### WITH HEAD CRUSHED TOT LIVES

**FELL 3 STORIES**  
TWO-YEAR-OLD BABE DISFIGURED BEYOND RECOGNITION SURVIVES HEAD FIRST DIVE TO PAVEMENT FROM WINDOW.

San Francisco, May 29.—The two-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. L. Carboni, who live in the third story of the Lorenzi apartments at Octavia and Haight streets, fell from the front window today, striking its head on the cement pavement below and strange to say, was not killed. The child's head was crushed until its features were almost indistinguishable, but its breathing was regular when it was picked up. A young man who was driving a butcher's cart saw the accident and, taking the child in his arms, drove rapidly to the Emergency hospital, where the doctors say they cannot account for the survival of the child at all and have no hope whatever that it will live through the day. ### SCORE ARE HURT IN ACCIDENT

**TO A STREET CAR**  
JUMPS TRACK AND ROLLS DOWN EMBANKMENT, FATALLY INJURING THREE—NEARLY ALL UNCONSCIOUS WHEN RESCUED

Connellsville, Penn., May 29.—Three passengers were probably fatally injured and 17 others were badly hurt when an observation car, attached to a Baltimore & Ohio passenger train, left the tracks and rolled down an embankment at Garrett near here today. The passenger train was going at a rapid rate when it swung around a curve where the tracks were somewhat elevated. The heavy observation car at the rear of the train did not take the curve and leaving the rails rolled down the hillside. Advice received here say none of the other cars left the tracks. The observation car passengers were all thrown heavily about the car and most of them were unconscious when the train and passengers rushed back

### NAVY MEN ONCE MORE DISPUTING

**ABOUT ARMAMENT**  
THE FLORIDA MAY AGAIN BE TARGET — ARTILLEY OFFICERS SAY WAS HIT BY IMPERFECT SHELL.

(United Press Lensed Wire.)  
Washington, May 29.—A hot dispute arose today between officers of the coast artillery service and the navy experts which may result in the monitor Florida being submitted to another bombardment from a 12-inch gun. The coast artillery officers assert that the 12-inch shell which pierced the wall of the turret of the Florida in the gunnery tests Wednesday, did not explode, they contended that it was an imperfect projectile and that if it had been perfect the entire turret would have been destroyed. Naval officers denied this contention and said that it was proof against it. "Just give us another chance and we will show you," retorted the artillery men. "All we want is one shot at the Florida with a 12-inch gun and we will demonstrate that a 12-inch shell properly handled will blow the turret off the monitor at a range of 5000 yards." It is said that the navy may decide to give the artillery men an opportunity to show what they can do with their big guns when the Florida is submitted to the torpedo some day next week.

### SCHOOL OF TERRORISTS UNCOVERED

**TEACH BOMB MAKING**  
FACTORY FOR MAKING OF INFERNAL EXPLOSIVES DISCLOSED IN INDIA—RESULT OF BRITISH INVESTIGATION.

London, May 29.—The foreign office today received reports of a remarkable investigation in India which exposed the operations of a complete school of the higher education of bomb makers and bomb throwers, under the direction of experts. At the head of the school was a native chemist of considerable learning and much knowledge of explosives. The system of educating and training terrorists was conducted along the most elaborate and complete lines and it is believed graduates from the school have been sent to various parts of the world. The establishment of the school involved considerable financial outlay, including the building of a factory where bombs were made and experiments conducted. The detectives found a large stock of explosives and chemicals, a well equipped laboratory and a complete technical library. The primary object of the school was to prepare men for work in the ranks of the secret revolutionary organization in all parts of India, though it was established that the terrorists in several parts of Europe were aware of the existence of the school and undoubtedly were making use of its facilities.

### IS FOUND DEAD IN BATH TUB

Portland, Or., May 29.—As he stepped into his bathtub last night, P. J. Mann, a wealthy Oregon pioneer, dropped dead from heart failure. Mann's dead body was discovered an hour later by his aged wife, lying in a tub full of boiling water, which had horribly disfigured the corpse. The bath water, which was heated by an automatic gas heater in the cellar, had continued to run and grow hotter until Mrs. Mann discovered the tragedy and rescued the body of her husband. Mrs. Mann's hands and arms were badly scalded by plunging them into the scalding water to remove the plug to allow the water to escape. She is prostrated.

### BURGLARS OVERLOOKED

**THE MOST VALUABLE**

Portland, Or., May 29.—Artistic temperament of a burglar saved the Arts and Crafts society of Portland thousands of dollars when a thief entered the Museum of Art and stole exhibits entered by Mrs. Mary Mott Smith Cunningham of San Francisco and Mrs. Watkins of Cleveland, O. The robber passed by exhibits worth much more in actual cash and confined his pilfering to the work of the two women, which were valuable chiefly for the artistic merit. The case looted by the burglar contained jewelry worth five or six hundred dollars. Next to them was an exhibit of rare and costly jewelry which would have netted him thousands of dollars. This was untouched. The articles stolen were: Pendant with black pearls; silver fob; necklace set with brilliant red stones; silver box; wrought bracelet set with various colored stones; necklace of gold leaves set with precious stones; silver enamel box; silver pendant; opal pendant; small silver pins; silver and scarab pin; gold and jade pendant; scarab and silver fob; ring set with opals and sapphires; carved gold ring; scarab searf pin; amethyst pendant; and silver and abalone stick pin.
