STANTON

(Continued from Page 1.)

from carrying out his plan. Yesterday afternoon a letter was sent to the home of Miss Elsie in South Salem, which was at that place at 12 o'clock the shooting occurred, and plainly indicates that Stanton intended to take his own life that

letter was turned in to the office late yesterday afternoon by the district attorney. It was as follows:

Salem, Oregon, June 2, '08. Mr. Folks:—I have got tired of living and I haven't got anything to live for. Mother has died and I am to be placed by the side of her. I don't like to die then, but I don't want to have a chance to get Dancer but she went back on me and I haven't got anything to live for. I was going with a girl and I was drunk but I could not get it. I am with Elsie now but she is better than me and that is the reason for, so I guess that will be the end of it. I will be with mother pretty soon and good by, from your dear son and son to you all.

S.—I want you to treat your son good from this on, won't you? I haven't had any entertainment for a long time and I want to be good to one another, won't you? I wouldn't have done this if it hadn't been for the one I think so much of. There is no one in this town that thinks anything of me, so I wouldn't I be tired of living.

Tell Henry I am sorry I talked the way I did tonight, but I can't and couldn't help it. I will write you when I am gone than I will. I hope that Mary and Nellie will all right. I am going to try to come home now, it is 12 o'clock, good bye. I will meet you all in town. Your son and brother,

BEN F. STANTON.

When shown the letter Stanton intended he wrote it, and said that he intended at the time to kill himself, but that when he returned home he considered the matter, and had definitely made up his mind that he was arrested.

When I came home from Elsie's," said Stanton, "I told Henry I had done, and asked him to go down town and see if Mr. Goode was dead. If he was I intended to go out my purpose, but if he was not I was going to give myself up."

It is not been for the success which Deputy Sheriff Minto effected the capture and the arrest, it is very probable that Stanton would have killed himself or one of the officers. The two officers entered the Stanton residence, four blocks east

of the Southern Pacific depot, they found the boy lying face downward on the sofa, asleep. His arms were crossed, and in one hand he held the loaded revolver. This was taken from him, and an examination showed that all the chambers were filled. Stanton was then awakened and told to come along with the sheriff. The officers believe that if he had not been found asleep that a fight would have ensued, Stanton being fully prepared for an encounter with the sheriff, or for self destruction.

The story told by Stanton when the letter was shown him contradicts the statement made by him in an interview a few hours earlier. At that time Stanton said that he had no idea of suicide, and could give no reason for carrying the revolver. Stanton was arraigned yesterday afternoon, and was refused bail, pending the outcome of the crime. Although councilman Goode's condition is at present not critical, it is impossible as yet to determine what the result will be, and until this is possible the charge against Stanton cannot be made. In the meantime he will remain in the county jail until the July term of court.

The boy's record in the past has not been good, and he has the reputation of being hot-headed and quarrelsome. He was arrested here a week ago for fighting, and in Portland last year for drunkenness. His father and relatives and his brother Charles, a young man who has the esteem of all who know him, are heart broken over the affair.
