Vienna, June 6.—Fifteen men were killed and many badly hurt in an explosion in a celluloid factory here today. The suffering was terrific. Fire destroyed the plant immediately following the explosion and some of the bodies were buried.

Lincoln, Neb., June 6.—Reports received today from the interior of the state indicate that ten were killed and many injured by tornadoes that swept the state this morning. Fatalities are reported at Franklin, Carleton, Shickley and Geneva. Communication is cut off and details are meager. Heavy rains washed out railroad tracks preventing relief work.

Chester, Kas., June 6.—Two deaths are reported today and six people were seriously hurt in a tornado that swept southern Kansas last night. The wind attained a

The explosion occurred at an early hour. The immense tanks of the gas company were thrown three blocks by the terrific force of the explosion and the entire side of the hospital next to the gas works was blown out.

Nearly every window in the hospital was broken and scenes of wild confusion ensued almost resulting in a panic among those who escaped from the wrecked infirmary. There were over a hundred patients in the hospital at the time and it is thought that the shock of the accident will result in the death of many who were critically ill.

The buildings of the gas works caught fire immediately after the explosion and rendered the work of rescue extremely dangerous. The injured were saved from a horrible death in the fire by the heroic efforts of the firemen. The search for bodies is continuing.

The fire engine house adjacent to the plant was demolished by the explosion. Several firemen were caught in the debris and seriously injured. They were rescued by firemen from other stations who arrived within a few minutes after the engine house collapsed.

Horses Washed Away.
