**Supreme Court Decisions—**  
Non-suit granted in the Circuit court of Multnomah county by Judge Cleland in the case of C. W. Fredenthall vs. Brown & McCabe, stevedores of Portland, was affirmed today by the supreme court in an opinion by Mr. Justice Eakin. Fredenthall was injured while loading a ship at the Portland lumber mills and while in the employ of the defendants and had brought action for damages. He relied on hear-say evidence and Judge Cleland granted the defense a non-suit. Justice Moore also rendered a decision affirming the holding of Judge Crawford of the Union county circuit court in the case of Elgin Forwarding company v. F. M. Cummings.

**SALEM RANKED AS FIRST CLASS**  
Postmaster Square Ferry received official notice from the postoffice at Salem in the first class.

In order to be placed in the first class office, the receipts for the preceding year reach \$40,000. For the year March 31, the receipts of the postoffice were \$41,500. The only first class postoffice outside of Portland.

**RAILROAD RESPONSIBLE FOR INJURING FOUR PASSENGERS**  
In its report of the accident at Troutdale branch of the Portland Railroad Light and Power company of June 2, the railroad today found that the automobile car that ran off the embankment injuring four passengers, was responsible for the accident.

The commission recommends First, That a sufficient amount of earth or gravel be put in at the of the track to prevent cars from beyond control from going on the embankment.

Second, That the employees of the company be required to look before they are given permanent employment.

Third, That a suitable sign be as "one-half mile to end of track" be installed to give ample warning.

The commission noted the location of highway crossings at certain points and ordered that these be marked.
