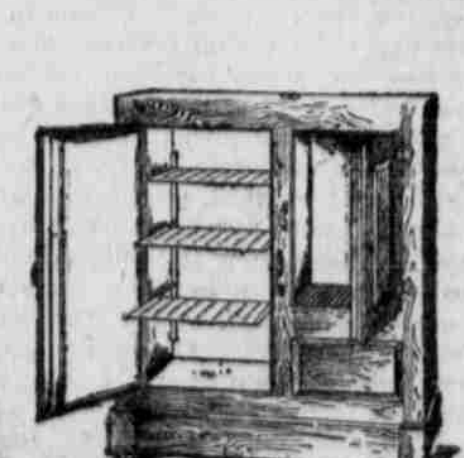
