**Johnson Funeral—**  
The funeral of Mrs. Mary Johnson, who died Sunday, was held at the family residence at 334 North Winter street yesterday afternoon. Rev. Paul Bandy of the Unitarian church officiating. The burial took place on Odd Fellow's cemetery.

**Brown Gets Judgment—**  
Because of the default of the defendants, Judge Galloway yesterday entered a judgment for the plaintiffs in the case of C. E. and G. L. Brown vs. C. H. Harpole.

**Continue Divorce—**  
The divorce case of Albert J. Savage vs. Nellie Savage was continued until June 22. The order was made yesterday postponing the case on account of the absence of L. H. McMahan, attorney for the defendant.

**Harvesting Begins—**  
The harvesting season in this vicinity was opened last Saturday by Philip Domm of Spring Valley, who cut several acres of alfalfa. The hay now being cut will go two tons or more to the acre.

**Marriage License—**  
Z. R. Downey of Sublimity, 19 years of age, secured a license from the county clerk yesterday to marry Ora M. Steel, aged 21. The minor who is an orphan, secured the license on the affidavit of his brother, C. H. Downey.

**Husband Gets Children—**  
In answer to a complaint filed by G. W. Wilson, whose wife was granted a divorce last July, Judge Galloway this morning gave the husband the custody of the two children.

**Returns in Auto—**  
Colonel Olmsted and family returned from Portland Sunday evening in a Stevens-Duryea touring car. The car will be used by the Olmsted Land company for the purpose of showing property to prospective buyers and also for livery hire. This machine is the first livery car in Salem.

**Southwick Speaks—**  
A treat was in store for those who attended the First Methodist church last night in the reading of Stephen Phillips' three-act tragedy "Herod" by Rev. Henry Lawrence Southwick.

**Suspension of Demurrage—**  
In response to a request from the Oregon Electric Railway company for a 30-day suspension of the demurrage provisions, and for the privilege of renewing the suspension for another 30 days, the railroad commission this morning issued an order for a hearing of the matter on June 22, at 306 Couch building, Portland.

**O. R. & N. Hearing—**  
The railroad commission today set June 18, as the date for the hearing of the O. R. & N., at which time the railroad company will be required to answer the charges filed by the freight shippers of The Dalles. The Dalles shippers complain of inadequate freight handling facilities maintained by the O. R. & N. at that city.

**Supreme Court—**  
The supreme court today set the dates for the following cases: State vs. Hammelsy, and Krebs Hop company vs. Taylor, June 23; Semkler vs. Kember, and Jones vs. California & Oregon Land company, June 24; Hoskins vs. Scott, and Van Bukirk vs. Bond, June 25.

## KENTUCKY PROBABLY FOR BRYAN

(United Press Lensed Wire.)  
Louisville, Ky., June 10.—Judging from the sentiment of the early arrivals who assembled at the Democratic headquarters today in preparation for the state convention which opens here tomorrow, the Kentucky delegation to Denver will be solid for Bryan.

There is some favorable mention of Governor Johnson, of Minnesota, but his supporters are in the minority, and not likely to wield much influence in the convention. It is believed, however, that if local issues are injected into the meeting, it will injure the cause of Bryan and it is known that the Nebraskan is opposed to this on the ground that only national issues should be considered at the Denver gathering.

#### New Mexico Also.

Roswell, N. M., June 10.—The territorial Democratic convention began here today with a preponderance of sentiment in favor of sending a delegation to the national convention at Denver pledged for Bryan. It is thought that the Nebraskan will be endorsed and the six men sent to Denver with instructions to support him.

#### Montana Divided.

Bozeman, Mont., June 10.—The Democratic state convention opened here today with every prospect of a fight between Bryan and Governor Johnson, of Minnesota, for the delegation to the national convention. Bryan is very strong among the Democrats of the state and his adherents claim that the convention here will elect a delegation pledged for the Nebraskan. One county, however, has instructed for Johnson. It is Deer Lodge in which Anaconda is situated and is the stronghold of the Marcus Daly faction. Bryan has the support of Senator Clark's organization and of the 619 delegates in attendance, the majority are believed to favor the Nebraskan. The convention will select six delegates to be sent to Denver.

### FURTHER PLANS FOR THE SCHOOL PARADE

If anything goes amiss in the preparations for the celebration of Public School Day next Friday it will not be the fault of the various committees that are in charge of the work. The latest move of the Board of Trade was to secure free street car transportation for all the children of the primary grades, from the schools to Willson Avenue, where the parade will start. Manager Page of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company this morning very kindly offered to furnish special cars for the children free.

All the streets over which the parade will pass will be thoroughly sprinkled, so that neither the marchers nor the spectators will be bothered by the dust. Every pupil in the big parade will carry a bunch of flowers; those, who for any reason, are not able to obtain flowers for the occasion will be furnished with them by the Women's club, under the direction of Mrs. P. H. Raymond.

The Woodburn band has also been secured. This makes three bands that will take part in the parade of next Friday.

#### Railway Sued.

Mrs. Laura Palmer has brought suit in the circuit court against the Portland Railway, Light & Power company to collect \$10,000 damages for injuries sustained in an accident last August on the corner of State and Cottage street. The complaint alleges that Mrs. Palmer was driving in a buggy across the car track when the car struck the vehicle, throwing its occupant to the ground. Mrs. Palmer was badly bruised and cut, and as a result of the accident, the complaint states, she is left childless. This latter reason is the principal cause of the large amount of damages prayed for. Carson and Brown are the attorneys for the plaintiff.

