What would have resulted in a real interesting game of baseball yesterday between the Salem Tri-City leaguers and the St. Johns aggregation ended up in a glorious sky rocket manner in the last of the eighth inning when the locals chased four men to the good due mostly to the hard hitting of the Cherry Pickers, Keeler, St. Johns' twirler, having lost his bearings in giving the ball to the catcher, although up to the fateful inning for the visitors, they had the score evened up to one all, and things were taking ten or eleven-inning prospect.

Salem pulled down the first score which was in the first half of the fourth round, Edwards starting things for the locals by scattering a clean hit through second base followed by Jerman who sacrificed, putting Edwards on the second sack easily, but Dave couldn't hardly see only one base on a little bunt so hiked to third base safe and sound. Nace then helped Edwards to home by getting a nice two-base drive which split the third base sack in the middle.

The visitors tied the score by some tardy playing on the part of the Salem infield men. Parker hit one of Dennis Hull's speedy ones out to the garden for three bases, and Brown fluked a hit over second base which was just out of reach of Harvey Newell at short and Edwards in center field, bringing in Parker.

In the last of the seventh time up for Salem, Cary was given right of way to first, and attempted to steal second when the St. Johns' backstop threw the ball to first base intending to catch Cary off, which he did. Moore, on first, threw the ball away out into left field instead of pegging Cary out on second with lots of time to spare, and "Casey" stepped around third sack and to home making just a little bit more for the locals, when the side was retired for the seventh.

In the last of the eighth the Cherry Pickers began stepping into pitcher Keeler's underhand twisters and put the game to the woods in short order, and ending the visitors only chance to fatten their standing on the score book. Porterfield got a one base hit, Newell up and drops a bunt near the first base line and reaches first on a fumble by Keeler, and also placing Porterfield on second safe. Edwards bunted and beat it out and making the bases full. Jerman slammed a scorching one through the pitcher and on into the center field scoring Porterfield and Newell. Nace connected fair for a two-base hit over third scoring Edwards. Cary then popped out a hit over second sack boosting Nace to third. Heyser brought Nace to the home plate by sticking out a clean hit over third base. The St. Johns laddies took their turn with the stick but were not able to size up "Denny" Hull's ramblers very well and forced to admit they were in the down and out class as far as baseball in this city yesterday, was concerned, although they were of the gamey kind who believe in causing all the trouble possible before "laying down" to their opponents.

Keeler threw a winning game at the first of the go, but the Cherry Pickers "got next" and punched all the wind out of his sails in the seventh and eighth innings. Hull was hardly up to his usual good form yesterday, but nevertheless he out-pitched Keeler in every inning. Giles, of Portland, was the umpire, and his work, although a little to the sideways once and a while, was very satisfactory.

A Teachers' Training Course.

Last September a Teachers' Training class of 20 members was organized in the high school under the direction of City Superintendent Powers. The class studied the theory and art of teaching, school methods and management, the state course of study, and the course of study for the Salem city schools. In addition, the class devoted two hours a week to observational work in the city schools, and two weeks of actual teaching in various grades of the city schools was done by each member of the class. Students taking this work as a part of their high school course, may after graduation, complete the course at the Monmouth State Normal school in one year. The state normal schools will give due credit for this work whether the students graduate from the high school or not. There are other obvious advantages which this course offers to young people who are planning to become teachers, but who cannot afford to attend any of the state normal schools.

Arrangements are being made to continue and enlarge this course for next year, and all who desire to take it should send their names to City Superintendent J. M. Powers as soon as possible.
