Australia and Our Fleet.

Australian view of the meaning of the visit of the American fleet to the Pacific is evident within a few hours of the receipt of the acceptance of the invitation. two white races whose destinies are bound up in the Pacific dominance. Its acceptance implies a full confession of that trust, and conveys an intimation that America is prepared to perform her part."

Australians are prepared to rise to the standard which their prevision of the future trusts upon them. They have made up their minds that if they are to keep what they have got they must defend it themselves with their own army, and their own officers. If Australia is to be worthy of being ranked as the friend and potential ally of America in the Pacific she must have a fleet which, whether small or great, can be localized definitely on the Pacific for the defense of Australia.—Melbourne correspondent of London Chronicle.

Stockton Fears No Dry Year.

Talk about a dry year in San Joaquin county is idle. There are no dry years here where a large proportion of the soil irrigates itself by what may be called upward percolation from the inexhaustible water that underlies thousands of acres. "Dry year" is an expression that has survived the days when this was a one crop country, when the incal-

culable wealth of the peat lands was undeveloped and almost unknown. The year 1907 was regarded as a poor one, yet San Joaquin county's principal agricultural products aggregated very nearly \$13,000,000 in value and the aggregate for 1908 will greatly exceed that figure for the crop will be larger.

Potatoes alone brought \$2,187,500 to this county last year and the crop was not all harvested before the year closed. Grapes brought \$1,920,000; onions, \$643,500; beans, \$450,000, and dairy products \$767,500, which latter figure will be greatly increased over half a million and will bring at least 25 per cent more this year; poultry brought \$747,888, and the industry is in its infancy. Tree fruits brought in \$662,692, with no more than 60 per cent of the orchards in full bearing, while even berries and small fruits contributed more than \$50,000 to the aggregate. Last year was called a poor crop year, but hay to the value of two and a half millions was raised and grain added nearly two millions to the revenue of the farmers, while prospects for 1908, which are not as bright as this county could desire, indicate that the yield of both hay and grain will exceed that of 1907.

The vast income from the potato crop of last year has caused a much greater area to be devoted to that industry, and there is no doubt that the tubers, the advance of which crop is already appearing, will bring nearly \$3,000,000 to the island farmers, where the yield per acre is simply enormous.

Taken all in all, there is good ground for the opinion that the revenue to San Joaquin farmers for 1908 will so far exceed that of 1907 as to bring the aggregate close to \$16,000,000.—Stockton Independent.
