Lewiston, Idaho, June 6.—After creating havoc in the towns along their course, the Clearwater and Salmon river floods are receding today and there is little danger of further damage being done.

The greatest property loss in the past two days of the flood was caused by the wrecking of two dams, one the property of the Grangeville Power company, and the other belonging to a mining concern. These dams alone were valued at \$10,000 and much valuable property was destroyed when they went out releasing a great amount of water.
