EUGENE TREATED FAIRLY.

The Eugene papers are doing wrong roasting Salem and Albany for the meager vote given the State university appropriation.

Eugene boosters got in three speeches at the Salem electric railroad rally.

At each gathering Eugene men and university professors showed up and WERE ALLOWED TO TALK FOR THEIR PET.

The newspapers at Salem and Albany gave both sides free space and did not seek to prejudice the university by any low local flings.

There is little occasion for any Eugene paper to howl at "THE SALEM HOG" OR "THE LINN COUNTY MOSSBACK."

What the press of the state should do is to help Eugene make a real university out of the school at Eugene.

KLAMATH COUNTY HIGH SCHOOL.

This is one of the largest and most successful high schools in the state, under the direction of Principal John G. Swan, assisted by W. E. Faught, Chas. A. Powers. The board is composed of five county officials: J. B. Griffith, Jas. G. Wright, L. A. Lewis, Fred Melhase and W. A. Walker.

IN UNION COUNTY.

La Grande is recovering from the shock of going dry and already five new business enterprises are seeking locations there in place of the large brewery and other places that will be closed. Chas. Knowles was elected circuit judge for Wallowa and Union, and will make a fine record on the bench.

COOS COUNTY.

Cake and the Republican ticket got majorities, the county went wet and re-elected Sheriff Gage. Chase won out for joint senator. Beddilion for representative, and Muncy for joint representative. It is a shame that the Drain and Coos Bay railroad is not going to be built this year.

JACKSON COUNTY.

This county, which gave majorities against Chamberlain twice as governor, gave him 480 majority as senator. Wilbur A. Jones is sheriff. (Dem.) by 556, Niel gets county judge. (Dem.) by 175, and Purdin and Miller (Statement No. 1 Democrats) got fine majorities. The rest of the county ticket is Republican. The county reversed itself on Prohibition and went wet by 257. Sentiment for popular government is very strong in Jackson.

TILLAMOOK COUNTY.

Went Republican on all candidates except P. W. Todd, treasurer, Democrat. W. S. Buell was chosen county superintendent of schools, without opposition. A. M. Hare who has been assessor for six years was re-elected. A. G. Beals was re-elected joint representative. He has made a good record as legislator. The county went dry by an increased vote and the county high school was defeated, 470 to 427.

BENTON COUNTY.

Cake got 8 majority and the whole state and county ticket were carried by a large vote. The Democrats elected Moses clerk, Buchanan treasurer, and Rickard assessor. The big showing made for Chamberlain and the election of Moses by three votes was the result of the very able newspaper fight put up by Editor Irvine of The Times. Benton again went dry.

NOT PROUD OF THEIR WORK.

There is no clamor among the Republican machine politicians of Marion county to be known as the leaders and advisors of the move-

ment that called that anti-Statement No. 1 convention, that ruled out all the Statement No. 1 men as delegates to the state convention, that insulted reform principles with a reactionary platform—but why dwell on the monument of folly erected by political bourbonism?

DOUGLAS COUNTY.

This county went to Cake by 11 votes and Republican for the whole state and county ticket, except three. Senator Abraham, a champion of Statement No. 1, got 671 majority. Judge Bean led all the other candidates in popular vote, being on both party tickets. The Democrats elected Fenton sheriff, Lenox clerk, Chaney school superintendent and went dry by 412 and 25 licensed saloons will go out of business.

KLAMATH COUNTY.

Handsome majorities for Cake and nearly the whole Republican ticket resulted. D. V. Kuykendall, son of the Lane county senator, was chosen district attorney, H. P. Belknap representative, and G. H. Merriam senator. The Democrats got sheriff and treasurer. That county gave Cake a handsome majority and seems less affected by the Portland political foot-and-mouth disease than almost any county in the state.

EDITORIAL REVIEW.

Following the county going dry the city council of Roseburg has ordained Sunday closing, cut out boxes and ordered "hurdy-gurdy" houses abated. District Attorney Brown says they have acted prematurely, having only state laws on which to base prosecutions. There is evidently trouble ahead at Roseburg.

Portland having stolen the name Rose City from Roseburg, The Dalles is trying to do the same with Salem on Cherry City.

Mayor Hawkins of Coquille has appointed R. O. Hoberg city marshal to succeed Lee Goodman, who has worn the star for ten years. Oliver Sanford was named city treasurer in place of Mr. Knowlton, who also held office for ten years. If the new men do as well as their predecessors they will make a good record and they are highly spoken of.

The Albany high school turned out a class of 15 graduates. The address to the class were made by President Ralston of the Board of Education, and President Kerr of the State Agricultural college.

The town of Dufur had great doings over graduating exercises in the public schools—all over four pupils completing the eight grade. It is time for Oregon to start a wave of public school pride that will reach the remotest country school.

Roseburg high school graduated a class of ten that reflected credit upon the Rose City and Superintendent S. L. Baker. There was a class poem and great stacks of white roses, miles of white ribbons and oceans of oratory.

Astoria will seek to amend the city charter and build a sea-wall in front of that city. It will cost the property owners \$20 a front foot to build the wall with a street on top of it, or \$500 a lot.

Thousands of trout are dying in the irrigation ditches fed by the Rogue river. The law requiring screens at the intakes is not enforced, and the most beautiful trout enter the ditches and cannot return to the river.

The fishwheel owners' fish bill won in the state by only 4032 majority, while the fishermen's protective bill carried by 22,817. The salmon will get a rest on Sunday. The ugly fish wheels will be swept out of the beautiful gorge of the Columbia—if the courts don't intervene. The courts still arrogate to themselves the right to set aside the will of the people but that won't last always.

Eugene will get along without saloons but will have a little horse-racing occasionally. Mayor Matlock will not object to that, or he is no true Matlock.

The Eugene Register (Rep.) says: "The Republican party is sadly in need of a backbone." This refers to Oregon leaders. Bet you a cookie the Machine rustles everyone of your defeated, spineless, miscellaneous candidates a big fat federal office, and that for the rest of their lives they will wear padlocks on their mouths.

Silverton will try going dry for two years. Two splendid officers

have been elected in H. D. Mount for justice and A. F. Smoral for constable. They will have plenty to do but are men who can be relied upon to do their duty. Revs. Salisbury and Esson led the Prohibition campaign and proved good campaigners. The best thing the Silverton politicians can do is to accept the result and enforce the law fairly and honestly.
