**SENATOR BROUGHT FROM SICK BED TO CAST DECIDING VOTE — WILL PROBABLY PASS MEASURE STOPPING RACING.**

Albany, N. Y., June 11.—The senate today passed the anti-race track gambling bill which makes bookmaking punishable by a year in jail, with no alternative fine. The vote was 26 to 25. Senator Foelker of Brooklyn, who was brought here seriously ill, was able to take his seat and cast his vote for the measure. The other bill, which will complete the Hughes anti-racing legislation and put an end to the "sport of kings" in the Empire state, is expected to be passed by the same vote. This is the greatest victory Governor Hughes has won since he began his term of office.

**BUSINESS PARALYZED IN KANSAS CITY—RAILROAD TRAFFIC STOPS—ST. LOUIS IN DANGER—WORSE OVERFLOW YET.**

**Plot Uncovered.**

Albany, N. Y., June 11.—A daring plot to defeat the anti-race track gambling bills was frustrated today by the cleverness of a trained nurse, who blocked four men in an effort to kidnap Senator Foelker, whose vote gave the needed majority that won the victory for Governor Hughes against the racing interests.

The kidnapers called at Foelker's house. One represented that he was a doctor. Foelker was ill in bed. They said they had come to convey him to the capitol. The nurse, who had been warned that such action might be taken, delayed them while a telephone message was sent to Foelker's friends. In the meantime, the regular physician arrived and the kidnapers made their escape.

Foelker was then removed to the capitol. He was supported into the senate chamber and sank into his chair. Several times he came near fainting but was able to cast the deciding vote, making the result 26 to 25 in favor of the measure that is expected to kill racing in the east.

Governor Hughes this afternoon said:

"I am greatly gratified at the result. It is a victory for law and order, which cannot be over estimated."

**NARROW ESCAPE FOR FRISCO'S ASSISTANT TREASURER.**

San Francisco, June 11.—It became known here today that consternation was caused in the office of the city treasurer late Tuesday night when two shots from a rapid fire gun crashed through the cage which Cashier C. B. Perkins had left but a few seconds before. The matter was hushed up and the facts have just become public. Watchman Gaston, one of the guards, had picked up a rapid fire gun and it went off before he knew it. The gun has been sent to the repair shop, as it was nearly responsible for a death in the same office on another occasion.

**MURDERER TO HANG TOMORROW**

Springfield, Ill., June 11.—Herman Billek, the Bohemian fortune teller, who was convicted of the murder of Mary Vrzal in Chicago in 1905 and accused of the poisoning of five other members of the Vrzal family, must hang tomorrow, according to a decree handed down by the supreme court today. Billek had applied for a stay of execution and a writ of habeas corpus on the technical ground that the judge who sentenced him had not asked him before whether he had anything to say. The court held that this contention had no merit.

The governor and the prison board have already refused to pardon Billek.

**BOARD OF TRADE TO DEAL IN WHEAT**

**SEARCHING FOR NEGRO ASSASSIN**

Wilburton, Okla., June 11.—One half of the population of Wilburton is today searching in every direction for a man supposed to be R. J. Johnson, a negro, who is accused of killing two prominent citizens of this city, while they were in the act of trying to capture him and turn him over to the authorities. It is charged that a few weeks ago Johnson killed Oliver Swan, a deputy marshal. He reappeared in town Wednesday, and when Walter Roberts and Robert Mounds attempted to lay hands on him he shot and instantly killed them.

**Mail Sacks Stolen.**

Los Angeles, Cal., June 11.—The postoffice authorities here today confirmed the report of the disappearance of a registered mail pouch while in transit from this city to New York. The pouch, which contained currency and securities to the value of \$50,000, disappeared while in the jurisdiction of the Kansas City division.

Local bankers shipped the \$50,000 to their correspondents in New York. The loss will fall upon the shippers here, if the pouch is not recovered.

**Hitchcock Censured.**

Columbus, O., June 11.—Charles L. Kurtz, manager of the boom for Senator Foraker's nomination, today declared that the action of the Republican national committee regarding the contest was outrageous.

"The conduct of Hitchcock," said Kurtz, "was the most reprehensible of all. His sense of fairness or the committee's sense of decency, if Hitchcock doesn't possess that virtue, should have prevented him from sitting while the contests were taken up."

Kurtz declared that an appeal would be taken to the convention on the decision of the national committee in the Ohio contests.

**CONVENTION TICKETS AT \$100 EACH**

Chicago, June 11.—The demand for tickets to the Republican national convention which convenes next Tuesday is so large that \$100 is the least figure at which one can be obtained. The men who subscribed toward the expenses of the convention are receiving tickets at the rate of one for each \$100 contributed. No one has yet admitted receiving over one ticket.

Three thousand tickets are to be distributed to Chicago politicians and the rest of the space in the Coliseum is to be devoted to delegates, press and friends of the leaders. Many politicians have offered to act as call boys to get inside the great convention hall, so great is the demand for tickets.
