Tracks Dangerous—

The Railroad Commission has received a letter from Graham & Son, a firm in Monmouth engaged in the drainage business, complaining that the Southern Pacific tracks in that town are so arranged as to make the unloading of cars extremely dangerous. The only side track for standing the loaded cars, the letter says, is along the side of a warehouse, and can be approached by a wagon for unloading the cars only from the side next to the main line track, and there is not sufficient room between the two tracks for a wagon to stand when the trains are passing. From twelve to twenty trains a day pass this point, making rapid work in the unloading of cars impossible.

Husband Was Cured—

A suit for a divorce has been filed in the circuit court by Mrs. Susan Nadrau, of Jefferson, against her husband, Adolph Nadrau. The complaint alleges cruel and inhuman treatment on the part of the husband toward the wife, who is about 67 years of age. The couple were married in Iowa in 1884, and lived together until April, 1906, when, according to the complaint, the plaintiff being no longer able to bear the insults of her husband, separated from him. Carey Martin is the attorney for the plaintiff.
