DEATH

(Continued From Page 1.)

Of the ten injured sailors in the ship's hospital, it is feared that at least two will succumb to their terrible wounds.

Those in a critical condition this morning are:

- H. Fitzpatrick, Brooklyn, N. Y.
- F. S. Maxfield, Toughkena, Penn.
- S. Stamatt, Norfolk, Va.

Arrangements had been made to bring the injured to a Los Angeles hospital on a special train early this morning, but owing to a dense fog that enveloped the bay of San Pedro, the plan was temporarily abandoned. The men are receiving every care and attention on board the Tennessee being attended by the ship's surgeon and Dr. Weldon, of San Pedro.

Business in San Pedro was generally suspended during the ceremonies at the naval cemetery and flags throughout the city have been placed at half mast. The men of the cruiser Tennessee have provided a floral wreath for each of the victims, and the chamber of commerce, the board of trustees and many business concerns have arranged to send tributes. Full naval honors will be accorded the dead heroes and a detachment of marines with a band will accompany the remains.

Following is a revised list of the dead:

The accident to the Tennessee, which is the flagship of the second division of the Pacific fleet, in command of Rear-Admiral Sebree, occurred while the men in the fire rooms were working with might and main to make a record breaking full speed run off Point Huememe. Ambition to send the speedometer to 22 knots paid the penalty when death came in horrible form. A six inch crack in a water tube amid a cluster connecting with the main boiler, was the seemingly insignificant cause of converting the magnificent flagship into a vessel of death, by filling the fire room with scalding steam.

Admiral Sebree had stepped from the room in which the explosion occurred but a few seconds before and Chief Engineer Robertson, who was following the admiral on his tour of inspection, was still in the passage-way between the fire rooms when the blast of cinders and steam filled the compartment.

The wounded and survivors owe their existence to the heroism of their fellow sailors, who braved the death dealing steam in the work of rescue.

One more victim of the terrific boiler explosion on board the U. S. cruiser Tennessee yesterday off Point Huememe, died during the night making the total number to lose their lives in the catastrophe five. Two of the injured are expected to succumb before night.

Later Report.

A special train conveyed six of the seriously injured sailors to Los Angeles today, where they are being

given every medical attention in the Angelus hospital.

This morning five caskets were taken out to the ill-fated cruiser and funeral services in charge of Chaplain Dickens were held on board.

Floral tributes in profusion were sent out by the San Pedro chamber of commerce and by friends of the officers and men. Numerous beautiful floral pieces also were secured by the sailors on the Tennessee.

At 2 o'clock this afternoon the bodies will be brought ashore to be buried.

During the ceremonies at the cemetery business in the city will be generally suspended.

No official investigation of the cause of the disaster to the Tennessee's boilers has yet been made, but it is understood no blame attaches to either men or officers for the accident.

Roosevelt's Telegrams.

GOVERNMENT IS ROASTED BY DOUMA

(United Press Leased Wire.) St. Petersburg, June 6.—The ministry of marine is today considering an answer to a scathing attack made in the douma Friday on the Russian navy in which it was charged that the terrible lessons taught by the war with Japan had not been heeded by the government.

M. Kolubliakin, constitutional democrat, led the attack on the government and declared that the personnel of the navy was shiftless. He declared that navy officers shirked sea duty for pleasure on shore.

Admiral Bostrom attempted to reply to the attack but was hissed from the floor. A resolution was passed expressing dissatisfaction with the administration of the navy and demanding that those who had communicated the secrets of Russian gun, shell and armor construction to England, be severely punished.

KILAUEA IN DANGEROUS CONDITION

(United Press Leased Wire.) Honolulu, June 6.—Lorrin A. Thurston, who has just returned from the volcano at Kilauea, says that the disturbance there is by far the greatest since 1894, when the bottom dropped out of the lake, forming the present pit. The pit of lava is boiling and bubbling at a terrific rate and there are continual explosions at intervals of about a minute.

The light from the boiling pit can be seen 35 miles away. He says the lava lake is in the shape of a figure eight, about 300 feet long and averaging about 400 feet wide.

"Immediately after each explosion," said Thurston, "a tremendous suction draws the laval from a radius of a hundred feet into a vortex like that of a maelstrom, great cakes of lava, 15 and 20 feet in diameter being hurled into the air. Then they are sucked down into the vortex and disappear.

"This action has been going on now for several weeks at the lake constantly enlarging and the floor of the pit being raised by the overflow of lava.

"If the present rate of filling goes on, it should be running over by the end of the year. But it is impossible to tell whether it will continue at the present rate, increase in violence or subside. It is the grandest natural phenomena visible on the face of the earth."

Washington, June 6.—A new step will soon be taken by Postmaster General Meyer to prevent the circulation of anarchistic literature into this country, through agencies abroad. The laws are strict regarding the use of the mails here by anarchists to disseminate their publications, but it has been pointed out that matter that would fall under the ban if mailed here, is easily distributed in America by being mailed abroad. The postmaster general is planning a system by which suspected papers and periodicals, coming from abroad, will be translated and submitted to the authorities before they are passed.