### CHAMBERLAIN MAKES CAKE'S BROTHER A NOTARY

Governor Chamberlain yesterday signed the commission, which makes W. M. Calk, brother of the governor's late political opponent, a notary public.

## DELEGATES INSTRUCTED FOR BRYAN

(United Press Lensed Wire.)  
Portland, Or., June 10.—Oregon's delegation of eight members to the Democratic national convention at Denver will vote for and support William Jennings Bryan as long as he is a candidate.

The Oregon Democrats placed their stamp of approval on the Nebraskan's candidacy at the state convention held Tuesday.

Aside from endorsing Bryan and pledging him the support of the delegation from this state, the platform adopted by the convention endorsed the initiative and the referendum by which the direct primary law was enacted; endorsed the popular election of United States senators; endorsed the administration of Governor Chamberlain and recommended the party to the established law for electing senators by the direct vote of the people; denounced the extravagances of the postal service; urged the enactment by congress of an amendment to the interstate commerce act whereby proposed advances in rates shall not become effective until the interstate commerce commission can determine their reasonableness; recommended postal savings banks and the same system of guaranteeing bank deposits as provided in the state constitution of Oklahoma.

## KOREANS FRIGHTEN JAPANESE

(United Press Lensed Wire.)

Honolulu, June 10.—Secret meetings of the Koreans here are exciting interest, especially in the Japanese quarter where it is felt that some sort of vengeance is being planned by the Koreans similar to that carried out at San Francisco when Diplomat Durham Stephens was killed. The local Koreans are in constant touch with the Korean league in San Francisco and have been holding secret meetings every night for some time. No one is allowed to get near the meeting place and none of the Koreans will speak of what transpired.

It is thought here that the conditions existing in Korea form the basis of the meeting.

## RECOUNT FAVORS HEARST

(United Press Lensed Wire.)

New York, June 10.—Out of the 293 boxes opened so far in the recounting of the votes in the disputed mayoralty election Hearst has gained 135 votes that had not originally been counted for him. A total of 1675 boxes remain to be opened.

#### Missouri Contests.

When the national committee went into session today the Missouri contests were taken up. Twenty-five minutes was allotted to each side for argument. J. L. Minnis presented the claims of the Taft delegation.

The Taft delegates from the eleventh and twelfth congressional districts of Missouri were seated by the committee today, defeating the Hughes men. An attempt was made to split the delegation but this was defeated by a viva voce vote.

## FOURTH CELEBRATION AND CHERRY FAIR

### Board of Trade and Business Men's League Take Up Discussion Whether Both Events Should Be Held

Last night at the meeting of the Business Men's league the people who want a Fourth of July celebration above all things else had their innings, and it now looks as though Salem would celebrate with a flourish. There is considerable feeling about town, however, that the celebration of the Fourth should be waived this year in order to make a grand success of the Oregon Cherry fair, which will be held in our city, July 9 and 10. It is proposed to extend this fair to the 11th and make that date a gala day to take the place of the Fourth of July celebration. Those who favor this move argue that a three day event is better for our city from a business standpoint, as well as from every other point of view.

The cherry fair, especially if the celebration day is added to it, will bring more people to our city, leave more money here, and do more good to the community as a whole than the mere observance of the Fourth of July. The one is a state event which will bring people to our city from all sections, while the other is a purely local enterprise.

It is claimed by the advocates of the celebration that Salem should have both, and they feel confident that the necessary wherewithal will be forthcoming. They also say they will help to make the cherry fair a success. This spirit of enterprise is widespread and deeply appreciated, and shows that the Fourth of July advocates are not narrow gauge people.

The advocates of the extended cherry fair program, however, maintain that with an expenditure of less money greater crowds can be had here and more good accomplished for our city. It is proposed by them to not only have the great exhibit of cherries and the local business program in connection with that, but to give a greater public display on the last day than has ever been produced on the occasion of a Fourth of July celebration, pure and simple.

The matter will probably be definitely settled by the committees in charge tonight or tomorrow. All interested should attend the regular board of trade meeting tonight at 8 o'clock.

## AUTOS TO JOIN IN PARADE

A new feature to the school children's parade next Friday will be four decorated automobiles, which will carry the speakers, the board of trade, and the representatives of the woman's club.

The business men's league last evening made a generous contribution to carry out this and other plans of the committee. The board of trade will use all the flags and bunting at their disposal in decorating the city, and all merchants are urged to decorate their individual places of business.

The men in charge of the school teams that will compete in the field meet Friday afternoon report that the embryo athletes are in excellent condition, and the children themselves are enthusiastic over the event.

## STANTON HELD TO ANSWER

Ben Stanton, the young man who shot Councilman Goode last week came up for hearing before Judge Webster at 10 o'clock this morning. He waived examination, and was bound over to the circuit court without bail. Stanton was not represented by an attorney, but the judge instructed him what his privileges were in the case, and he chose to have his first hearing before the circuit court.

Dr. Morse stated that Goode was now beyond the danger point, but that it was impossible to tell what complications might set in. Stanton cannot be released on bail until there is no possible doubt as to the outcome of Goode's accident.
