THIRTY IS DEAD LIST OF TORNADO

IN NEBRASKA CITIES

EIGHT TOWNS SUFFERED FROM THE HURRICANE—PROPERTY LOSS WILL BE HALF A MILLION DOLLARS.

Omaha, Neb., June 8.—Reports from the scene of Friday night's tornado received here today indicate that the list of dead will total nearly 30 and that the property loss will be a half a million dollars. Eight Nebraska towns suffered from the effects of the hurricane. They are Geneva, Fairfield, Carleton, Franklin, Hebron, Shickley, Byron and Riverton.
On the Kansas side of the line Scardina, Courtland and Phillipsburg were damaged.
The infant son of Mrs. Loudesa near Hebron died today from injuries received in the collapse of the house. The father was killed out right.

SPIRITUAL BANKER IS DENOUNCED

BY PROSECUTOR

WALTER J. BARNETT, PRESIDENT CALIFORNIA SAFE DEPOSIT COMPANY, ROASTED AT HIS TRIAL.

San Francisco, June 8.—The actual trial of Walter J. Barnett, former vice president of the trusted California Safe Deposit & Trust Company, on the charge of felony embezzlement, began today before Judge Conley, when Assistant District Attorney William H. Cook made his opening statement to the jury. Barnett is accused of having embezzled \$25,000 worth of bonds and securities belonging to the estate of the late Ellen M. Colton. J. Dalzell Brown, former manager of the bank, who is now serving a term in state's prison, after having turned state's evidence against Barnett, is to be the people's star witness. An effort will be made to corroborate his testimony with letters and telegrams sent to him by Barnett.
Mrs. Dahlgren, one of Mrs. Colton's heirs, was the first witness today. She was called to establish the fact that Barnett had possession of the securities as vice president of the bank. She had deposited the securities there.
Barnett's attorneys today stated that he would take the stand in his own behalf. It is expected that the testimony will all be in by Friday night and that the case will go to the jury Saturday night.
In his opening address to the jury Assistant District Attorney Cook denounced Barnett in scathing language. He said that the vice president of the wrecked institution had gained the confidence of the Colton heirs and then induced them to transfer the securities to his bank.
The accused man quieted the conscience of his manager, J. Dalzell Brown, by telling him that the spirit of Mrs. Colton had directed him to take the securities for the bank's use. Cook went at length into the spirit meetings which will play a prominent part in the trial.
He explained the cipher code used by Barnett in communicating with the officers of the bank. At first they were called by such names as "cadet" in the code, but after the operations of the alleged wreckers had brought success they were called by such names as "triumphant."

PUPILS IN MONSTER PARADE

FRIDAY MORNING

SALEM SCHOOL CHILDREN, 2000 STRONG WILL MARCH AS FITTING CLOSE TO SCHOOL TERM—UNIQUE IDEA.

A unique departure in public school activities will be made next Friday, when 2000 school children of Salem will parade through the principal streets of the city, and will afterward be formally dismissed for their summer vacation by Superintendent Powers at Marlon Square.
The parade and public exercises, which will in all probability develop into a regular annual event is the idea of the Salem board of trade. A committee from the board of trade, consisting of C. M. Bishop, Max O. Buren, Ray Farmer, E. Hofer and F. W. Steusloff sent a petition to the school board asking that such exercises be held on the last day of the school year, and the school board at their meeting Saturday night unanimously adopted the suggestion of the business men.
The committee from the board of trade, together with A. N. Moores of the school board, City Superintendent Powers, and Principal Mariatte of the high school held a meeting this morning and arrangements for the big public school day were made.
At 1 o'clock Friday afternoon an assembly of the pupils will be held in all the schools of the city. At 2 o'clock the 2000 pupils together with all the teachers, the directors and other school officials will assemble in Willson avenue. From here the parade will start, headed by Grand Marshal Dr. C. H. Epley, who will be mounted upon a handsome charger. Arrangements are being made to secure both the Chemawa and Salem bands for the occasion.
After forming in Willson avenue the parade will move down Court street to Liberty, up Liberty street to State, on State from Liberty to Commercial, and down Commercial street to Marlon Square.
At the square short addresses will be delivered by Superintendent Powers, Mayor Rodgers, C. B. Moores and E. Hofer. There will be music by the bands, and patriotic songs will be sung by the grand chorus of school children.
Immediately after the exercises at Marlon Square, a field meet will be held on Willamette field in which all the schools of the city will compete. The board will award a handsome banner to the school winning the highest number of points, and another to the team winning the mile relay race.

PLANNED RULER'S MURDER

JAIL CONSPIRATORS

SCHEMED TO BLOW UP KING EMANUEL AT RELIGIOUS FEAST—THREE CONSPIRATORS ARE IN JAIL.

Lisbon, June 8.—Consternation and fear prevails at the palace, following the discovery of a plot today to blow up young King Emanuel, whose father and brother recently were assassinated.
Three of the conspirators have been placed in jail and the authorities have received word that efforts will be made to liberate them.
The secret service men received a hint of the intrigue and traced it with such success that they were able today to seize correspondence which shows that the men belong to the same band as those who killed King Carlos and the prince.
It was planned to execute King Emanuel during the state religious feast which is to be held June 15. All arrangements were carefully laid for exploding a bomb in such a way that it would have been practically impossible for the king to have escaped with his life.
Lisbon, which has been torn with all sorts of industrial and civil dissension and harassed by rulers on one hand by anarchists on the other, is in a state of great excitement over the discovery of this latest attempt at murdering royalty. Outbreaks are feared, as fanatics are taking every advantage to deliver addresses in the streets, whenever they can avoid the police. The guards about the palace have been increased. It is said the widowed queen suffered severely from the shock when the news reached her. The royal family virtually are prisoners.

EXPLOSION VICTIM BURIED

Los Angeles, Cal., June 8.—At 10 o'clock this morning one more body of the victims of the boiler tube explosion on board the United States cruiser Tennessee, F. S. Maxwell, whose death occurred yesterday, was laid to rest in Harbor View cemetery at San Pedro. It had been arranged to inter the remains of J. P. A. Carroll, who died Saturday night at the same time, but as the funeral procession was about to start, a telegram was received from the navy department at Washington directing Admiral Sebree to hold the body of Carroll until further orders. It is thought his remains may be ordered shipped to his former home at Hartford, Conn.

The same service and rites of honor were observed today as at Saturday's funeral.
The service was read by Chaplain Dickins of the Tennessee. Captain T. B. Howard and other officers of the Tennessee and a detail of sailors were present at the services at the grave. At the Angelus hospital in this city today it was stated that the four remaining injured sailors had passed a good night and that prospects of their ultimate recovery is hopeful.

Today the board inquiry appointed to investigate the cause and fix the blame for the explosion on the Tennessee, will hear the testimony of the officers and men who may be able to throw light on the accident.

RAILROAD SAFE BLOWN OPEN BY NITRO-GLYCERINE

POLICEMAN SAVES DROWNING MAN

San Francisco, June 8.—Without waiting to doff either coat or helmet, Policeman Hanrahan, who patrols the water front, plunged into the waters of the bay early today and rescued George Day, sailor.
Day was standing on the end of the wharf when he lost his balance and struck the water in such a way that it took his breath and he was unable to save himself. Policeman Hanrahan happened to be near the spot at the time and went to the rescue of the drowning man. Together they were hauled out of the bay by Policemen McPartland and Wren, who had come in response to cries of onlookers. After donning another uniform, Hanrahan immediately resumed his beat.
