UNCLE SAM TO DEFEND ISTHUS- IAN PROPERTY—U. S. MAY TAKE CONTROL OF COUNTRY IF REVOLUTION PROGRESSES.

Washington, June 3.—Publication of the United Press dispatch telling of the critical condition of affairs in the republic of Panama aroused great interest here and it was announced today that 200 additional marines have been ordered sent to the isthmus at once, with orders to protect American property and help keep order at the election.

San Francisco, June 3.—A warrant for the arrest of M. H. De Young, proprietor of the San Francisco Chronicle, was issued today on a charge of criminal libel preferred by Detective William J. Burns, who is in charge of the graft prosecutions here.

NATIONAL POLITICS SEETHING

Taft's Address Referring to Grant's Drinking Used as a Slogan to Defeat Him— Commotion in All Camps.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Chicago, June 3.—Sudden life has been injected into the presidential booms of all the favorite sons by the belief that Secretary Taft can be beaten on the issue of his memorial day address at Grant's tomb in which he referred to General Grant's drunkenness.

The fight is on today in a dozen different quarters and plans are being laid to win the nomination away from the secretary of war who last week was looked upon as being almost certain of success. News comes from Indianapolis this morning that an effort is being made to form an alliance of candidates against Taft. Frank H. Hitchcock, Taft's manager, seeing trouble ahead, left Washington hurriedly and arrived here today to take charge of the headquarters and direct the fight.

Senators Cannon, who was on his way home in a touring car, suddenly abandoned it and took a limited train for Illinois.

Senator Homenway of Indiana, who has charge of the Fairbanks committee, also was in the automobile and he, too, left it upon advice received at Pittsburgh. Homenway will rush to Indianapolis where he will hold a consultation with Fairbanks and then will come here at once.

The Hughes boomers and the Knox managers also are using every means to make the most of the situation. All have new hope and the tension in the situation has more than doubled in the last 24 hours.

One of the Fairbanks supporters today said:

"The remarks made by Taft at Grant's tomb will be mentioned at every opportunity on the floor of the convention."

"It was the most damaging statement that a presidential candidate ever made, so far as I know, before a convention when he seemed sure of nomination."

"Members of the G. A. R. all over the country are furious that Taft should have been able to draw up the only thing that was ever said to the discredit of Grant and take occasion to refer to it at memorial exercises at Grant's own tomb. It was such a display of bad judgment that it will weaken the confidence of the people in him."

"If Taft is going to be used to beat Taft, and he will be beaten if we can make it. There is no way to hush it up now."

A story that is thick in the air about the national headquarters is that Roosevelt will be nominated if it appears that Taft has been defeated.

In spite of Roosevelt's repeated statements that he would not accept a nomination, the "second objective" men are busy at work. They say that Roosevelt wants his policies continued more than he wants anything else in the world and that if Taft cannot be nominated, the President will be.

In the light of the developments of the last 24 hours the managers of the various campaigns are watching each other closely and anti-Taft alliances may be formed.

The alleged Hebeous article that forms the basis of Burns' complaint was printed in the Chronicle several days ago with reference to the land fraud cases in which Dr. Edward B. Perrin was convicted in the federal court here last year. Burns gathered the evidence upon which Perrin was convicted.

The Chronicle story alleged that Burns coached Charles P. Snell, the prosecution's chief witness, in his testimony and an affidavit by Snell was printed.

De Young is one of the most prominent publishers in the west and is prominent in public life. He is chairman of the California delegation to the Chicago convention and a member of the Legion of Honor.

The engagement of De Young's daughter, Miss Helen De Young, to George T. Cameron was announced today and the young debutante had intended to sail for Europe with her parents after the Chicago convention.
