Field, president of the firm of Field & Walton, curio dealers, is today nursing a much bruised face and head as the result of a severe whipping administered to him yesterday by Mrs. Meadows, wife of Dr. Lawrence L. Meadows, of the Pacific Mail Steamship company. Dr. Meadows held the curio dealer while his wife applied the whip, cutting him severely about the face and hands. Field says today that he will have the couple arrested.

Dr. Meadows and his wife walked into Field's store late yesterday afternoon and asked the man to go for a walk with them. This he refused to do and then Meadows pulled from his pocket a bill for \$4046 for alienating his wife's affections made out against Field and signed by himself. He demanded immediate payment.

Field demurred and the Meadows both attacked him. The doctor held the man while his wife lashed him with a small whip. Meadows assisted now and then by getting in a

punch. A crowd soon collected in the store and when he thought that Field had had enough, Dr. Meadows called to his wife to desist. Pointing his finger dramatically at Field, who was dripping with blood, he cried to the women in the shop, "Look out for that man. My wife once worked for him."

The Meadows then took a train for San Francisco and have not been seen since.
