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THE DUTY OF THE REPUBLICAN PARTY.

While political parties are not as important to the people as they once were, it is still worth while to discuss the duty of the Republican party in Oregon.

When we speak of the party we refer to all Republicans, or persons who in the past or now profess TO BELIEVE IN REPUBLICAN PRINCIPLES.

In Oregon there has been nominally a government by the Republican party but that those holding public positions at the hands of the party cared very much to popularize the party by good works IS DOUBTFUL.

They have mostly held office entirely for selfish purposes—with very little regard for the popularity of the party so far as rendering valuable services to the people or CHAMPIONING POPULAR MEASURES OR PROTECTING PUBLIC INTERESTS.

It has been rather a government of the Republicans who got into office in state affairs in the name of the party for their own benefit.

They cared very little what record or impression they left behind them so long as they GOT WHAT THEY WANTED OUT OF THE OFFICE.

The first duty of the Republican party is to reserve this and put men in office in state and national affairs who will make good records.

In many of the counties the Republicans have given the people good, clean, honest, economical government.

BUT THERE HAS BEEN MUCH TO BE DESIRED IN OUR STATE AND NATIONAL AFFAIRS.

In our state affairs the leaders consented to populist measures but resisted reforms like the flat salary law and school land reforms.

They have resisted the reform embodied in Statement No. 1, which was intended to cure THE ABUSES OF CORRUPT SENATORIAL ELECTIONS.

They have impressed the people with a strong desire to get back to the old rotten system which has been universally condemned.

THE DUTY OF THE REPUBLICAN PARTY IS TO GET RIGHT ON THESE QUESTIONS. It is a fundamental principle of Republicanism to abide by the will of the majority.

If, after having embodied populist measures upon the statute books and in the constitution, they want to repeal them, LET THEM SAY SO AND NOT ASSAIL THEIR OWN CREATIONS BY INDIRECTION.

It should be observed that the condemnation of the reform measures contained in the last Republican state convention have all been enacted by the people.

The indirect thrusts at the Direct Primary are answered BY ELECTION OF A STATEMENT NO. 1 LEGISLATURE.

The denunciation of the recall, and other proposed measures in that platform are met with their enactment by the people.

The condemnation by party leaders of direct election of Senators by the vote of the people is met by enactment of a law DIRECTING THE MEMBERS OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY TO ELECT THE CHOICE OF THE PEOPLE.

Shall the machine leaders drive the Republican party farther into hostility to the will of the masses of citizens, or shall the party become amenable to the majority?

The first duty of the party is to get into harmonious relations with the majority.

TO OVERTHROW THE EXPRESSED WILL OF THE PEOPLE.

It is plainly the intention of those who are dictating Republican policies in Oregon to overthrow the expressed will of the people in electing Chamberlain senator to succeed Fulton.

That Chamberlain would have defeated Fulton even by a larger vote than he did Cake few close observers will deny.

THAT THE INTENTION IS CLEARLY TO DEFEAT CHAMBERLAIN NO ONE CAN DOUBT.

The program seems to be to tell the people it will be in violation of the constitution to have the legislature ratify the choice of a Senator because he is a Democrat.

WHAT EXCUSE WOULD HAVE BEEN TRUMPED UP IF CAKE HAD BEEN ELECTED NO ONE CAN TELL.

But Cake would have been assailed by the same influences, though perhaps with not so good a show of success.

Be this as it may, the issue will be made BY THE ALLEGED LEADERS OF THE REPUBLICAN PARTY IN OREGON.

Their cry is now unconstitutional. Next remonstrances are to be circulated signed by Republicans asking representatives not to vote for the choice of the people.

THEN THE INFLUENCE OF MONEY WILL BE ATTEMPTED. Who can doubt it who knows the past history of this state. All for the purpose of overthrowing the will of the people and defeating the law.

Is that a good program for the Republican party to be committed to? WE DO NOT BELIEVE IT.

It would be far better to say, we have been defeated by the people in the political game. Let us come together as an organization, NOT TO FURTHER RESIST THE WILL OF THE PEOPLE BUT TO EXECUTE IT.

Resistance to any form of popular expression is only getting further into the mire.

The rank and file of the Republican party WANT CLEANER METHODS OF ELECTING SENATORS AND ARE GOING TO HAVE THEM.

Let us not put the Republican party farther on the defensive, and plunge deeper into indefensible positions.

But it is useless to give reasonable advice to leaders WHO ARE BENT UPON THEIR OWN DESTRUCTION.

They have undertaken to put their party into drydock and will succeed.

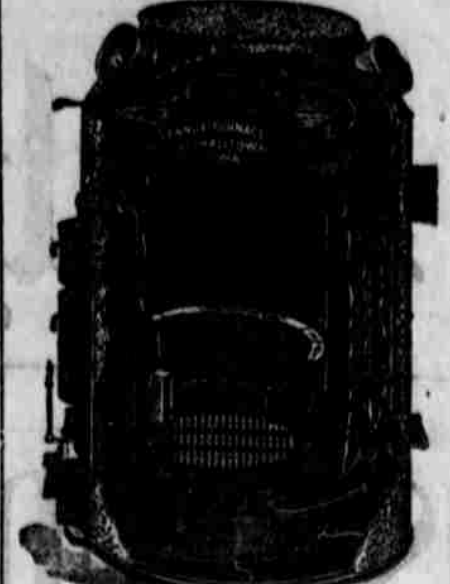
To Be Held In PORTLAND, OREGON JUNE 1 TO 6, 1908
