SALEM HAS BIG SALE OF WOOLS

(Pendleton Tribune)
More than 800,000 pounds of wool were purchased by wool buyers from the growers of Umatilla county at the first of the annual 1908 wool sale yesterday afternoon. While the prices submitted last year were the bids offered yesterday were double those offered at the sale, and not unsatisfactory to the majority of the growers. It was a success in every way. The prices ranged from 6 to 13 1/2 cents per pound.

Bidding was keen throughout the day, several of the lots were sold for first. An interesting feature of the sale was the deflation of thousands of dollars in the bidding should get the toss of a coin. With nonchalance, the interested bidders watched the coin fall, by the decision without the show of feeling.

More than 1,000,000 pounds of wool were stored in the warehouse, offered for sale but up until a few days ago, only 800,000 had changed hands, although hundreds of thousands of pounds were offered. The owners failed either to accept or to bid offered. A few of the owners are holding wool with the expectation of higher prices. There is a general feeling of discontent among some of the growers, which is only natural, marked reduction, but no mention of a conspiracy among the bidders.

Wool this year is of a higher grade than last year. The experienced buyer said last night the wool in this county would be an increase of 35 per cent. This is due to the wind and sandstorms that have blown over the county prior to shearing. The wool is filled with sand, making it heavier. The buyers will leave today for Rock where they will attend a sale. At this sale, the choicest grown in Umatilla county is offered and the buyers are eagerly awaiting the opening of the sale. The increase in the bids offered today over the Arlington bids at the superiority of the Umatilla fleeces, yet the buyers expect much higher prices will prevail at the sale today.

SALEM HIGH WINS THE CHAMPIONSHIP

The Salem High School baseball team is now champion of western Oregon. The championship was decided yesterday in a close game with Columbia University of Portland, Salem winning by 5 to 4. Columbia has the Portland academic championship and Salem has the same over everything south of there and this game was played to decide the western championship and Salem came through in a way extremely pleasing to the large crowd out to the game. The weather threatened to interrupt the game during the first part but the little rain that came let up in time to not seriously interrupt things.

A surprise was sprung when at the beginning of the game umpire Lawrence announced that Governor Chamberlain had offered a silver cup to the champions. This makes the second cup now among the high school trophies.

A large crowd turned out and excitement was intense from start to finish. At the end of the game the crowd went wild, the rooters carrying "Larry" Keenes on their shoulders, protesting wildly off the field. Keene has made a name for himself by this season's playing.

The game started in Salem's favor but quickly changed for a time at least. Columbia went to bat and Keene struck out the first two men up, then the next. But the next three got hits and two men were over the plate before Salem came to bat. It looked rather bad for several innings when Roberts, with the bases full, tapped out a two-bagger which brought in three runs. Roberts is always a safe hitter in a pinch. In the eighth with bases full and the score 5 to 2 and Columbia at bat with none down it again looked doubtful for Salem. The visitors brought in two more runs and still none down when Salem stopped the scoring with a pretty double, when a hit struck the home plate, bounced to Farmer who threw it to Gabrielson and Gabrielson scored.

Salem high school did themselves proud yesterday. Everybody has been saying that it was up to them to win this championship and they have certainly done it in a proper style. The only team they have lost to this year is "Oregon" and the game they played against them was nothing to be ashamed for a game against a college team.
