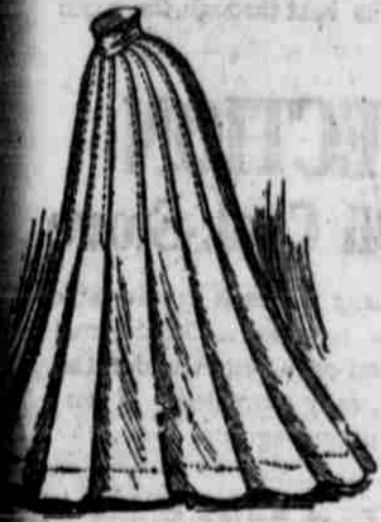

## ARRIVING FLEET ON VOYAGE

Yard, Puget Sound, June 9. Order has been received here to the ships of the Atlantic fleet going repairs at this yard to Francisco at the earliest possible date, in order that they may commence the taking on of supplies and there. The departure has been re-arranged as follows: Virginia leaves June 16; Wisconsin June 22; Illinois, June 20; Kentucky, June 25; Nebraska, June 27; Maryland, June 28; and Kearsarge, June 29. Orders have been received here to effect that the protected cruiser Albatross will leave on June 15 for duty for practice cruise. Secretary of the Interior Garfield, en route to the Hawaiian Islands, will return to the Pacific coast on the St. Louis.

## DEATH IN WAPE OF JAPANESE

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
Seoul, June 9.—The terrific thinning out of the Korean insurgents by Japanese troops is continuing at a rapid rate, according to a statement given out by officials of the Japanese army headquarters here today. The statement says that between June 3 and 7, the Japanese troops were engaged in 26 battles with the insurgents, killing 113 Koreans and wounding many more. The Japanese captured 26 of the insurgents. Reports from outlying districts state that in many places, the Koreans have entrenched themselves and are making much trouble for the Japanese army. Guerrilla fighting is going on in almost every district of Korea.

Birmingham, Ala., June 9.—The Confederate veterans and the Grand Army may meet together next year in annual encampment, if the fight that is being made here today by the Atlanta delegation to the annual encampment of the United Confederate veterans, proves successful. Atlanta wants both encampments to meet at the same time and has a big delegation to enforce consideration of her scheme. The encampment of the "boys in gray" was opened today with a grand parade witnessed by thousands of people who have come from all parts of the south to attend the celebration. Memorial exercises will be held here tomorrow for General Stephen D. Lee, former commander in chief of the Confederates, who died recently.

They declare that the Republicans act too slowly for them and finally adopted a resolution to save all their powder for the Democratic convention. It is understood that the suffragists have an understanding with Bryan.

taken up by the national Republican committee. Former Governor Marmouth of Louisiana, spoke for the Taft leaders and declared: "We must go into the convention with a full vote or not enter. We must rule or get out. There can be no compromise." It had been suggested that the Louisiana delegation, consisting of the four delegates-at-large and 14 district delegates, be divided, both of the contending delegations being seated and each delegate being allowed half a vote. The surprise was in the fact that the suggestion came from a member of the committee in the Taft ranks. It is believed he changed his mind over night.

Senator Dick of Ohio arrived here today and took charge of the presidential boom of Senator Foraker. Dick insists that Foraker's fight for the nomination is serious and says he will be a strong factor in the contest before the convention.

John C. Montgomery, leader of the vice presidential boom of John Hays Hammond, opened headquarters today. Hammond is the only real working candidate for the second place now officially on the ground.

**Temporary Platform.**  
Wade Ellis, attorney general of Ohio, returned from Virginia beach today with a rough draft of the Chicago platform in his pocket. He saw Secretary Taft and left later for Chicago.

The substance of the platform declarations he has drawn tentatively with approval of the administration will be the central idea of the platform.

**Tariff**—An unequivocal declaration for revision.

**Railroads**—A declaration favoring amendments to the anti-trust law that will enable railroads to enter reasonable traffic agreements without fear of criminal prosecution. Will also pronounce in favor of national control as against national ownership.

**Trusts**—A resolution condemning such combinations as create monopolies, limit production and control prices.

**Finance**—A note congratulating the country and congress on the passage of the currency bill.

**Navy**—A plank urging an increase in fighting ships.

**New states**—A recommendation for the admission of Arizona and New Mexico as separate states.

**Shipping**—Indorsement of the ship subsidy idea.

**Labor**—A recommendation for enactments that will insure labor organizations against snap judgment by the courts in issuance of injunctions.

Marmouth was excluded from the meeting of the national committee as soon as he had completed his presentation of his case. As he left the building he said:

"I would rather bolt the convention than accept a compromise. The delegation from Louisiana was fairly won from Taft and I do not see a single vote surrendered."

"Uncle Joe Cannon with his big black cigar and his usual smile, arrived today and conferred with his friends at the Union League club. It was said that Cannon has no idea on the work which will occupy most presidential race. His friends assert with apparent confidence that he is a stronger contender.

## SUSPEND TRAFFIC

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
Reval, Russia, June 9.—Traffic in the gulf of Finland is suspended today and will be for two days following to make way for the visit of King Edward to Czar Nicholas.

The czar and his retinue arrived by train this morning, having abandoned the trip in the imperial yacht Standart on account of rough weather.

Two hours later King Edward and Queen Alexandra, with their following, arrived in the royal yacht Victoria and Albert. No vessels were allowed to approach within a large circle surrounding the royal yachts.

Today's ceremonies were held aboard the king's yacht. When the czar came on board, King Edward kissed him affectionately on both cheeks and the two monarchs remained in conference some time. Tomorrow Nicholas will act as host on board the imperial yacht Standart. St. Petersburg, June 9.—The Russian press is unanimous today in viewing with joy, the meeting between the czar and King Edward. Coming as it does shortly after the visit of President Fallieres, the papers here attach great political significance to the conference between the two monarchs. The "Bourse Gazette" says:

"It is impossible not to perceive in the interview, a precursor to a Russian convention concerning Europe, which will be a natural sequel to the Asiatic convention and will be of vast moment in the permanent establishment of the balance of power in Europe and indeed throughout the whole world, by transforming the Franco-Russian alliance into an Anglo-Franco-Russian understanding."

The "Russ" says:

"Although the country will have no opportunity of receiving the visitors directly, King Edward and his splendid sailors may rest assured that the whole Russian people greet them in thought with eyes of friendship."
